



Students who live in the country will be eligible to ride school buses one way. The kindergarten sessions will be from 8-45 until 11-20 and from 12:45

8:45 until 11:30 and from 12:45 until 3:30. Morning students may ride buses to school but will not be allowed to stay past
11:30 dismissal time. Afternoon
students will be eligible to ride

A bilingual kindergarten means that instructions will be given in each class in two languages--Spanish and English (example: a story may be told by the teacher in Spanish one time and English the next time). The students will not be separated according to their ethnic groups but all students will be placed by random grouping.

The primary objective of bilingual education is to make each student a bilingual student, able to converse and conceptionize in both languages.

There will be four morning and four afternoon sessions of kindergarten and these will be located in the west wing of the elementary building. Two classes will result from remodeling the north side of the all purpose room adjacent to the new elementary school library, the lastest equipment and techniques will be used in the classes. No actual reading will be taught but this will be a 9-month readiness program. Equipment will include language masters, cassette tape players, and installation of closed circuit television.

Abernathy feels very proud to have been selected as one of 78 school nationwide to institute this exemplary type of program. There were 16 schools in Texas chosen but only 12 approved on the final applications. Abernathy will become the first school in the West Texas area to have a free public kindergarten for all students and parents are encouraged to give careful consideration to enrolling their 5-year olds in HABLA.

A YOUTH LOOKS AT HER COMMUNITY

Community, what is a community? According to Webster's Dictionary, a community is a body of people living in the same place or region; hence, the region itself. But what Mr. Webster did not include in his definition is the peoples' feelings of friendliness, kindness, and concern for fellow neighbors sharing the same type of life and interests, with the common occupations of farming and tending small businesses, the families of our community would be quite isolated if it were not for these strong bonds. We like to think that New Deal is a family in itself, trying to keep pace with this hurry-up space-age world.
What does a community mean to its youth? It is his back

ground and his feeling of security. It forms his hopes and dreams for the future. We should look at this community and its relationship to its youth. From the beginning of his school years many interests are provided for a youngster, such as scouting, baseball, school programs and parties, and church activities. Entertainment provides the charge which a community needs for growth. There is a great need for more entertainment for the youth of our area. Of course, we have a good school program, but this is only for part of the year. What we need is a gathering place where young people can eat and visit when there is nothing else planned. The hours of business should fit the needs of the customers. This type of attraction would also be an economical benefit to the community. We also need such things as tennis courts, a swimming pool and a geenage community center. This center should be adequately sponsored and should offer facilities for soft drinks, games, and dancing. These are only a few ideas for more interests to keep our youth in their own

The educational system in our community is sound and adequate to prepare the students for college, but it lacks vocational training for those who do not plan to attend college. Industrial arts could be the answer to this situation as this type of training equips a student with knowledge to pursue a particular vocation. Distributive Education is another type of business training for students. This would not be available for our school until more industry is brought n-

Now we shall consider the associated electrons of a community -- first the churches. There should be enough denominations to meet the religious needs of the people. The youth must look to the church for spiritual and moral leadership. A strong church program is an essential element for a stable

A great need for this community is more industry to provide jobs for young people. Most people do have to work for a living and young people have to learn responsibility by working. This would also help to strengthen our community finan-lustered cotton. cially as well as keep our youth occupied while gaining knowledge and experience. Lower taxes and cheaper land should be good incentives for developing some industries here.

The incorporation of New Deal into a town would make

many of these ideas possible, and who knows but what this may become a reality in the future. My task would be an impossible one if I were called upon to solve all the problems involved here and provide the ways and means of accomplishing these aims, but perhaps I have helped to formulate ideas for others who have the ability and opportunity to make these ventures successful.

Just as the atom must contain all of its components to be complete, so must a community contain all of its parts which I have listed, to be effective. If we look to the future and work toward building an even better community for our youth, then we will not lose a step in our program for progress.
