

Abernathy Band Tops At Festival

The Antelope Band carried off all the honors at the Canon. City, Colorado Festival on Saturday and Sunday, being awarded trophies for the best playing band, the best marching band, and outstanding band in its class. This topped off the biennial trip, made possi-ble by the sale of magazine and newspaper subscriptions.

Events included parade ma-rching and field show marching; out of a possible 300 points, the Antelope Band was graded 280; Pawhuska, Oklahoma, 258; Lamar, Colorado, 244; and Gunnison, Colorado, 229. Other bands in the class of 250 to 750 school enrollment were: Dalhart, Texas; Florence, Colorado; Sheridan, Colorado; and Los Animas, Colorado. Abernathy and Pawhuska competed in the finals. Winner of outstanding award in the large high school class was Westminster, Colorado; and in the small class, Stratford, Texas.

The band, 128 strong, with ten sponsors, left Abernathy on Friday morning and visited the Air Force Academy and the Garden of the Gods in Colorado Springs on the journey to Canon City. Saturday morning the students took a tour of the Colorado State Penitentiary. After marching competition in the afternoon, a trip was made

to the Royal Gorge. Sunday morning was reserved for church attendance, then another street parade was held in the afternoon, followed by the finals in field show competition. Judges were college band directors from Colorado and Kansas.

FARMERS ASKED TO FILL IN REPORT

During the last half of May, some 40,000 Texas farmers will receive at their mailboxes a most important questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin.

County Agent, Ollie Liner, says it will be the annual acreage survey and that many farmers in Hale County will be included in the 40,000. The information derived from the replies will be the basis for the official estimates of crop acreage for the State of Texas and for each county.

Cary D. Palmer, state st-atistician for the Texas Reporting Service, emphasizes
the importance of getting
back just as many of the 40,000 questionnaires as possible
so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture, Palmer adds.

The Texas Legislature, explains the county agent, has provided a program of estimates for each county. Because Texas covers such a wide area, state totals alone do not provide adequate information on our most basic industry; hence, the need for county information. The program is a cooperative effort of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The county agent urges all farmers in the county who receive the questionnaire to fill it out accurately and completely and return it as soon as possible to the Reporting Service.

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




