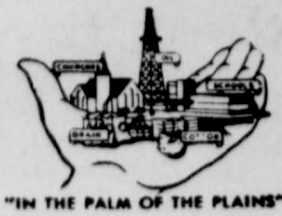

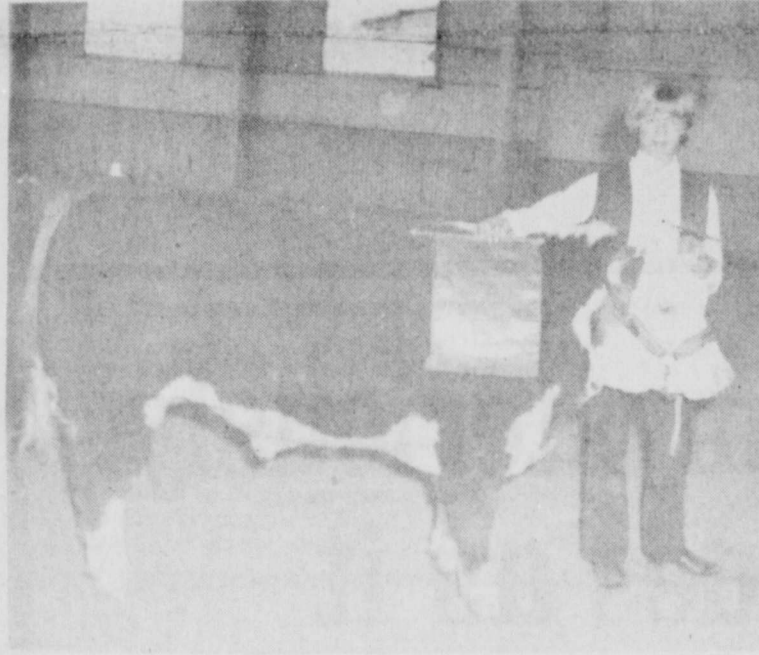

Two Abernathy Girls Have Show Winners



Lynn Riley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Riley showed the Grand Champion Steer in the South Plains Junior Livestock Show in Lubbock last week. The prize winning steer placed first in the Heavy Weight Class of Herefords. The judge had little trouble placing Lynn and her calf in first place, making his first place decision almost as soon as the calf walked in the show ring.

Lynn named her calf "Brugus" being first place was nothing new to Lynn and Brugus because she placed first in the medium weight class of Herefords in the Amarillo show in January of this year. Then during the local 4-H and F. F. A. project show she showed Brugus again and walked away with the Grand Champion Trophy. Lynn's brother, Clark, showed the Grand Champion Hereford at the Lubbock Show in 1965, and her sister, Leigh, showed the Reserve Grand Champion Angus in 1966.

Terri Sinclair, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Sinclair, was selected by the local 4-H club as their Princess. By winning this honor she was allowed to compete in the Princess Contest in Lubbock for 4-H Princess of the South Plains Junior Livestock Show. Terri was her usual charming and pretty self and was selected by the judges as the winner. Terri is a junior in Abernathy High School where she

is an honor student. She is secretary of the Junior Class, was a member of the Junior Play Cast and has been a cheerleader for three years. She was also a member of the Varsity Girls Basketball Team, and member of The Antelope Band. Terri serves as chairman for the 4-H County Council. She has also been a winner in the 4-H District Dress Revue.



Debra Ann Thomas, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold W. Thomas, showed the Reserve Grand Champion Steer in the South Plains Junior Livestock Show in Lubbock last week. Debra's steer, known as "Popcorn", placed second in the Heavy Weight Class.

Since Lynn's calf was chosen as first place calf, Debra's calf competed for reserve champion of the breed, which he won. A very few minutes later Lynn's calf was named Grand Champion, and Debra was allowed to compete for reserve champion and won.

The accident also injured Mr. Smith, driver of the car, who was taken to Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, for treatment of head injuries and injury to his chest.

