

Ralph is a member of Abernathy City Council and is the recently-elected president of Abernathy Chamber of Commerce.



AUSTIN - With the tion of a shot to combat red measles, the total number of cases reported in Texas last year was only one-tenth the number it has been in the past. However, the number of German measles cases continues to climb.

The annual report on Texas morbidity released by the State Department of Health shows that there were 5,204 cases of red measles reported last year compared to 13,411 cases the previous year. Before the vaccine for red measles was used the number of cases a year totaled over 50,000.

There is a vaccine to combat the German measles, but it has not yet been cleared by the federal government for use in the United States. As a result this year's total of 2,923 cases was a marked jump from 1967's 640.

Shows Success

Although the vaccine is not now used in the U.S. several European countries have cleared the way for use and showing some success.

The report's list of 20 diseases and the number of cases reported last year ranged from gonorrhea with 38,415 to the 14 cases of typhoid fever reported in the state.

On the local angle, the total number of Hale County residents who contracted and reported the various diseases last year goes like this: amebiasis, 3 cases; diptheria, 1; gonorrhea, 31; hepatitis, 8; measles (red), 138; pertussis, 10; rubella (German measles), 52; salmonellosis, 1; shigellosis, 1; strep throat (including scarlet fever), 264: syphilis, 8; and tuberculosis, 6.

Statewide drops in the num ber of several of the diseases were recorded including last year's leader, strep throat which include scarlet fever. In 1968 32,263 cases were reported compared to the 37,408 reported in 1967.





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
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

### How You Can See Tornadoes On TV

As you see threatening clouds on the horizon, turn on your TV, either color, or black and white, to Channel 13. Darken the screen to the threshold of blackness, and then switch to Channel 2. Instantaneous streaks across the screen indicate lightning in a nearby thunderstorm. If the streaks become wide bands and linger, a dangerous storm is in the offing which could not only do severe damage but could spawn a tornado. If the screen becomes stark white, head for shelter - quick! A tornado is 20 miles or probably much closer to you. It doesn't matter if there's a program on Channel 2, it spells tornado, because the tornado lightens the screen to make the picture visible.

Why do you turn to Channel 13 and darken it first? "Only because Channel 13 is a 211-megacycle frequency, so far from 55-megacycle Channel 2 there is no interference. Darkening 13 first, then switching to 2 precludes someone turning first to 2, finding it white (a tornado) and unwittingly darkening out the tornado, which is possible on some TV sets.

The 55-megacycle band (Channel 2) is the nearest that TV has to the electrical frequency of the pulse of a tornado. The pulse generator - Mother Nature's own device for setting up an electrical flow - creates the voltage that triggers Channel 2. The pulse generator is a spiraling force of lightning revolving around a vacum core. It sits high in the thunderhead, about 18,000 feet and, if you could see it, would look much like a faraway satellite flashing tiny bluish-purple rays. There is no thunder because the funnel is a vacum chamber. The tornado funnel then, which descends from the pulse generator to the ground, becomes much like a vacuum diode tube. In a tornado, pulses flow from the ground to the pulse generator in the cloud above. This gargatuan vacuum tube, a phenomenon of nature, makes the above detection system work.

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
