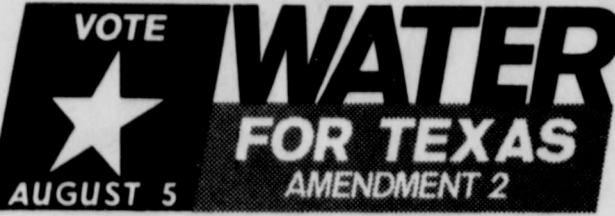

"Time For Decision" FILM TO BE SHOWN IN COMMUNITY MEETING JULY 21

The Abernathy Chapter of Young Farmers will show a new film "Time for Decision" at a community and area meeting in the Abernathy School Cafeteria, July 21, 1969 at 8 p.m. Produced by Walter, Inc., the 27 minute color movie tells of the role water has played in the development of Texas and of the need for additional supplies to meet future requirements. The film is keyed on the Texas Water Plan.

The Texas Water Plan, among other features, proposes to move surplus water from East Texas and the lower Mississippi River to the High Plains. It is designed to meet the water needs of the state over the next 50 years.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment No. 2 authorizes the Texas Water Development Board to issue \$3.5 billion in bonds to finance Texas share of the cost of the Texas Water Plan.

Every resident, property-owner, businessman of Abernathy and the High Plains should be present at this meeting.

REMODELING SET AT SCHOOL HERE

The Board of Education of the Abernathy Independent School District met in regular session Tuesday, July 1, at 8:00 p.m. Reports presented were budget progress report for 5/6 of the school year and tax collection report by Earl Carter showing that 98.19% of the current roll has been collected. Superintendent Webb presented a report concerning the enrollment, instructional program, professional and auxiliary personnel changes for the 1968-69 school year.

A thorough study was made of the legislative action that was signed into law that will go into effect at the beginning of the 1969 school year. A report on the recent Board of Equalization was given showing that there was a substantial loss in taxable values due primarily to the close of Southwestern Public Service Tucco Plant.

The Board contracted Thomas Y. Pickett and Co., as valuation engineers for the 1969-70 school year to evaluate industrial properties as they have in the past.

Bids were opened and contracts were awarded to Hunter Mill Works to Lubbock for remodeling for the two kindergarten rooms and to Video Electronics System, Inc. of Lubbock for the closed circuit television system that will be installed in the west wing of the elementary school building.

Personnel resignations accepted were those of Robert Higginbotham, junior high coach, and LaRita Galloway, elementary teacher. Personnel employed by the Board included Jerry Bartley, band; Fannie Gough, English; Ann McLean, elementary; Marie Strickland, elementary; and Steve Hill, boys' boys' coach and teacher. Vacancies to be filled are high school English, librarian, girls' basketball coach, junior high coach, and two bilingual kindergarten teachers.

The Board accepted the bid of the First State Bank of Abernathy as the school depository for the next biennium.

Also discussed was the change in values as set by Hale County which will decrease the money the local school receives from the state minimum foundation program.

In other formal action August 4 at 8:00 p.m. was set as the date for the formal budget hearing for the 1969-70 school budget.

Those in attendance at the meeting were: L. J. West, president; Billie Harrison, vice-president; Joe Lovelace, secretary; J. H. Myatt, Joe Oswald, David Pinsky, Bob Riley, also present were Delwin Webb, superintendent of schools, and Earl Carter, business manager. Next regular meeting will be August 4, 1969.

Re-stock Catfish Added To Tanks On Mike Leon's Farm

The four fishing tanks on Mike Leon's farm on FM 400 east of Abernathy are being restocked on a weekly basis with catfish from downstate. The latest was a load of fish placed in the tanks about 3 a.m. Sunday. The re-stock fish range from about two pounds to four pounds. At least one fish placed in the tanks Sunday morning weighed near six pounds.

Leon opened the four earth tanks for public fishing earlier this year, and the venture is "catching on". Fishermen line the rims of the tanks on weekends, and the long daylight hours after work bring fishermen there all during the week.

Shaded picnic tables are provided, there's a concession stand, a lighted area and restrooms.

Safety Hasn't Kept Pace on Farm, President Notes

President Nixon, in signing a proclamation designating July 20-26 as Farm Safety Week, noted that although American agriculture has made great strides in production it nevertheless remains the nation's third most hazardous industry.

Mr. Nixon stated that "the strong hands and management skills of our farm people have dramatically increased farm production," and observed that "American agriculture has advanced more in the past 50 years than in all prior history."

"A third as many farmers," Mr. Nixon noted, "are feeding twice as many Americans today as in 1920."

"In addition, America is the world's largest exporter of agricultural products, and our abundance is a powerful force for world peace."

While their accomplishments have dramatically increased production, Mr. Nixon said, "our farm people have suffered a tragic toll of accidents."

The President emphasized that agriculture continues to rank third among American industries in accidental death rate.

"Thousands of farm residents," Mr. Nixon said, "are fatally injured every year and hundreds of thousands disabled. The dollar cost to the nation approaches \$2 billion, but the cost in pain, grief and suffering cannot be measured."

