School Days are Here Again!

All Faculty Vacancies Filled

SCHOOL BEGINS!!

September 2 at 8:45 all school children will report for the beginning of a new school year, however prior to this time many activities have taken place in preparation for their arrival. The band has been working daily for the past two weeks as have the football boys. The administrative staff and custodians have been planning and making arrangements for the past three months. The teachers will begin reporting on August 25 at which time the bilingual kindergarten teachers and first grade teachers have a two-day work session with Mrs. Dolores Earles of Laredo. The entire staff will report Wednesday, August 27, for a two-day general orientation. Dr. O. R. Douglas, executive director of Region XVII Educational Service Center will be the principal speaker for the first general faculty meeting. Most of the time will be devoted to individual room preparation by the teachers. It is anticipated that the enrollment for the current year will approach 1300 students including the kindergarten. Many new materials and books will be available for use in local schools this year.

SCHOOL TAX RATE GOES UP 15¢; 1,300 ENROLLMENT EXPECTED FOR THE 1969-1970 SCHOOL YEAR HERE

SCHOOL BOARD MEETING

The Board of Education met in regular session August 4, 1969, at 8:00 p.m. in the board room, for the purpose of public hearing of the 1969-70 budget and for routine business of the month. Reports given included tax report showing 98.39% of the current roll as having been collected. A report on the administrator's workshop to be held in Austin September 21-22 was discussed. Progress reports were also given on summer repair work. Bids were opened for gasoline for the 1969-70 school year and the low bid was awarded to Phillips Petroleum Co. The milk bid for the school year went to Bell Milk Co.

In other action the Board appointed Bolinger, Segar & Co. as auditors for the 1968-69 school year and approved Insurnational as the carrier for student insurance for the coming school year.

The budget for 1969-70 was presented, and approved. The budget for 1968-69 was amended and regularly approved. A tax rate increase of 15¢ per \$100 evaluation was approved by the Board. The rate increase was due primarily to loss in school values by the closing of Southwestern Public Service and the loss in state money as a result of Hale County evaluations being raised.

In other action the resignation of Rebecca Anthony as home economics teacher was accepted and new appointments for the school year were accepted as recommended. These were: Carolyn Wade, bi-

NOTICE GIVEN ON FIRST GRADE PUPIL ENROLLMENT HERE

Jerry Moorhead, Abernathy Elementary School Principal, has this reminder for parents whose children will be starting to school for the first time this fall.

They must be six years of age by Sept. 1.

In order to be eligible for enrollment, parents or guardian must produce a certified birth certificate at proof of age of the child. Certified birth certificates may be obtained from the county seat in the county where the child was born. The small, "keepsake" birth certificates issued by the hospital in which the child was born cannot be accepted at official proof of age for the purpose of entering school.

Also, all first grade students as well as students enrolling in any other grade in Abernathy Schools must have a vaccination against smallpox before they will be enrolled.

Scrimmage Set

The Abernathy High Antelopes are in their second week of pre-school practice and according to the coaches spirits are high and the boys are working hard. The coaches are stressing fundamentals in the twice daily workouts, and are pleased with the progress shown by several boys. Line Coach, Max Kennedy expressed it this way: "Our young men have come a long ways in just the one week we've been working. If they will keep this good attitude they have and continue to work, we know they can develop into a good football team."

There have been no major injuries suffered during the first week of practice, but some of the Antelopes are slowed by minor difficulties. Sophomore quarterback, Dave Davenport suffered a slight concussion in Thursday's workout, but is now back going full speed. Junior guard, Larry Deering, has been held out of contact for the past three days until he can recover from an injury to his thigh. Mark Harrison, a running back who will be tried at fullback and halfback, has just about recovered from a shoulder injury suffered before practice began. Rodney Huffaker came up with a broken bone in his right hand and will be held out of action for a couple of weeks. Other than several bruises and sprains, these are the only injuries reported by Coach Luke Nickerson.

The hopes for an outstanding defensive line were bolstered by the reporting to workouts of returning letterman, Louis Olguin. Louis, who weighs 210 pounds could join with three other boys who have been showing a lot of promise to form a defensive "front four" that averages over 200 pounds. After the first week of work, the defensive line looks like this: interior linemen - Larry Pittman, Ronald Harkey, Charles Mathis, Ruwayne Struve, and Olguin are fighting for one of the four positions. The linebacking corp find Larry Turner Monty Hobgood, Jim Forbes, and Travis K-night contesting for three posi-

ons. The defensive secondary is composed of Bobby Klatt, Mike Kerr, Don Snodgrass and Kirk Lane, with Charles Johnson pushing these boys for a starting position.

The offense, as it stands right now, finds Harkey and Snodgrass at ends, Turner and Forbes at tackles, Larry Klafka and Knight at guards, Keith Lambert at center, Klatt at quarterback, Kerr and Lane at halfbacks, and Pittman at fullback. Coach Nickerson emphasized that no one has a starting position cinched and that all boys are being watched closely by the coaches to determine the best eleven. "We will play those eleven boys who show they can help the team the most," Nickerson said. "After school starts next week we will divide the 44 boys we have into a "B" team and a varsity, but right now all are being given a shot at a starting position," the head coach added. Several other boys have impressed the coaches with their hustle and toughness. These include halfback Gilbert Lopez, fullback Danny Cuevas, guard Mike Hedges, and end Gordon Settle.

