



The Abernathy coaches

departed from their usual procedure of choosing one of-fensive and one defensive player of the week, and na-med all the seniors as being the top players of the week. Coach Nickerson explained: "This was a game that our seniors wanted to win--they played their best and certainly deserve recognition for almost pulling off the upset of the year. The coaches are extremely proud of the way the Antelopes fought and ne-ver quit. I have never been more proud of a group of kids than I was of the Antelopes last Friday night."

Individual stars were numerous in the Floydada game, with several of the Lopes playing their best game of the year. The outstanding performances were on defense as the Lopes held the tauted Whirlwind offense to less than 200 yards total offense. Coach Kennedy said of the defensive team, "Our tackling was better than it has ever been. We had several players in on each tackle and the pursuit and gang tackling of the Antel-

opes was the best we've seen. Travis Knight was recognized as playing his best game of the year. Coach Hill said, "Travis was in on 15 tackles and made several key stops to halt Floydada thre ats. Larry Turner was credited with 14 tackles and inspired the defensive team from his middle line-backer position. Ronald Harkey was in on 13 tackles and along with Charles Mathis, Larry Pittman, Monty Hobgood, and Jon Thickstun threw the Whirl-wind passer for several losses. Don Snodgrass and Bobby Klattwere outstanding in the

Antelope secondary.

REPORTS GIVEN AT MEETING OF SCHOOL BOARD

The Board of Education of Abernathy Independent School District met in regular session November 3, 1969 at 7:00 p.m. in the board room of the high school. Those in attendance were: L.J. West, president; Billie Harrison. vice president; Joe Lovelace, secretary; J. H. Myatt; Joe Oswalt; David Pinson; and Bob Riley. Also in attendance were Dr. Delwin Webb, superintendent and Earl Carter, Business Manager.

Items on the agenda included examining and approving the bills for the previous month. Tax collection for the 1969-70 school year showed 77.19% of the current roll collected. Mr. Earl Carter presented a budget pro-gress report for 1/6 of the fiscal year and presented by Superintendent Webb were enrollment reports, nurse's report, and lunchroom report. Enrollment showed 1, 149 currently enrolled which is the highest enrollment since September 1966. The nurse's report included immunization program conducted by the schools in cooperation with Hale County Health Unit and immunization shots were given as follows: DPT--17, DT--63, Polio--53, Smallpox -- 26

Average participation in the lunchroom during the month of October was 573 which is also high for the previous 3 years.

Communications were presented from the Texas Education Agency adjusting the local fund assignment downward by 7,023 for the current school year.

The Board voted to participate with the Hale County Health Unit in an encephalitis experiment program to be conducted during the week of November 10, Parents will be sent cards to indicate their approval for the children to give blood in the encephalitis experiment which is an effort to wipe out encephalitis carrying mesquito and to find adequate means of prevention of the disease.

Books to be adopted included arithmetic. grades 1-3; Literature I & II, high school; supplemental reading, grades 7 & 8; journalism; biology; Spanish I & II; America: History; business arithmetic; and English dictionaries in high school. The Abernathy Church of the Nazarene will host a Lubbock Zone Missionary Rally on Saturday November 15 at 7:30 p.m. The speaker of the evening will be the Rev. Paul Andrus, Missionary to Bolivia, who is now on furlough holding services among churches of the Nazarene. This is the first furlough for the Andrus family since being assigned as missionaries in

Since July of 1966, the Rev. Andrus has been stationed in La Paz, Bolivia where he has served as the Bible school director and field treasurer. For a little over a year, prior to July of 1967, Rev. and Mrs. Andrus lived in Tiquina, Bolivia where the Rev. Andrus did evangelistic work and Mrs. Andrus operated a clinic.

The missionary service will emphasize missionary evangelism in the Lake Titacaca region and other areas. The medical work in Bolivia will be explained in the light of its usefullness as a evangelistic tool. The functions of the Nazarene Bible School in Bolivia will also be related.

The Rev. Andrus was born in Los Angeles, Calif. In 1960, he received a diploma in Theology from Kentucky Mountain Bible Institute, Jackson, Kentucky, In 1962 he completed his Bachelor of Arts degree in Theology at Trevecca Nazarene College, Nashville, Tenn. and then went on to receive a masters degree from the University of Chattanooga, Chattanooga, Tenn. His masters was in the field of Education.
