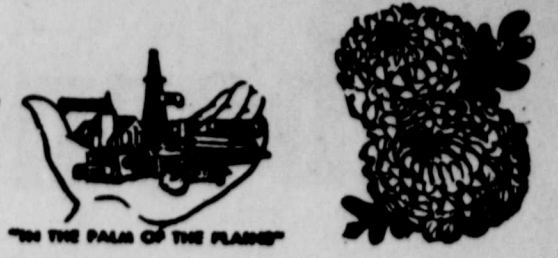

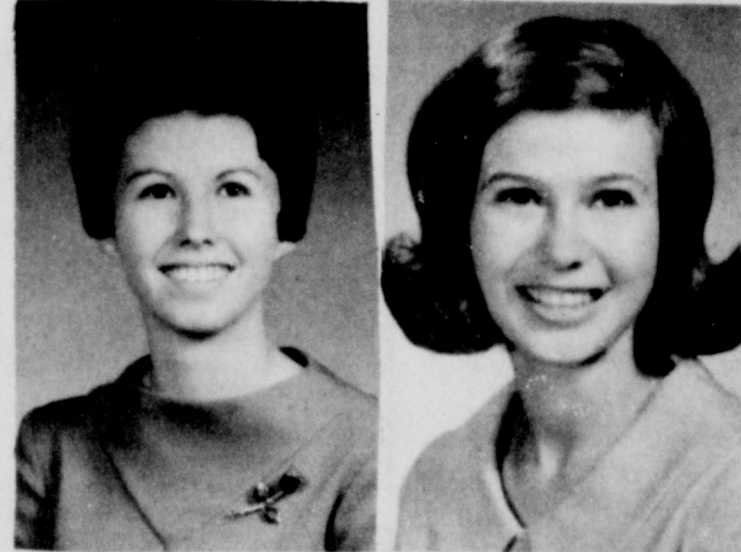
SCOUTS PLANNING LIGHT BULB SALE

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LOSE TO DIMMITT BOBCATS Antelopes-Owls Game Is Highlight

The Abernathy Antelopes tasted defeat for the first time in district play last Friday night at Dimmitt. The Dimmitt Bobcats, on the rebound from an upset the week before by Olton, passed and ran to a 36-6 decision over the Lopes. It was a night that found the Antelopes in a generous mood as they gave the ball to Dimmitt two times inside the 15 yard line on fumbles and butted two Bobcat passes into the air and right into Bobcat receivers hands. All four of these miscues resulted in Dimmitt touchdowns.

The first quarter ended scoreless for both teams (this was the first time this year that Dimmitt had not scored in the first period), but in the second stanza, the Bobcats quarterback went to the air and bounced two T. D. passes off the hands of Antelope defensive backs and into the arms of goal line bound Bobcat ends. The Antelopes failed to score in the second period when a holding penalty stopped them after they had advanced the ball to the Dimmitt 15 yard line. The half ended with the Lopes trailing 14-0.

Following the second half kickoff, the Antelopes drove the ball down the field to score their only TD of the game. The score came on a nine yard keeper by Lope quarterback, Bobby Klatt. A Klatt to Snodgrass pass was intercepted to stop the extra point try.

Following an unsuccessful on-side kick, the Lopes forced Dimmitt to punt and took possession of the ball on their own 10 yard line. On the first play, Charles Johnson fumbled and the Bobcats recovered. They scored easily and the Antelopes were never able to threaten again.

Defensively the Antelopes played perhaps their best game of the year. Coach Nickerson said, "I know it sounds silly to say you played good defense when you give up 36 points, but they never were able to sustain a long drive and we made them punt four times. Their great running back, Thomas, was never able to shake loose for a long gain and their passing game was effective only on short passes and the two were could have intercepted so easily. We also picked off two passes." Nickerson continued "The most pleasing thing about the game was the way our team fought without ever quitting or giving up, and the way some of youngsters played."

The Antelopes play host to the Hale Center Owls this Friday night. The Owls are winless in six tries and this will be homecoming for the Lopes. Even though they haven't been on the winning side, the young Owls have played good football at times and always play their best against Abernathy. This fact should be sufficient to prove that Friday nights contest will be one that will test the Antelopes ability to rebound after an important loss. Spirit has been outstanding on the Antelope field this week and any ex student who attends the game Friday night will be proud of the Antelope team representing their Alma Mater.

The Jr. High Teams of Coach Gary Campbell hosted the Friendship Tigers last week and proved to be gracious hosts, losing the 7th grade game and holding the visitors on an extra point try to tie the 8th grade game.

