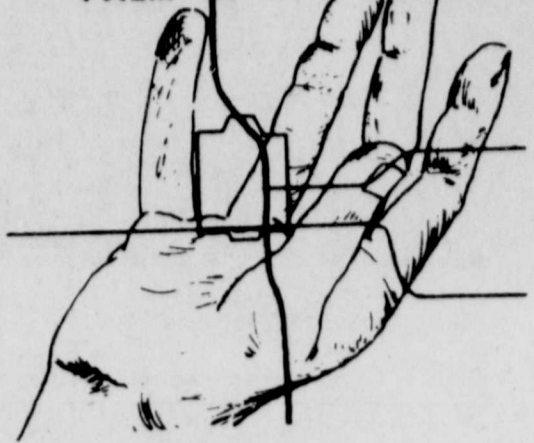

Ted asked that his sincere thanks be expressed to all for their co-operation and help in planning the parade.

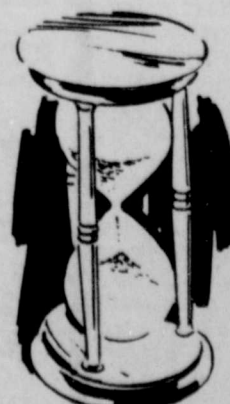

## Goodwin Captures Abernathy Championship In Playoff

ABERNATHY — Johnny Goodwin was consistent on the first hole at Abernathy Country Club Sunday — three pars.

That's one more than Bubba Brooks and Jim Fullingim could negotiate, and it brought Goodwin the championship in the Abernathy Golf Tournament.

The Tulsa Golfer caught fire as the rain descended, then

Petersburg golfer broke the slump, birdied three straight holes and four of the next five. His par-4 on 18 left him in the playoff.

"I caught up on everybody," said Goodwin, concerning his game during the rainstorm, which swept the course in midafternoon. Some foursomes scurried for the clubhouse, but the championship fighters continued. Goodwin's play was even

Brooks At 73

Brooks had an even-par round of 72 for the day, and Fullingim 74.

The golfers had a variety of weather to test their games, with bursts of sunshine, rain, rain and wind, but most of the afternoon's play was under overcast skies. Goodwin made the most of it all.

fell into a three-way championship tie through 18 holes. On the first hole of the playoff, however, he got another par and that was enough for the title.

All At 144

With Goodwin missing a 12 foot par putt on 18 and Brooks and Fullingim getting pars, the three needed a playoff to settle the show. Goodwin's bogey left the three with 144s after Fullingim had led Goodwin by a stroke and Brooks by two going into the day's play.

On the first extra hole, Brooks, the defending champion, hit long on his second shot and Fullingim was short. Goodwin yanked an 8-iron from his bag and dropped his second effort 20 feet from the pin.

Fullingim's chop was short by 17 feet, and Brooks was 12 feet away on his chip. When Goodwin's putt slid three past the cup, the pressure was on his foes to stay in the race. Fullingim came the closer, as his putt hit the cup but jumped on past.

Goodwin stepped over his putt and quickly drilled it for all the marbles.

Fullingim and Brooks played two more holes in deciding second — Brooks won — but Goodwin was along strictly as a spectator and killing time until he could claim his championship merchandise.

Rain Ends

The rain had subsided by the time the threesome went into the playoff, but in the 30-minute span when it pelted the course, Goodwin made his move. In the meantime, Fullingim skyrocketed out of contention and then back into it.

He made the nine-hole turn in the lead but hit out of bounds on 11 and 12, taking triple-bogey 7s on both holes. But the




FAMILIARITY BREDS CONTEMPT

You go back and forth across the same track daily, perhaps several times a day. You have lived here all your life and know that trains only run at night or at a particular time every day.
