Eligible Abernathy Adults Are Invited To Enroll In Adult Basic Education Course

Adults residing in the Abernathy area are invited and urged to enroll in the basic education courses being offered by the Abernathy Public School System. Currently, the students enrolled are learning to increase their reading and mathematical fundamental abilities. Classes are held in the junior high school building on Monday and Thursday evenings from 7-9 p.m. Area business men and farmers are encouraged to pass this notice on to their employees. At the present time there are several students working on the High School Equ-ivalency test. This test is commonly referred to as the G. E.D. test.

There are three levels of instruction which cover grade levels 1-8. Normally, after an adult reaches Level III. , work on the G.E.D. test is begun. Interested adults may enroll by coming to the junior high build-ing on Monday or Thursday

At the end of this two minute interval the buzzer will again sound and during the remaining three minutes of each quarter the student coaches may substitute as they wish. During the first four minutes of each quarter, the clock will not be stopped for any violations exc-ept fouls. During the last three

"The Liquor Control Board released figures the other day which must not escape attention. There were 14.685 you-ngsters arrested in Texas last year for violating liquor laws. There were 13,909 convictions. Administrator O. N. Humphreys pointed out that these teen-agers now have police records that could follow them throughout life. Such a record could prevent a youngster from entering college, obtaining a government job, or entering public service.

From this statement I believe we can draw the conclusion that liquor in any form will cause our teen-agers more trouble than they need. So I, as pastor and community citizen. call on all parents to talk to their children and young people about the evils of liquor. Then let's begin to watch what is going on, and try to put a stop to this illegal traffic in


