

Castor Planting To Get Underway

Castor planting on the Texas High Plains could begin this next week according to castor spokesmen in Plainview.

Approximately 50,000 acres will be planted in castors on the Texas High Plains, castor authorities report. This is 80 to 85 per cent of the amounts planted in 1968, the largest castor production year since castors became a High Plains crop in

Government support price for castors was announced recently at four cents per pound with the current market price holding at 4.5 cents. Castor prices are thought to stabilize before fall and at not under the present 4.5 cents, castor officials

Reason for the reduced price, down one cent per pound since the fall of 1968, is the world production which increased by 25 per cent over 1967.

Production in Brazil and the United States led to the increase with Brazil producing 375,000 tons in 1968 compared with 1967 production of 215,000 tons. Castor production in Brazil for 1969 is expected to top the 385,000 ton mark.

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
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
