## County Water Association Organized

The steering committee of the Hale County Water Association met in the Hale County Agriculture Center Thursday evening February 21, 1969. There were about 40 people present. The acute need for a county organization to make the general public aware of the overall water problem was stressed. Knowledgeable people present pointed out that the magnitude of cost on importation of water to West Texas was so great that it will take 100% support to merit the huge expenditure. In sort, we West Texans will have to sell the State and Federal government on the benefits of this program to the nation. The steering committee is organizing a "Hale County Water Association" to accomplish this goal. Two directors will be selected from each commissioner's precinct, and three directors at large. A meeting is planned at Hale Center March 6 to select officers. The general public is invited to attend this meeting. A copy of the By-Laws and other information can be obtained from Hopy Toler at Struve Hardware and Dry Goods.

A small group of Hale County residents voted unanimously to form the Hale County Water Association at a meeting in Hale County Agriculture Center Thursday night.

Purpose of the group is to help promote a water importation plan for West Texas and Eastern New Mexico.

General purposes listed for the organization include bringing together persons and agencies interested in water importation to provide an educational program on water importation, and to encourage legislation on a state and national basis on water importation.

Bruce Rigler, acting as chairman of the meeting, said a steering committee set up to work on the organization felt there were two main reasons for organizing a county water association.

"We need an identifiable agency to speak for the residents of Hale County, and we need an agency to work with other groups to promote water importation," he said.

After plans to organize the association persons at the meeting set dues in the association at \$10 a year and decided to

meet on March 6 to elect directors for the organizations and vote on by-laws.

The group decided to provide for 11 directors and a president elected by members of the organization at large.

Each Hale County Commissioner's precinct would elect two directors, while three would be elected at large with the president.

Rigler appointed representatives from each precinct to set up precinct meetings to elect two directors, and persons at the meeting agreed to elect a president and three at-large directors at the March 6 meeting.

Dick Godwin, a director of Water, Inc. and organizer of the Deaf Smith County Water Association in Hereford, met with the group and urged formation of the water agency.

"I would like to see a grassroots organization throughout the area," Godwin said. "We must sell this project to our own people in order to sell it to the nation. We've got to act."

In answer to a question from the floor, Godwin said he thought the major problem in water importation is education. "I don't think people realize the

urgency of it."

Continuing, he said "If we wait too long, we will lose our economy to the point where the project no longer will be able to pay for itself and then we won't be able to get money for it."

**Cites Reasons**  
John Akin, a Hereford attorney, cited a similar need in commenting on reasons for formation of a water association.

"Each county needs a water association because problems are not the same in each county, there will be a need for representation in specific areas, and we need to sell the plan now, when everyone is aware of problems. If we wait too long, we will not have the economic stamina to get the plan through Congress."

Godwin told the group that studies on availability of water from the Mississippi River area, and on the importation line itself should be completed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Bureau of Reclamation in 1971 and 1972. "And we should be ready to go to the legislature when the plans are released."

Mr. Greenlee was born Dec. 11, 1895, in Newton, Miss. He came to Stephens County, Texas, and moved to Abernathy in 1942. Mr. Greenlee was a member of the Methodist Church and the American Legion. He was a veteran of World War I.

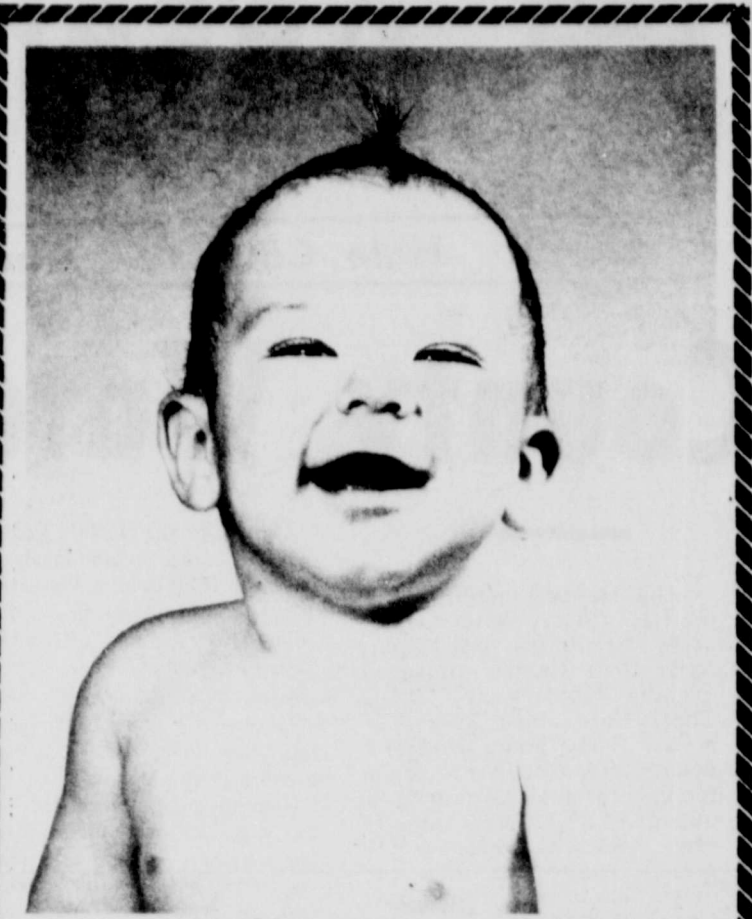
