Antelopes-Owls Game Is Highlight

PLAYERS OF THE WEEK Two Antelopes were choson by the coaches as defensive players of the week for their performances in the Dimmitt game; but after viewing the game films, the coaches decided that no Antelope player was deserving of honors on offense.

Coach Nickerson stated, "We played as poor a game on offense as we have played all year long. We weren't firing out and blocking, and our backs were hitting the wrong holes. The one bright spot on offense was the run-

ning of Bobby Klact. The two defensive standouts were Ronald Harkey and Larry Turner. This is the third time for Turner to receive the honors and the first time for Harkey. Together, these two seniors accounted for 34 tackles, as Turner got 12 tackles and 6 assists and Harkey 12 tackles and 4 assists. Coach Kennedy said this concerning the defensive play of these two Lopes. "They played a great game on de-fense, holding the Dimmitt backs to their shortest gains of the year. Both Ronald and Larry made some mistakes on defense, but they made up for these with hustle and

hard hitting. Others receiving praise from the coaches for their defensive play were Travis Knight, Johnny Hemphill and Ruwayne Struve.

The Abernathy Antelopes tasted defeat for the first time in district play last Friday night at Dimmitt. The Dimmitt Bobcats, on the rebound from an upset the week before by Olton, passed and ran to a 36-6 decision over the Lopes. It was a night that found the Antelopes in a generous mood as they gave the ball to Dimmitt two times inside the 15 yardline on fumbles and butted two Bobcat passes into the air and right into Bobcat receivers hands. All four of these miscues resulted in Dimmitt touchdowns. The first quarter ended

scoreless for both teams(this was the first time this year that Dimmitt had not scored in the first period), but in the second stanze, the Bobcats quarterback went to the air and bounced two T. D. passes off the hands of Antelope defensive backs and into the arms of goal line bound Bobcat ends. The Antelopes failed to score in the second period when a holding penalty stopped them after they had advanced the ball to the Dimmitt 15 yard line. The half ended with the Lopes trailing

Following the second halfkick off, the Antelopes drove the ball down the field to score their only TD of the game. The score came on a nine yard keeper by Lope quarterback, Bobby Klatt. A Klatt to Snodgrass pass was intercepted to stop the extra point try.

Following an unsuccessful on-side kick, the Lopes forced Dimmitt to punt and took possession of the ball on their own 10 yard line. On the first play, Charles Johnson fumbled and the Bobcats recovered. They scored easily and the Antelopes were never able to

threaten again. Defensively the Antelopes played perhaps their best game of the year. Coach Nickerson said, "I know it sounds silly to say you played good defense when you give up 36 points, but they never were able to sustain a long drive and we made them punt four times. Their great running back, Thomas, was never able to shake loose for a long gain and their passing game was effective only on short passes and the two were could have interecepted so easily. We also picked off two passes, " Nickerson continued

'The most pleasing thing about the game was the way our team fought without ever quitting or giving up, and the way some of youngsters played.



Miss Joyce Burge, director of the Hale County Child Welfare Unit, met first with the Court. She requested and received approval for a transfer of \$4,500

The transfer is the regular method by which the welfare unit receives most of its funds. The transfers are set up at the end of each quarter, but so far, the department has requested only three transfers. Miss Burge also gave a brief report on current child welfare activi-

In other activity, the Court approved a lease agreement between the Farm Bureau and Hale County Airport. Under the agreement, the two groups each will have a 25-year lease on property exchanged, plus a 15year renewal option of the lease.

Lease Provisions The lease agreement provides space for new construction at the airport site. The space covers part of the land owned by the Farm Bureau. At the same time, the Farm Bureau is to receive an easement to cross airport property in order to get to their buildings from the airport




