# Abernathy Breaks Loose In Final Stanza To Topple Hale Center, 40-19

The Abernathy Antelopes woke up in the third quarter last Friday night to go on a scoring rampage that carried them to a 40-19 victory over Hale Center. Trailing 19-7 in the middle of the third period, the Lopes received the kickoff from the Owls and used seven plays to move the ball 60 yards for the score. The T.D. came on a five yard run by Charles Johnson. This proved to be the spark that set the Antelopes on fire. A Bobby Klatt interception resulted in another touchdown before the quarter ended, and Larry Turners kick for the extra point gave the Antelopes a 20-19 lead

that they never relinquished. The first half was almost a repeat of the Dimmitt game as the Antelopes gave up two touchdowns. Fumbles, penalities, and poor paly gave the visiting Owls two scoring opportunities that they used to their advantage. Not to be denied, the Lopes scored once in the first half on a 25 yard pass from Klatt to Ronald Harkey. This was their only score in the first half and they trailed at the half time

After receiving the se-cond half kickoff, the Hale Center Owls marched 70 yards for a T.D. and took a 19-7 lead. At this point the Antelopes, paced by the running of Mark Harrison, Charles Johnson, and Klatt, came to life and played "as good a brand of hardnose football as we have played all year long, according to Coach Luke Nickerson, Outstanding b1ocking on end sweeps by Larry Turner and Larry Pittman paved the way for several long runs by Johnson in the second half. Johnson finished the game with 145 yards total rushing, with only 10 of this coming in the first half.

In the fourth period, Harrison picked up two touchdowns on runs of one and 13 yards. With less than 30 seconds left to play, Knight provided the local fans with their money's worth as he picked off an Owl pass that had been deflected by Kirk Lane. Picking up good blocks by Turner and Keith Lambert, Knight raced down the sideline and into the end zone to realize a lineman's dream of scoring a touchdown.

The coaches were well pleased with the effort and courage shown by the Antelopes in coming from behind to win. Coach Hill stated, "It would have been real easy for them to quit in the third quarter after Hale Center scored their third T.D., but the Lopes showed their true spirit by never letting up.

Coach Kennedy was especially pleased with the defensive play of several linemen. "We made mistakes early in the game that cost us, but in the second half our defense held them to only four first downs and we were able to come up with the big defensive play to force them to give up the ball," Kennedy said.

Coach Nickerson summed up the feelings of all the coaches by saying, "If we can continue to get this kind of effort and inspired play by the Antelopes, especially when the breaks go against us, we can win the rest of our district games and inspite of what other teams in the district thinks, be district champs.

The Lopes have their work cut out for them this Friday as they journey to Lockney to take on the Longhorns. Smarting from an upset by Olton, the Longhorns will be fighting to keep from losing their third district

Lockney, according to scouts Ricky McKay and Gary Campbell, has a well coached ball club that is paced by speed and quickness and not size. "They are perhaps the quickest team we will see this year, "Coach McKay stated.

The Longhorns operate primarily from the straight I", and depend on the speed of halfback Tracy Dickson to make the offense go. They have a real tough defense that uses the quickness of the Longhorns to stunt a lot. But the most dangerous weapon of the Longhorns is their kickoff and punt returns. The Olton game was the first that the Horns failed to return a punt or kickoff for a T.D. Olton used an onside kick

each time and punted the ball out of bounds to keep the ball away from the speedy

Longhorn backs. Even though Lockney is just about eliminated from the district race, Coach Ni-ckerson expects them to rebound from the Olton loss and be high for the Antelopes.




