







AHS ANTELOPE PLAYERS OF THE WEEK

The Abernathy football coaches chose three Antelopes as outstanding defensive players in the Friona game, and decided not name a top offensive player. Inconsistency was the reason given for not identifying an offensive star. "The backs rand hard at times and our blocking was good at times, but we never did get together and have a sustained dri ve on offense, "Coach Nickerson said. He did praise the efforts of quarterback Bobby Klatt and the receiving of Ronald Harkey and Don Snodg rass in the last minute attempt to pull the game out for the Lopes.

The three defensive stars were Larry Turner, Travis Knight and Johnny Hemphill -all linebackers in the Antelope defense. Coach Kennedy praised these three for being in on a record number of tackles. "All three broke our previous record for the number of tackles they were in on, and all three played great defensive football, "he

said. Turner set a record that wi-11 be hard to equal by being in on 26 tackles. Hemphill was close behind with 24. and Knight was responsible for 19 tackles. Coach Nickerson had special praise for Knight: "He played his defensive position as well as any player I have ever seen. His play in the Floydada and Friona games has been almost perfect. It's a real pleasure to see an athlete perform to the best of his ability lil:3 Travis has in these two games. " Others mentioned for their defensive play were Ru-wayne Struve, Kirk Lane, & Jim Forbes.

BASKETBALL SEASON IS OPENED

Antelopes End Football Season Playing in below freez-

ing weather, the Abernathy Antelopes failed in a last second bid and fall to the Friona Chieftans 9-7. Scoring on their first possession, the Lopes took a 7-0 lead on a 30 yard pass point. Friona countered in the second quarter with a 28 yard field goal and the Antelopes took a 7-3 lead into the intermis-

The second half saw good defensive play by as scoring threats by both teams failed to materialize until Friona scored on a one yard plunge by their fullback, with 4:50 left in the game. The Lopes received the kickoff following the Chiefs score and were forced to punt after three passes fell incomplete. Dave Davenport got off a 65 yard punt that gave the Chiefs the ball on their own 15 yard line. They moved the ball to the Antelopes 20 yard line before the Lopes stopped them on a fourth down try and took possession with less than fourty seconds left. Behind the passing of Klatt to his favorite targets, Harkey and Don Snodgrass, the Lopes moved the ball to the Chiefs five yard line. With three seconds left, Larry Turner's field goal try was short, but the Antelopes were given one more try when a Friona lad was caught off sides on the field goal try.

9-7. The coaches praised the defense for an outstanding job against Friona. The offense. operating for the third straight week without running back Charles Johnson, could never get a sustained drive going until the last few seconds. Coach Nickerson said, "Our backs (Mark Harrison, Klatt, Mike Kerr, Kirk Lane, Johnny Hemphill) ran hard, but none of them have the speed to break

for the long gainer.

The Antelopes finished the season with a 5-5 won-lost record. The coaches praised the seniors for their efforts during the whole year, but especially for the way they played in the Lopes last two games, which they lost by a total of three points. Coach Nickerson expressed his feelings about the seniors: "They worked hard and mever quit. They had a great attitude and willingness to scrifice individual desires for the good of the team. We are going to miss them next year, but they have established an attitude and tradition that will make our job as coaches a lot easier in years to come. We love them for never quitting and for playing their hearts out, even when the odds

were against them. Of those juniors and sophomores on the team, Nickerson said, "Iney all including the "B" team, learned a lot of football this year and we saw tremendous progress made by each individual. If these young men will keep the same attitude and stick together like they have this year, Abernathy has an exciting future in athletics for

several years to come. Coach Kennedy noted, "We are extremely pleased with the development of our you nger players, including our freshmen. The freshmen finished the season with a 4-4 record and with these boys playing on our Jr. Varsity next year, they can develop into an outstanding football team. There is a lot of potential in this class, and the 8th grade team will come is as freshmen next year sporting a 4-1-2 record, and a number of kids who seem to love football. All-in-all, the future looks real good for our football program.

Substituting freely throughout the remainder of the game.Coach Campbell's crew failed to score again while allowing Littlefield 14 points. Coach Cam-pbell said, "I have been throughly impressed with the desire and attitude of these 8th graders. They perform soundly as a team and are satisfied with nothing less than perfection. The best thing about this team is that it is full of boys that love to hit and that's the most important thing in football. These kids have a great future ahead of them as they move on into Abernathy High School.

7th GRADE TEAM

The seventh grade football team saved all its scoring for the final game of the season and defeated the Littlefield seventh graders, 8-6. In their first win of the year, the 7th grade scored their only touchdown and extra points of the year, the ".D. came in the third quarter on a 40 yard run by Steve Myatt after intercepting a Littlefield pass. Littlefield had scored in the first half to take a 6o lead, and Abernathy had to score the extras to win. Tommy Horsford ran for the extra points, but an offisides penalty nulified his efforts. From eight yards out, Steve Oswalt swept left end and following the good blocking of Israel Garza got the game

winning points. Playing good defense in the fourth quarter, the Yearlings thwarted the efforts of the Littlefield offense to score. The top defensive play came with less than one minute left when Doug Rogers pulled a Wildcat runner down from behind to stop what looked like

a sure T.D. Coach Campbell recognized Horsford, Oswalt, Kent Harrison, and Joey Dorman as playing outstanding games at their offensive backfield positions. Coach Campbell made this comment concerning the seventh grade football team: "These boys have worked hard all year and the sweat then spent on the practice field paid off for them against Littlefield. I'm sure the future will bring a continuation of improvement.

AHS STUDENTS OFFERED UNIQUE OPPORTUNITY

Abernathy High School students, under the supervision of Mr. Bob Hudson, are learning creative skills to be used in home life and employment, after finishing high school. Skills learned by students include sewing, upholstering furniture, antiquing

and wood finishing. The thirty students go to regular classes of English, Social Studies, Math, and Science all during their four years of high school. Also, yearly advancement is made in projects, such as the state requires of the classes. After meeting these requirements, the students are eligible for

their high school diploma. The facilities used are in a barracks building, located behind the high school gym. Mr. Hudson has been responsible for acquiring the needed sewing machines, saws, tools, and other necessary materials used.

During the first eight weeks of school, the students have done exceptionally well in applying their knowledge. The girls have made vinyl pleated curtains for the classroom, purses, all types of pillows, table cloths, and table runners for Christmas decorations. The boys have upholstered numerous sofas and chairs, and have beautifully painted and antiqued table, desks, and other fur-

niture. These classes, part of the Coordinated Vocational Academic Education program. are unique in this area. This is the third year that Abernathy has had this program, and three of the boys who were in the class last year, were employed during the summer atupholstery shops in Lubboc' and Fort Worth.





KNIGHTS' TWIN GRANDSONS DIE AT NEW BOSTON







Country Club Sets Turkey Shoot For November 21 - 22


