

cedures previously followed. Instead of applying to the county superintendent of schools for transfer of pupils from one district to another within the county, parents or guardians must apply to the superin-tendent of the district to which

the pupil is to be transferred. All parents or guardians who had planned to apply before 5 p.m. Monday to the county superintendent's office for transfer of pupils, or who already made application, should contact superintendents of the district to which they wish the pupils transferred as soon as possible, according to Roy Boyd, county school superintendent.

Superintendent At New Deal Resigns

Superintendent Barnett D. Mann of New Deal Indepen-dent School District officially resigned his position at a call-meeting of the school board on Monday, May 26, 1969. This resignation will become effective on June 30, 1969.

Mann's present contract was not to expire until June 30, 1971. However, he asked to be released from this contract so that he could accept the position of superintendent of schools of the Graham Independent School District. A three year

contract was accepted by Mann at the Graham system.

Before Mann moved to the New Deal School District, he had been classroom teacher in Belton Schools and also within the Killeen School District. He served as high school principal in the Groesbeck School System for three years, from there he went to Nocona and served there for three years as high sc-hool principal. He was superintendent of Gold-Burg for three years and has been superintendent of New Deal for the past two years.

Hale 'County has 18 communities which means that each community needs to raise something less than \$1, -000.00. Farmers will receive the first direct benefit from surface water, therefore the current drive to raise this \$15,000.00 will be presented to the farmer first. The Hale County Water Association would like to see each farm owner and/or operator contribute at least \$25.00 to this drive. 


