

"Time For Decision" FILM TO BE SHOWN IN COMMUNITY MEETING JULY 21

The Abernathy Chapter of Young Farmers will show a new film "Time for Decision" at a community and area meeting in the Abernathy School Cafe . teria, July 21, 1969 at 8 p.m. Produced by Walter, Inc., the 27 minute color movie tells of the role water has played in the development of Texas and of the need for additional supplies to meet future requirements. The film is keyed on the Texas Water Plan.

The Texas Water Plan, amoung other features, proposes to move surplus water from East Texas and the lower Mississippi River to the High Plains. It is designed to meet the water needs of the state over the next 50 years.

Proposed Constitutional Amen. dment No. 2 authorizes the Texas Water Development Board to issue \$3.5 billion in bo-nds to finance Texas share of the cost of the Texas Water Plan.

"Stuff piles up or is strewn about, offering an open invitation to fires-not to mention falls, cuts, bruises, shocks, splinters, and poisonings," Burke says.


Preventive measures, Burke says, are relatively simple if done routinely:

-Keep buildings free of unneeded combustible material and accumulations of chaff, straw and dust.

-Rid the farmstead of dry weeds, brush and old lumber. -Keep paint rags in metal containers.







-Keep small quantities of fuels in sturdy, well-marked metal containers.

-Burn rubbish at a safe distance from buildings and other combustibles, and only when the wind is calm.

-Check electrical systems and make necessary repairs.

-Watch smoking in buildings.

---Check daily the temperature of newly stored hay.

-Place portable heaters away from anything that could catch fire.

-Place fire extinguishers in buildings, and on tractors, selfpropelled harvesting machinery and trucks.
