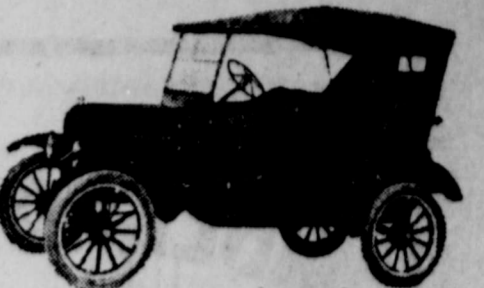

Five Are Injured In Friday Wreck

A two-car collision injured five persons here Friday at 4:45 p.m. The accident occurred at the intersection of Farm Road 597 and the west service road of Highway 87, according to Eldon Sparkman, Abernathy policeman.

Injured were David Eugene McCall, 17, of Hobbs, N.M., and his sister, Marcia McCall, also of Hobbs. Others injured were Saferina O. Baran, 21, of New Deal, and her two daughters, Rachel, 2, and Doree, 1. All were taken to Lubbock Methodist Hospital and treated for cuts and bruises, and released.

Charles Gilliam of Lubbock escaped injury Tuesday morning when his "hobby" truck hit soft shoulder dirt on the East Service Street turned over. The accident happened about 350 feet north of FM 597, according to Police Chief Frank D. Russell.

Bilingual Project Begins In September At Abernathy School

H A B L A --Helping Advance Bilingual Learning in Abernathy is the title given by the Abernathy Schools to the bilingual education program which will be instituted in the local schools September 1969. Assistance for this program is in the form of a federal grant and although funded only one year at a time the program extends over a five-year period. The program will be a bilingual kindergarten for the first year and will be open to children within the Abernathy School District who will be five years of age on or before September 1, 1969. For enrollment purposes birth certificates will be necessary and certificates showing proper inoculations and vaccinations or permits from the parents allowing the county health nurse to administer the necessary immunizations.

The program will be completely voluntary with all materials and equipment to be furnished by the local schools.

Actual registration procedures will be given through the Abernathy Weekly Review. Later this summer, tentative registration dates will be August 18-22 and August 29.

Students who live in the country will be eligible to ride school buses one way. The kindergarten sessions will be from 8:45 until 11:30 and from 12:45 until 3:30. Morning students may ride buses to school but will not be allowed to stay past 11:30 dismissal time. Afternoon students will be eligible to ride buses home on regular bus route.

A bilingual kindergarten means that instructions will be given in each class in two languages--Spanish and English (example: a story may be told by the teacher in Spanish one time and English the next time). The students will not be separated according to their ethnic groups but all students will be placed by random grouping.

The primary objective of bilingual education is to make each student a bilingual student, able to converse and comprehend in both languages.

There will be four morning and four afternoon sessions of kindergarten and these will be located in the west wing of the elementary building. Two classes will result from remodeling the north side of the all purpose room adjacent to the new elementary school library, the latest equipment and techniques will be used in the classes. No actual reading will be taught but this will be a 9-month readiness program. Equipment will include language masters, cassette tape players, and installation of closed circuit television.

Abernathy feels very proud to have been selected as one of 78 school nationwide to institute this exemplary type of program. There were 16 schools in Texas chosen but only 12 approved on the final application. Abernathy will become the first school in the West Texas area to have a free public kindergarten for all students and parents are encouraged to give careful consideration to enrolling their 5-year olds in H.A.B.L.A.

Greenbugs Spotted In Grain Sorghum

Greenbug infestations in grain sorghum are beginning to increase over much of the High Plains area and farmers are to inspect their fields frequently to detect any damage from the tiny green pests.

That word comes from Lyndon Almond Extension area entomologist located at the Texas A & M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center north of Lubbock.

"We are finding greenbugs mainly on the underside of leaves with some reddening showing as a symptom of damage," says the entomologist. "It's important to remember that the extent of greenbug damage depends on vigor and stage of growth, moisture conditions and numbers of beneficial insects."