The Abernathy 7th grade team failed in their fourth attempt to win, as Friendship bested them 20-0. Coach Campbell said, "Although we didn't score, our offense looked much improved over last week's game." The Coach named Don Davis, Billy Teakell, and Kent Harrison as being outstanding on offense. The defensive praise went to Steve Oswalt and David Thomas.

In the eighth grade contest, the Antelopes scored first on a nine yard run by Pat Hedges. David McClendon ran the extra points to give the young Lopes an 8-0 lead. The touchdown was set up by a blocked Friendship punt, with Dwight Hardin doing the blocking.

In the third quarter, Friendship raced 30 yards for a T. D. but the defense, led by Hardin, held them on the extra point try and Abernathy led 8-6. The fourth period found Abernathy pinned in a hole when a Friendship punt went out of bounds on the five yard line. Friendship blocked a punt, Abernathy recovered the ball in the end zone, and the Tigers got a safety and an 8-8 tie.

Both teams played tough defense the last few minutes and the game ended in an 8-8 tie. Last year the score between the two teams was 6-6. Abernathy's 8th grade team is now 2-0-2 for the year.

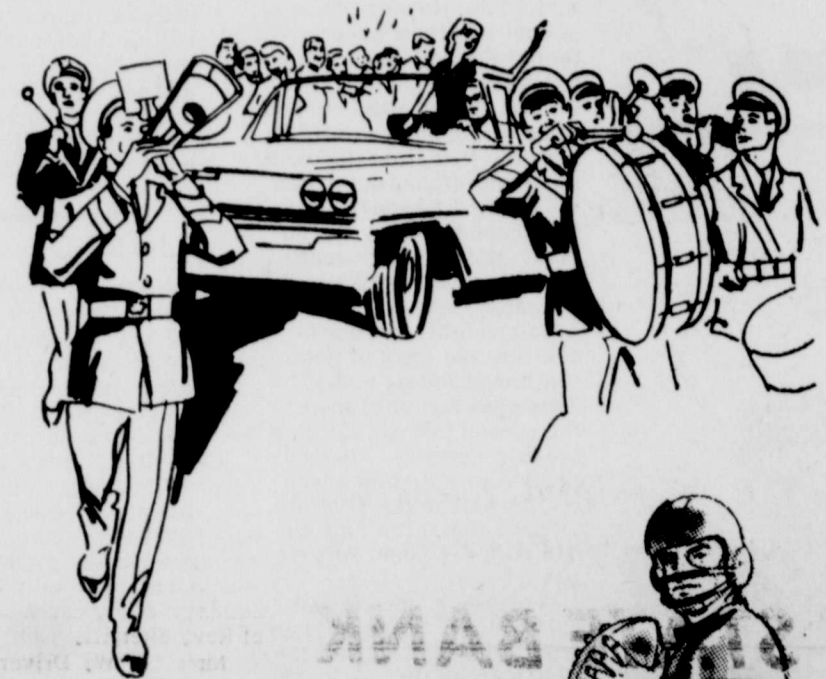

Commission Gets Reports Area Schools Alter Class

Hale County Commissioners approved routine items and heard reports from two departments during a short regular session Monday.

Miss Joyce Burge, director of the Hale County Child Welfare Unit, met first with the Court. She requested and received approval for a transfer of \$4,500 to her unit.

The transfer is the regular method by which the welfare unit receives most of its funds. The transfers are set up at the end of each quarter, but so far, the department has requested only three transfers. Miss Burge also gave a brief report on current child welfare activities.

In other activity, the Court approved a lease agreement between the Farm Bureau and Hale County Airport. Under the agreement, the two groups each will have a 25-year lease on property exchanged, plus a 15-year renewal option of the lease.

County auditor Larry Peckham received approval to transfer money from the general fund to two other funds. Transfers included \$1,500 to the social security fund, and \$30,000 to officers' salary fund.

Also meeting with Court members during the session was Mrs. Mary Lou Truesdale, director of nursing with the Plainview-Hale Health Unit.

Mrs. Truesdale presented the Court with financial reports and lists of workloads in the Unit during the past five months. Included in the reports were summaries of migrant activity.

Also included in the reports was the sixth annual report of the migrant health program through the end of the fiscal year of the program on May 31. In the September report for the Health Unit, total expenditures of \$5,633.48 were listed. This included \$3,578.19 local expense and \$2,075.29 state.

At the same time, the migrant program listed expenses of \$4,460.38.

In the yearend report for the migrant program, the report listed a total of 410 persons making 579 visits for outpatient care under the project.

At the same time, a total of 195 persons were hospitalized for 472 days.

A total of 23 migrants received dental care during 35 visits.

In the preventative department, the Health Unit provided 1,744 persons with the starts of an immunization series, while 956 received a complete set of immunization. Booster shots and re-vaccinations were given to 1,117 persons.

