

Armed Forces Day Program Set At Reese

An open house, flyovers, displays and exhibits will highlight Reese Air Force Bases' 20th observance of Armed Forces Day

The open house, scheduled from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m., is expected to draw some 10,000 persons from the South Plains area to visit the base for the annual event honoring the men and women of the country's Armed Services.

The program was officially proclaimed Thursday by mayor W. D. Rogers Jr.

Top attraction this year is a static display of 12 different armed forces aircraft. It is believed that this is the largest contingent of different aircraft ever assembled at an Armed Forces Day observance at Reese AFB.

The day will be used to officially break ground for the base's new hospital facility, an approximate \$2,000,000 project to be constructed north of the present location.

Of special interest to visitors will be flyovers of training aircraft used at the base including the supersonic Northrop T-38 Talon and the Cessna T-37 Tweetie Bird.

Other events planned include parasail demonstrations, an air rescue demonstration, small arms fire power demonstrations and a number of indoor displays in Hanger P-82.

Hightower said the bill would also provide for counselors and supervisors within the office

The senate also gave voice vote passage to a bill by Hightower which would amend the method of computing average daily attendance in public schools so that students who attend vocational classes for part of the day may be counted as full scholastics.

State funds for local schools are based upon average daily attendance.

Applications For School Switch Due


May is the month for applying for transfer of pupils from one school district to another within Lubbock County, according to Roy Boyd, county school superintendent. June 2 is the last day for filing such applications, he said.

Applications for transfers must be filed at the county supcrintendent's office in the county courthouse during the May transfer period if state per capita funds are to be transferred. Applications must be signed and filed at the county office by parents or legal guardians of the

pupils to be transferred. Districts from which the county superintendent's office handles pupil transfers are Cooper, Frenship, New Deal, Shallowa-ter, Idalou, Roosevelt, Slaton

Boyd emphasized that his of-fice processes only transfers be-tween districts. Transfers of pu-pils within a district, (that is, from one school to another within the Lubbock Independent School District or the Slaton Consolidated Independent School District) are handled at the district's administrative office.







POSTAL RATE HIKE SOUGHT

An "inherited" Postal deficit of \$1. 2 billion is responsible for the proposals to raise the postage bill for residents of Abernathy, Postmaster Lambert said today. Mr. Lambert said e had been advised by Postmaster General Winton M. Blount in Washington, D.C. that the record \$1.2 billion 1970 deficit compelled President Nixon to seek postage rate

increases.
Without higher rates the Deartment will be left with a taggering deficit that would ecome an added public tax

In addition to increasing letter mail from 6 to 7 cents, as proposed by the Johnson Administration, President Nixon also asked that second and third-class mailers help reduce the large postal deficit which would otherwise be paid by axpayers, the Postmaster said.

For bulk third-class mail and most magazines and newsapers, the rates would be inreased 16 percent to 20 percent above today's levels, he noted. These percentages in-clude rate hikes already scheduled by previous action by Congress.

The President's recommended increases will reduce the 970 postal deficit by more han \$600 million. The Postmaster listed these

other details on the proposed ncreases:First-class mail letters and post cards would be increased one cent to 7 cents an ounce and 6 cents a piece, respectively, on July 1, 1969. Air mail postage would remain lo cents. This will yield \$557. million in new revenues. Second class mail a handling charge of 3/10ths percent per iece for circulation outside nome counties would become effective July 1, 1969. This would yield \$15.3 million an-nually and would represent a 12 percent increase in addition to the 8 percent rise scheduled to take effect January 1, 1970. Third-class mail--for single pieces, rates would be increased one cent per piece. This would yield \$12.4 million. For regular bulk third-class, the minimum would be increased to a uniform rate of 4.2 cents January 1, 1970, as contrasted with the present rate of 3.6

The 1970 increases would lift revenues by \$46.8 million