Guidelines Almond gives these guidelines for determining the necessity for treating for greenbugs. Treat plants from emergence to about six inches high when greenbugs and damage is visible on the leaf surface. Treat plants from the six-inch height to the pre-boot stage before any entire leaves are killed. "Infestations in much of the area are now approaching this stage," points out the entomologist.

CITY BOOSTING AMENDMENT 2

The City Council studied the facts about the Texas water plan and Constitutional Amendment No. Two. The plan provides for the full development of our water resources and the importation of surplus water from the lower Mississippi River for distribution to areas with delinquent water resources. Importation of water is essential for our growth and prosperity.

Amendment No. Two authorizes the Texas Water Development Board to issue \$3.5 Billion in bonds to finance Texas share of the cost of the Texas Water Plan. This money is not to be used to provide gifts or grants, but will provide temporary financing which will be repaid by water users. The Amendment also removes the 4 percent ceiling on Water Development Bonds. A 2/3 vote of the legislature is required before any bond issue can be sold by the Water Development Board.

The Council voted to support the Amendment No. 2 and ask the people of Abernathy to study the plan. What will it mean to you, your neighbors, your City, your county and the State of Texas? What will it mean to our children and their children? On Tuesday August 5, 1969 go to the poles and vote your decisions.

The City started July 1 burying trash. Jack Eason of Hale County commission dug us a pit with our backhoe. This is a temporary, but gives us some experience and ideas what to plan for in the future.

In June the yard made 29 water connections and 24 water disconnections. Part of these were people moving from one house to another house. We did receive 19 water deposits and refunded 15 water deposits, which left us a gain of 4 families for the month.

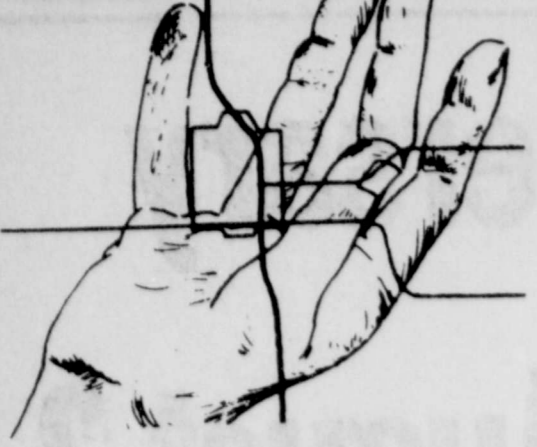

PARADE ROUTE WILL BE 2 MILES FOR ABERNATHY - 60



Gill Seeks Information

Mr. Donald A. Gill, professor of English at El Centro College in Dallas, is preparing a study of the origins of the names of all towns, rivers, creeks, and other place names on the map of thirty-eight counties of the Panhandle-South Plains of Texas. Hale County is one of those included in the study. The study will serve as his dissertation for the Doctor of Philosophy degree in Linguistics from East Texas State University and will also be published in book form at a later date.

Gill, a fellow West Texas from Ropesville, received his Bachelor of Arts degree from West Texas State University in 1960 and his Master of Arts degree from the University of Colorado in 1966. He is the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Benn, 913 1st Street, Abernathy. At this point in his study, Gill has exhausted his sources of recorded material and must rely on living sources to help him. Thus the citizens of Hale County are asked to aid him in discovering the origins of names of the county.

Some of the name origins which he has already discovered are as follows:
Abernathy--for Monroe G. Abernathy, who promoted the town; Boone--(now Halfway)--for J. L. Boone and his son, who had an early-day store there; Cotton Center--for the major crop grown there, cotton; Hale Center--for its location in the center of Hale County; Petersburg--for Mrs. Margaret Peters, who established the post office there; Plainview--for its location on high ground which affords a magnificent view of the Plains.

Other name origins which he has been unable to find are the following: Hale County; Alley, Bellview Church, Blackwater Draw, Callahan Draw, Burgess-on, Happy Union, Heath, Mayfield, Sturdivant Airfield (private), Underwood, Valley View Church, Watson and Wright. If any of our readers know the story of how the above places were named, please send your information to Donald A. Gill, 11135 Shortmeadow Lane, Dallas, Texas 75218. Credit will be given in the study to those who contribute information.
