Mark Harrison, moved from fullback to halfback to take the place of the injured Charles Johnson, was named the outstanding offensive player of the week by the coaches. Mark, chosen for this honor for the second week in a row, ran for 110 yards on 24 carries against the Lockney Longhorns. His 48 yard run in the first quarter set up the Lopes touchdown, Harrison also caught one pass for 25 yards. Coach Nickerson said of Mark's performance, "Mark made the switch from fullback to halfback with a tremendous running effort in the Lockney game. Although he doesn't have the speed that Charles Johnson has, Mark runs hard and gets extra yardage by refusing to go down. Others nominated for the offensive honors were Larry K1afka who did a good job of blocking, Bobby Klatt for his passing, and Ronald Harkey for his pass receiving.
In choosing the outstand-

ing defensive player the coaches narrowed the choice down to Larry Turner, Don Snodgrass, Johnny Hemphill and Dave Davenport. The nod went to Davenport who plays safety in the Antelopes secondary. Dave intercepted one pass and broke two others and was in on seven tackles. Nickerson said, "Dave played his best game against Lockney. He has improved with each game and is beginning to gain more confidence in his ability to break on the ball when it is thrown." Turner, as usual, was the leading tackler for the Lopes with 14. Hemphill had 12, Snodgrass had 7 and also intercepted a Longhorn pass.

Abernathy Antelopes suffer their second setback in district play and their virtual elimination from the race for the district championship, falling to Lockney Longhorns 20-7. There is still a remote possibility that the distict race could end in a fiveway tie. It would have to happen

Lockney must defeat Dimmitt and Hale Center; Abernathy must defeat Floydada and Friona; and Dimmitt must beat Floydada in the final week of play. If all this happened, a five way tie would result. Although the possibilities of all these things happening are pretty remote. Coach Nickerson says, "Any-thing can happen in football, and who knows, all these things could take place."

The Lockney game found the Antelopes striking first as they received the opening kickoff and marched 70 yards for a score. The big play on this drive was a nifty 48 yard run by halfback Mark Harrison. The score came on a one yard sneak by quarterback Bobby Klatt, Larry Turner kicked the extra point to give the Lopes a 7-o lead. The Longhorns struck back on a 45 yard punt return by Tracy Dickson. The kick was good to tie the score.

In the second quarter the Antelopes were unable to mount a serious scoring threat as the Lockney defense came through with several big plays to stop the offen-sive hopes of the Lopes. With two minutes remaining in the first half the Longhorns scored to take the lead 14-7 at half time. The third quarter was scoreless as neither team could get their offenses moving. The final score of the game came as the Antelopes were driving for a T.D. Operating from the "shotgun" formation, Klatt completed passes to Ronald Harkey and Mike Kerr before having one intercepted and returned for a Lockney touchdown. The coaches expressed their pride and admiration for the effort and attitude shown by the Lopes in the Lockney game. Coach Nickerson said, "This loss hurt in many ways, because it just about eliminated us from the district championship. and we could have won it so easily; but the Antelopes never quit hitting and we were in the game right up to the last. The most devastating residential fire to hit Abernathy in many years completely destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. Elmo Webb and daughters at 508 15th St., starting between 6 and 7 p.m. Sunday. The fire sent Mrs. Webb and their daughter, Lula Dianne, 14, to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock with first and second degree burns. Webb said Monday morning that his wife probably would be hospitalized for about two weeks. Lindsey Webb of Abernathy, member of the local volunteer fire department and a career member of the Lubbock City Fire Department, was overcome by heat and susta ined blisters on his face and head. He was one the roof of Mrs. T.U. Hunt's home at 510 15th St. which is only a few feet from the Webb house.

Reports said that gasoline had been accidentally spilled in the area of the kitchen and utility room. Webb, his wife and daughter cleaned up the spilled gasoline. He then went to the trash barrel in the alley behind their home. While he was there an explosion occured in the area where the gas spilled. Webb had to go through the fire to get his family to safety. He escaped injury, as did their other daughter, Vicki, 15, who was in the den when the

explosion occured. Flames spread so rapidly throughout the house that the fire was near impossible to control. A unit of the Hale Center fire department and several Hale Center firemen joined local firemen in battling to contain the blaze to one house, Much of the firemen's efforts concentrated on saving Mrs. Hunt's home, which sustained comparatively light damage. 