The Antelopes travel to Slaton Friday night for a scrimmage with the class AAA Tigers. Coach Nickerson stressed that this will be just another workout and no emphasis will be placed on trying to win the scrimmage. "There are certain things we want to see and get on film and we do not consider this a game in any way," he stated. The scrimmage has been tentatively set for 8:00 p.m.

The following week, the Antelopes host Denver City in a scrimmage. This one is set for Thursday, September 4, at the Antelopes home stadium. Following these two scrimmages, the Antelopes travel to Petersburg to open the season against the Buffs who have been picked to win the district.

The freshmen began workouts Monday morning with 24 future Antelope hopefuls reporting. The frosh team will workout only on-

lingual kindergarten; Gracelia Alma Hernandez Ruiz, bilingual kindergarten; Ann Hedges, high school English; Martha Graves, elementary; Gary Campbell, junior high coach and science. Frank Bartlett was approved as a half-time administrative assistant for the junior high school to assist Mr. Adkisson who will also become director of the bilingual kindergarten.

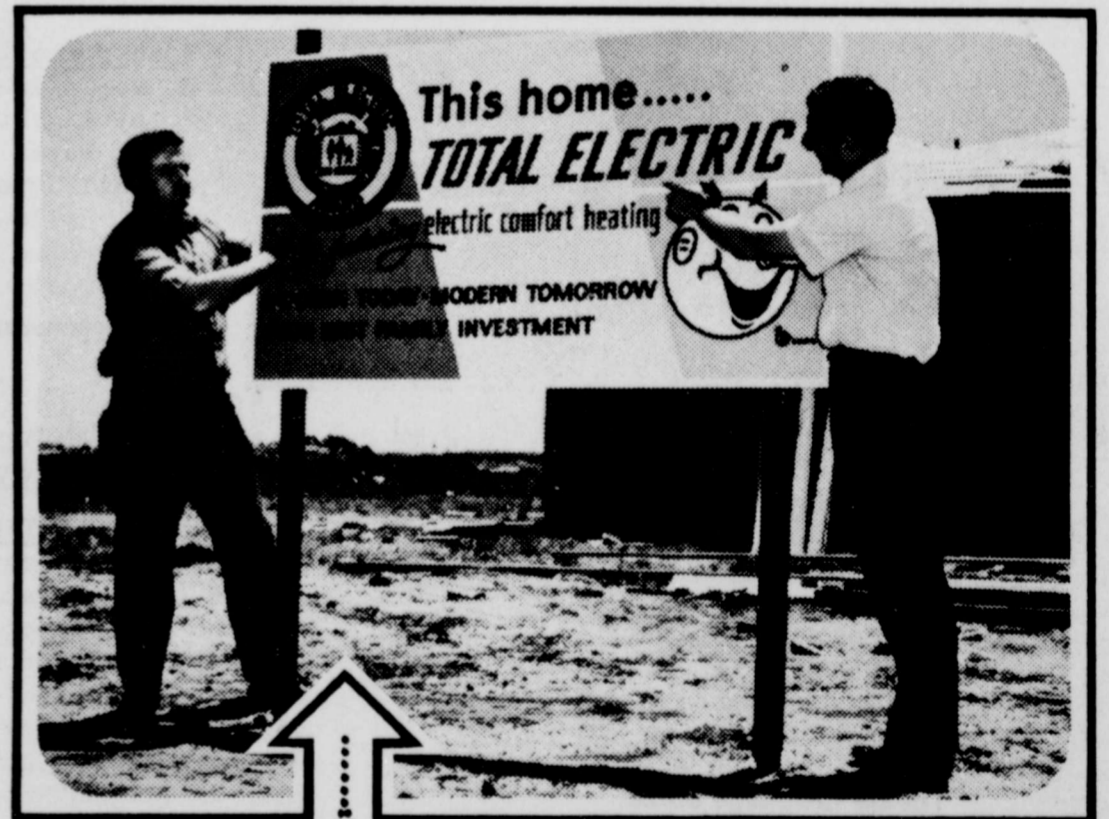

Hale Oil Find Is Completed

Sam Boren of Dallas has completed a Cisco reef lime oil discovery, Sam Boren No. 1 Honolulu-Schulz, re-entry wildcat a few hundred yards west of the Abernathy town section in Hale County. It is on the farm owned by the heirs of the late Mr. and Mrs. Herman Schulz.

Sam Boren also is operator of the oil test well being drilled on the Virgil Halford farm about a mile west of Abernathy.

The strike pumped 130 barrels of 42.6-gravity oil plus 900 barrels of water in 24 hours. Perforations from 9,160-9,163 feet were stimulated with 500 gallons of acid. Gas-oil ratio was 700-1.

The venture was drilled to total depth 11,600 feet in 1969 by Honolulu Oil Corp. A drillstem test at that time from 9,151-9,165 feet recovered 2,010 feet of 39.8-gravity oil. A second test from 9,165-9,185 feet recovered 3,500 feet of oil and gas and 1,800 feet of salt water and mudcut oil and 580 feet of salt water.

The current operation plugged back to 9,200 feet and set five and a half inch casing at 9,237 feet for the completion.

The well is located 1,980 feet from north and 660 feet from east lines of Section 10, Block C-K, GC&SF survey. It is eight miles east of the Anton-Irish (Clear Fork) field.