"This terrible waste demands our urgent attention," Mr. Nixon said. "It can be sharply reduced if everyone working in agriculture makes safety an integral part of management planning, a part of every job and every activity, both on and off the job."

Mr. Nixon called on all farm families, and those persons and groups serving or allied with agriculture, to use all possible means for minimizing accident losses at work, in homes, at recreation, and on public roads.

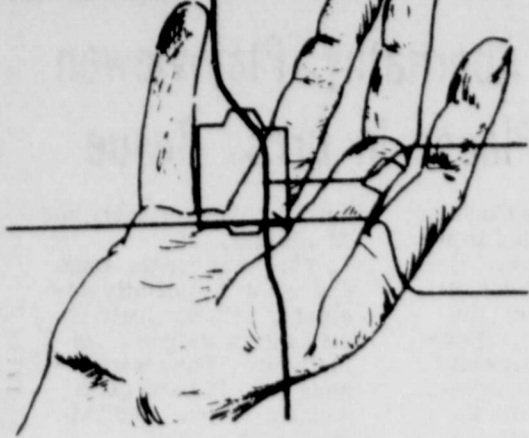
EMPLOYED IN DALLAS

PARADE ROUTE WILL BE 2 MILES FOR ABERNATHY - 60

Bilingual Project Begins In September At Abernathy School

H A B L A -- Helping Advance Bilingual Learning in Abernathy is the title given by the Abernathy Schools to the bilingual education program which will be instituted in the local schools September 1969. Assistance for this program is in the form of a federal grant and although funded only one year at a time the program extends over a five-year period. The program will be a bilingual kindergarten for the first year and will be open to children within the Abernathy School District who will be five years of age on or before September 1, 1969. For enrollment purposes birth certificates will be necessary and certificates showing proper inoculations and vaccinations or permits from the parents allowing the county health nurses to administer the necessary immunizations.

The program will be completely voluntary with all materials and equipment to be furnished by the local schools. Actual registration procedures will be given through the Abernathy Weekly Review, later this summer. Tentative registration dates will be August 18-22 and August 29.

Students who live in the country will be eligible to ride school buses one way. The kindergarten sessions will be from 8:45 until 11:30 and from 12:45 until 3:30. Morning students may ride buses to school but will not be allowed to stay past 11:30 dismissal time. Afternoon students will be eligible to ride buses home on regular bus route.

A bilingual kindergarten means that instructions will be given in each class in two languages--Spanish and English (example: a story may be told by the teacher in Spanish one time and English the next time). The students will not be separated according to their ethnic groups but all students will be placed by random grouping.

The primary objective of bilingual education is to make each student a bilingual student, able to converse and comprehend in both languages. There will be four morning and four afternoon sessions of kindergarten and these will be located in the west wing of the elementary building. Two classes will result from remodeling the north side of the all purpose room adjacent to the new elementary school library, the latest equipment and techniques will be used in the classes. No actual reading will be taught but this will be a 9-month readiness program. Equipment will include language masters, cassette tape players, and installation of closed circuit television.

Abernathy feels very proud to have been selected as one of 78 school nationwide to institute this exemplary type of program. There were 16 schools in Texas chosen but only 12 approved on the final applications. Abernathy will become the first school in the West Texas area to have a free public kindergarten for all students and parents are encouraged to give careful consideration to enrolling their 5-year olds in H A B L A.

The couple was honored with a reception in the church parlor following the ceremony.

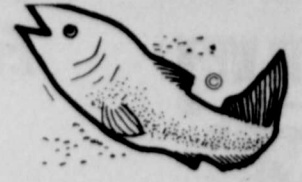

corded material and must rely on living sources to help him. Thus the citizens of Hale County are asked to aid him in discovering the origins of names of the county.

Some of the name origins which he has already discovered are as follows:

Abernathy--for Monroe G. Abernathy, who promoted the townsite; Boone--(now Halfway)--for J. L. Boone and his son, who had an early-day store there; Cotton Center--for the major crop grown there, cotton; Hale Center--for its location in the center of Hale County; Petersburg--for Mrs. Margaret Peters, who established the post office there; Plainview--for its location on high ground which affords a magnificent view of the Plains.

Other name origins which he has been unable to find are the following: Hale County; Alley, Bellview Church, Blackwater Draw, Callahan Draw, Ferguson, Happy Union, Heath, Mayfield, Sturdivant Airfield (private), Underwood, Valley View Church, Watson and Wright.

If any of our readers know the story of how the above places were named, please send your information to Donald A. Gill, 11135 Shortmeadow Lane, Dallas, Texas 75218. Credit will be given in the study to those who contribute information.

Gill Seeks Information

Mr. Donald A. Gill, professor of English at El Centro College in Dallas, is preparing a study of the origins of the names of all towns, rivers, creeks, and other place names on the map of thirty-eight counties of the Panhandle-South Plains of Texas. Hale County is one of those included in the study. The study will serve as his dissertation for the Doctor of Philosophy degree in Linguistics from East Texas State University and will also be published in book form at a later date.

Gill, a fellow West Texas from Ropesville, received his Bachelor of Arts degree from West Texas State University in 1960 and his Master of Arts degree from the University of Colorado in 1966.
