
## New Deal Turns Back Anton, 15-8





As ex-residents of Abernathy we thought you might be interested in a few items about us. We have just transplanted ourselves in California here at the University of California at Berkely. Our address is 812 Riley Drive, Albany, Calif. 94706.

Prior to moving, I was at Texas Tech. Although I didn't receive my degree (M.S. in Ag. Eco. with a minor in Mathema- toiletries make fine gifts now tics) until August, I was on the ech Staff during the summer working on an economic "input-output" Study of the State of Texas under contract with he Governers Office.

While enrolled in Tech. Iwas on a Research Assistantship and the Spring of '69 I was also awarded an Ag Eco Fellowship. My thesis topic was "System Analysis Approach to the Selection of Farm Equipment". I wrote a computer program which will select a least cost set of farm machinery (tractors & implements) for a specified farm situation. (Incidently, I had a 4.0 grade point average in my Graduate Work at Tech.)

As you may remember, after three year hitch in the Army part of which was spent in New ersey- we have now lived on ooth the Atlantic & Pacfic Coast) I returned to Tech and was graduated with a B.S. in 1966. From June 1966 til February 19-68 we were in Belton, Texas wh ere I uas with the Agricultural

Extension Service.
We received considerable ribbing from aquaintances because of our projected move to the Be rkeley area - the home of the "Hippies". However, locals tell us that there are signs this movement is on the decline, or at least, is going elsewhere altho-ugh, to us, it is still very mu-ch in evidence.
