## Lions View Snake Milking

Haskell Lions Club met at Haskell Steak House for their noon meeting Tuesday. President Joe Williams presided; Pierson gave the prayer; and Wallace Cox Jr. led the singing, accompanied at the piano by Ellen Walling.

Don Comedy, program chairman, gave a rattlesnake-milking demonstration, and a program on "Rattlesnakes-Their Handling, and Safety." During the demonstration, he showed how some snakes have two fangs on each side of the mouth, and told that there was a 3 to 15 minute interval after being bitten before a reaction might be felt. He also explained how the anti-venom serum is made, and discussed the different types of first aid treatment needed, until a victim can get to a doctor.

The freezing method, recommended for a time, is no longer used to a great extent, due to damage to skin and muscle Instead, the suction cup after lancing, is the recommended method.

Lion Dr. J. F. Cadenhead reported that an average of three snake-bite victims a year is treated here. The doctors use the lancing and suction system, and always give the patient a test to see if they are allergic to the anti-venom, before giving it to them.







Effective July 1, the new rate for the full \$15,000 coverage will be \$2.55; for \$10,000, \$1.70, and for \$5,000, \$0.85 monthly.

All members of the Armed Forces are automatically insured under SGLI, and premiums are deducted from their pay unless they decline in writing to be insured. The maximum amount was raised from \$10,000 to \$15,000 in June,

Members on full duty have protection for 120 days after separation. The group coverage can be replaced, regardless of health, by individual policies issued by 600 participating commercial companies if application is made within 120 days of separaton.

Rates for reservists, who are insured only during active duty training periods and associated travel, will be reduced from \$1.80 to \$1.50 annually for \$15,-000 coverage.

MANAGING YOUR MONEY

Training in the delicate art of handling money can't be started too soon. Here are a few good rules.

1. A regular allowance.



received at regular intervals, helps a child learn the ABC's of regular income management and gives him the sense of independence that comes with being able to buy some small items on his own. This fixed amount should be something he can depend on; if you withhold part of his allowance regularly as punishment, you may be defeating this purpose. For the same reason, be firm about not giving un earned extra allowance.

2. The importance of credit. There are times, however, when a child may need extra money in addition to his regular allowance: Just as you may make purchases on the installment plan or borrow from a bank. You'll

responsibly if you let him orrow on future allowance and then hold him to the responsibility of paying it back. But if you find it's taking a long time to repay the debt, don't hesitate to wipe it out. The next time he borrows from you he may do better-and that's what training is all about!

3. Your example. One of the strongest factors in your child's training in money management will be the example you set him. Do you tend to rely heavily on credit cards and charge accounts even when you have the cash? Does your family budget



provide a realistic balance between cash for day-to-day needs, including emergencies, and money banked in either a savings or checking account? To deal effectively with sudden emergencies and

substantial amounts of cash, it's a good idea to have \$500 or at least \$200 in travelers checks right at home. Put them in a safe place and keep



track of their serial numbers because unlike cash-they are quickly refundable if lost or stolen. First National City Travelers Checks are recom mended since they are available through most banks, can be used in millions of places everywhere, and are refundable "on the spot" in more locations (30,000) than any other travelers cheek.

4. Saving. Open a savings account in his name, and let him keep the passbook so he can watch the totals increase.

A word of warning from the financial experts: don't insist that a youngster of any age save a large slice of his allowance. He needs practice in spending as well as in saving?



WASHINGTON, D. C. - The House of Representatives had a fierce attack of reality last week and defeated by a narrow margin an ill-conceived public works measure which would have duplicated several programs already on the books and two others now pending in the U. S. Senate.

One day of hearing was held in the Banking and Commerce Committee to produce a \$5 billion bill to be spent within 18 months on public projects. Ordinarily, this type of legislation is handled by the Public Works Committee, but since the Banking and Currency Committee has jurisdiction over Housing and Urban Development, it decided to outdo and pile on yet another big spending program to those already in existence.

In a year when politics is so absorbing, the idea of worrying about budget responsibility has about as much appeal as smallpox, but the action last week offers some encouragement.

In the fiscal year just ended the Federal Government spent more than \$27 billion more than it took in from taxes. The estimated deficit for the coming 1973 fiscal year is about the same but the guesses are usually on the low side of both how much will be spent and how much revenue will come in. A guess of a \$40 billion deficit for the fiscal year just beginning is probably more near the
