Grain Association Moves To Lubbock

(From GREATER LUBBOCK, the Hub City Chamber of Commerce magazine for April/ May, 1969.)

Lubbock is the new home of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association. Elbert Harp, executive director of the 8,000-member association, announced today that the GSPA has closed its offices in Amarillo, where the organization had been head-quartered since its inception in 1955.

The association has moved to 1212 14th Street in Lubbock. This will be designated national headquarters of the GSPA, which hopes eventually to open six field offices in all major grain sorghum producing areas of the United States, Harp said.

Harp was named by the board of directors several weeks ago to succeed Bill Nelson of Amarillo as executive director. Nelson, who had held the post since 1957, resigned, effective March 31, to enter private business.

"I couldn't have moved out of the Lubbock area," Harp said, explained the decision to locate the headquarters here. He will commute between his farm home at Abernathy and the Lubbock office.

Harp farms some 1,920 acres. He has obtained a manager to run his farming operation and will devote full-time to the GSPA job. He added, however, that he will continue general supervision of his farming interests.

"I want to make it plain that we will continue to serve our members in the Panhandle," Harp stressed. "We want in the future to put a regional field office in that area which also would cover the grain sorghum area of Kansas and maybe Nebraksa."

In Power Test

Rep. Wayne Wins

Round, Loses One

AUSTIN - A test of power in the House Public Health Committee between Reps. Frances Farenthold of Corpus Christi and Ralph Wayne of Plainview ended with each winning a skir-

Rep. Farenthold was sponsoring a resolution that would direct the Public Welfare Department to coordinate a program to raise funds from individuals, businesses and foundations to help the state in welfare assistance.

The resolution notes that the present constitutional limit on welfare payments in the state is \$60 million a year and voters in 1968 turned down a proposal to raise this to \$75 mil-

HCR 128 also notes that a proposed ceiling of \$80 million will be considered by voters August 5 of this year.

Mrs. Farenthold argued that the money is not nearly enough to take care of the needy and proposed that the Public Welfare Department look to other avenues.

Rep. Wayne objected, saying that industry is already contributing through many other charitable funds. He said that the Red Cross, United Fund and other organizations were already performing this service and he doesn't think that the taxpayers" money should be spent to ask them to contribute again.

Mrs. Farenthold won the first skirmish when the committee refused to table the resolution 4-4 on a proposal by Wayne, Wayne, however, won the second battle when the committee voted to send the bill to a subcommittee under the automatic rules by refusing to suspend the rules 5-4.

Hale County has 18 communities which means that each community needs to raise something less than \$1,-000.00. Farmers will receive the first direct benefit from surface water, therefore the current drive to raise this \$15,000.00 will be presented to the farmer first. The Hale County Water Association would like to see each farm owner and/or operator contribute at least \$25.00 to this drive.
