Abernathy Pair Killed In Wreck

** * * * * * * *

An Abernathy woman and her grandson were killed in Lubbock about 9:40 a. m. Saturday when the car in which they were riding was struck by a Santa Fe freight train at a crossing in the 1600-block of Erskine Road.

Justice of the Peace F. H. Bolen pronounced Mrs. Louisa Olguin, 50, of Abernathy, and her 2-year-old grandson Al-samo Olivas, of Rt. 1, Abernathy, dead at the scene.

Driver of the car, Mrs. Margarita Olivas, 30, of Rt. 1, Abernathy, and her other son, David, age not listed, were uninjured, police said.

Victims Thrown Out

Police said the Olivas vehicle was headed west on Erskine Rd. and the train was going south when the collision occurred. The left front of the locomotive struck the right front of the auto, spinning it to the left, according to police reports.

The right front door of the auto flew open and the victims were thrown out of the car, police said, with young Olivas striking the side of the train and Mrs. Olguin landing beneath the

still-moving train.

The child was carried 99 feet south from the point of impact and parts of Mrs. Olguin's body were found 154 feet south of the crossing, police said.

One witness to the mishap, W. R. Butcher of Rt. 2, Lubbock, said Mrs. Olivas had pulled to a stop at the track but the front of the car apparently was sticking out over the track and the train

J. H. Martin. conductor on the train, said the train was going about 20 miles per hour when the collision occurred.

Warning lights at the crossing began flashing when the train still was 1,800 feet from the intersection, according to police

The double fatality raises the death toll to 69 on the South Plains, 14 in the city, and 20 in the county this year. At this time last year, 41 persons had died in traffic mishaps in the