Also injured in the crash was the driver of the other car involved. He is U. S. Akens, 64, of Graham, who also was taken to Methodist Hospital for treatment.

U. S. Navy Recruiting Officer Russell said he has just received word that the Navy can start enlisting 17-year-old boys again.

In the past, a youth had to be 18 before he could gain an active duty in the Navy. Russell explained that the Navy was using information on the new programs in the Navy Recruiting Office in the southern area.

We also have some new programs for high school graduates, said Russell.

AUSTIN, (Special)—State Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon, right, chaired the Texas Senate Water and Conservation Committee as it approved the bulk of a \$9 billion Texas Water Plan last week.

The \$9 billion total for this plan is the largest in the history of the world for such a project. All of this total, except for \$3.5 billion, will be federal money. The plan calls for redistribution of surplus East Texas water and Mississippi River water to arid parts of West and South Texas.

It took the committee thirty minutes to vote out six of these bills. When the committee got to the bill that would authorize issuance of \$3.5 billion in state bonds, Senator Hightower paused to comment

on the importance of the moment. "It isn't every day that you approve a bill with \$3.5 billion in it," Hightower told his committee.

Animals In Event Total 561

Hale County 4-H, Future Farmers of America and Future Homemakers of America members have entered 561 animals in the 34th annual Plainview Stock Show to compete for the more than \$1,500 in prize money.

The annual Plainview Stock Show begins its three-day run Wednesday in Hale County Agriculture Center at Plainview. First contests will be judging of lambs beginning at 2 p. m. and will conclude following the sale of winning livestock which begins Friday at 1 p. m.

A breakdown of entries shows 100 steers, three heifers, 317 hares, and 143 lambs entered in the show.

Judges Are Listed
Show judges are Ray Sims, agricultural agent, Alpine, for the steer division; Bob Moser, Oklahoma State University, Stillwater, swine judge and Allen Turner, San Angelo, lamb judge. All animals entered in the show were to be in the show barns at 5 p. m. today. Sifting of animals too small or too large for competition will begin at 9 a. m. Wednesday.

The registered heifer and steer show will begin at 6:30 p. m. Wednesday. Swine judging will begin at 9 a. m. Thursday. Friday events include the selling of pigs not in the prize-winner auction sale at 10 a. m. A lunch for prospective buyers will be served at the Agriculture Center at noon. The lunch is sponsored by Fred Garrison Oil Co. and Southwestern Grain Inc.

Auction of prize winning animals will begin at 1 p. m. with auctioneers Raymond Akin and Gene Harris.

The Plainview Stock Show, considered by many to be one of the best area livestock shows, is under the supervision of John Anderson, Stock Show president, and Ollie Linder, general superintendent.

Two-Car Mishap Fatal To Abernathy Woman

A WOMAN was killed and two persons were injured about 4:30 p.m. Saturday in a two-car collision 2.1 miles north of Lubbock, at the intersection of County Road 62 and Quaker Avenue.

Justice of the Peace Wayne Leeroy pronounced Claudia Havins Smith, a 41-year-old Abernathy resident, dead at the scene.

She was a passenger in an automobile driven by her husband, Hilton Morris Smith, 40, who was taken to Methodist Hospital by Aid ambulance.

Also injured in the crash was driver of the other vehicle, Umberson Smith Akens, a 64-year-old grocery store operator from Graham, according to Texas Highway Patrolman Pat Thompson.

Smith and Akens were taken to Methodist Hospital by Aid ambulance where both are listed in serious condition. Smith suffered apparent head injuries and Akens was admitted with head and chest injuries, Thompson said.

Thompson said Smith was headed north on Quaker Avenue and Akens was going west on County Road 62 when the collision occurred. Both vehicles came to rest on the northwest corner of the intersection in a plowed field.

Mrs. Smith had resided in Abernathy 11 years and was a member of the Northside Baptist Church there. She was a former resident of New Deal.

Other survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Robert Kemp of Lubbock; a son, Gary of the home; and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Cowan of Brownwood Lake.