Nurses in the migrant program made 935 visits to 241 households during the year, while 90 visits to schools and day care centers.

Nursing clinics were held 260 times during the year, while 264 referrals were made for more extensive dental or medical care.

SON-IN-LAW IS INJURED IN ALASKA WRECK

Former State Representative Bill J. Parsley of Lubbock and Rep. Richard Slack of Pecos, injured more than a week ago in a hunting accident in Alaska, were returned to Lubbock Sunday and both were reported in fair condition in Methodist Hospital.

Parsley is a son-in-law of Mrs. N. C. Hix of Abernathy.

Parsley, vice president for development at Texas Tech, and Slack suffered back injuries when their Jeep fell from a bluff about 60 miles from Anchorage. They were discovered by a low-flying aircraft Oct. 11. Both men were still in their seats and the Jeep was upright in a heavily wooded area.

Taken first to Elmendorf AFB hospital, they were transferred to Scott AFB hospital in Illinois and then flown to Lubbock.

The league said 1967-68 and 1968-69 school enrollments were used in determining the assignments. Schools with 1,100 or more pupils will be in Class AAAA, and the other divisions are set in this manner: AAA, 500 to 1,099 pupils; AA, 230 to 499; A, 120 to 229; and B, 119 or fewer pupils.

Grant For Hale Center Airport Is Announced

Greyhounds Lose, 28-14

GRE EFLY, Colo. (Special) — Undeclared Colorado State College dumped Eastern New Mexico 28-14 here Saturday night.

The loss was ENMU's third of the year, and all have come on the road. The Greyhounds play at home next week against Angelo State.

CSC made it even, scoring seven points in each quarter. Mickey Holmes got the last two TDs, on a 74-yard run and on a five-yard pass.

ENMU scored in the first and second quarters, Harry Mathis going 46 yards for the first and Bill O'Brien sprinting 13 yards for the second.

Mathis' Good Record

Harry Mathis is a former AHS Antelope grid-mat and is a son of Mrs. Ole Mathis of Abernathy.

Mathis is an outstanding player on the ENMU Greyhound squad. In a recent report received by The Review from ENMU, it shows Mathis as the top individual in rushing, second in pass receiving, first for the longest pass gathered in (65 yds.), first in kickoff returns (longest 34 yds.), second in punt returns and first in scoring (to that date 24 points on 4 TDS).

AUSTIN — The Texas Aeronautics Commission has awarded Hale Center \$27,500 to build its own airport.

That is the maximum amount of money the State agency can award any one city in one year under law. It must be matched at least 50-50 by Hale Center.

The money was awarded to help Hale Center buy the land needed, clear the zone easements, and construct a runway, taxiway and apron.

The runway will be large enough to handle most propeller driven aircraft, and only the smallest jets, and then only during specific weather conditions.

In the three years of the TAC's airport aid program, 84 communities have been given 104 grants — totaling \$1 million. A community is eligible for a second grant 12 months after it receives its first. Hale Center, presumably, will be up for one next year since lighting of the runway was not included in this year's allotment. Every other airport that has received aid from the TAC since the program was started has been given enough money to install lighting so that the airport can be used 24 hours a day either in the first grant or in a following one.

In all, 18 projects were approved totaling \$324,500.

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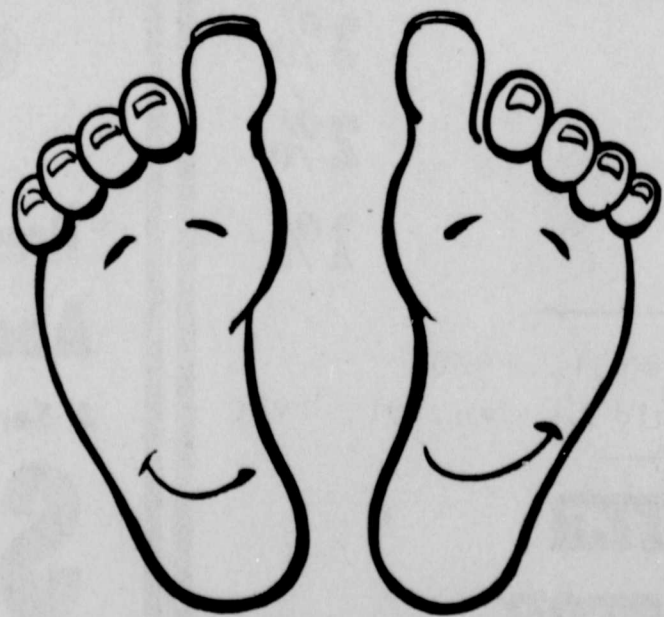
