

The stallion that died was the sire of Diamond Snowcap, also owned by Ercell and Jerry Givens. Diamond Snowcap was named the World Champion Cutting Horse at the App-aloosa Horse Show in Las Vegas, Nev., last year. Mark Ellare, who rode Diamond Snowcap at the Las Vegas Show, also rode that animal in the grand entry at the rodeo. The Givens had nine Ap-
