

There's been confusion when CST changes to DST. Here's one way to remember: "Spring UP", "Fall Back". It means that when Daylight saving time starts in the spring, you set timepieces UP an hour, and when Daylight saving time ends six months later, in the fall, you set timepieces BACK an hour.

Mr. and Mrs. Delbert Overstreet of Eldorado received word at II a. m. Saturday. March 29, that their son, David Devance, had been killed in Vietnam on the preceeding Sunday, March 23. A Navy enlisted man, David had been attached to the Marine Corps as a hospital corps-

man at the time of his death. David Dewayne Overstreet was born October 7, 1946 at Gorman, Texas. Later his family moved to Abernathy, north of Lubbock, where David grew up, attending school and graduating from high school there in 1965.

Shortly thereafter he moved with his parents to Eldorado where his father is employed with Haley Transports. After moving here he put in one semester at San Angelo College.
On October 7, 1966 David
enlisted in the Navy for a 4year tour of duty. His initial
training was at San Antonio, followed by San Diego, Hawaii and then back to San Diego. He attained the rank of Sea man 3rd Class, and was being trained as a Corpsman (equivalent to a nurse, caring for the wounded, etc.)

About two months ago David was assigned to a 12 month tour in Veitnam, serving with the Marines. His tragic death occurred two months later while on a patrol. The meager report given his parents stated only that he had been shot in the head from small arms fire and apparently death was in-

Besides his parents, David is survived by two brothers and a sister; also three step-sisters and two step-brothers.

Payment of Federal taxes on gifts is due April 15, the same day income taxes must be paid, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for Northern Texas,

Taxpayers who made gifts during calendar year 1968, or are planning to make gifts in the future, will find answers to many of their gift tax questions in IRS Publication 448, "A Guide to Federal Estate and Gift Taxation.

The Guide summarizes important Federal estate and gift tax laws. It also explains both types of tax and the requirements for filing and paying these returns

Campbell said that the part on estate taxation will be very helpful to taxpayers whose estates may be subject to Federal estate tax and want to make the most beneficial provisions for their heirs.

The booklet may be purchased for 25 cents a copy from the District Director of Internal Revenue or from the Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C. 20402.

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
