



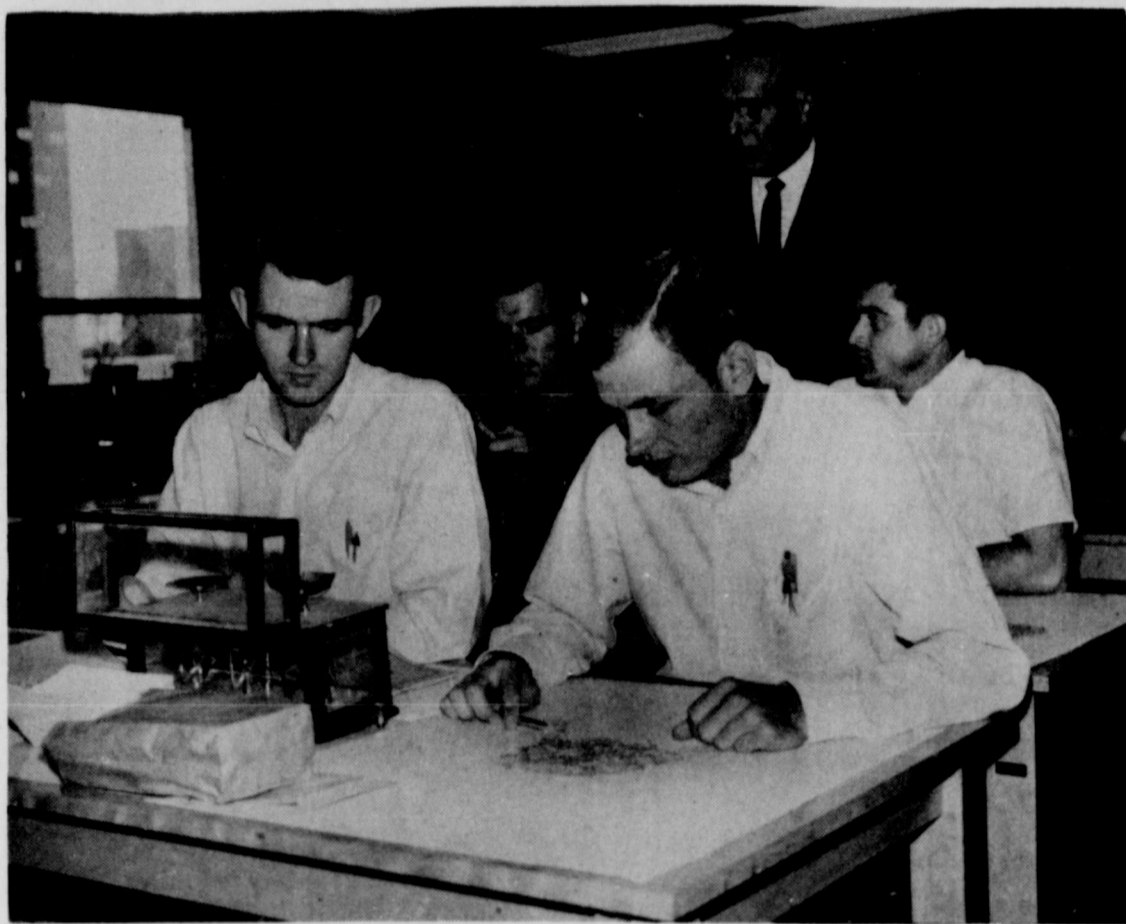

ANTELOPES OPEN BASKETBALL SEASON

The Abernathy Antelopes have put away the footballs and have started bouncing the round balls.

Coach Steve Hill welcomed 18 candidates for the Varsity last Monday as the Antelopes began preparation for their first game with Ralls (Results of this game will be in next weeks paper). The Lopes will journey to Littlefield on Tuesday, Nov. 25, and then will take time off for Thanksgiving holidays.

From the 18 varsity hopefuls, Coach Hill chose 10 for his varsity and the others will make up the Jr. Varsity Club, coached by Luke Nickerson. Hill explained that with only four seniors on the team he will be moving some of the younger boys back and forth from the Varsity to Jr. Varsity so they can get as much experience as possible.

Who asked what the fans could expect from the Antelopes round-balls this year, Hill explained: "We intend to play a fast-break brand of basketball. We don't have exceptional height so we will have to depend on a pressing defense to try to get the ball before our opponents get a chance for the good shot. The kids are going to make a lot of mistakes playing this kind of ball, especially in the early season, but we feel this type of ball is more exciting to play, coach, and watch."

Of those boys playing basketball this year, only two have any Varsity experience--Don Snodgrass and Jim Forbes. The rest have "B" team or freshman experience. 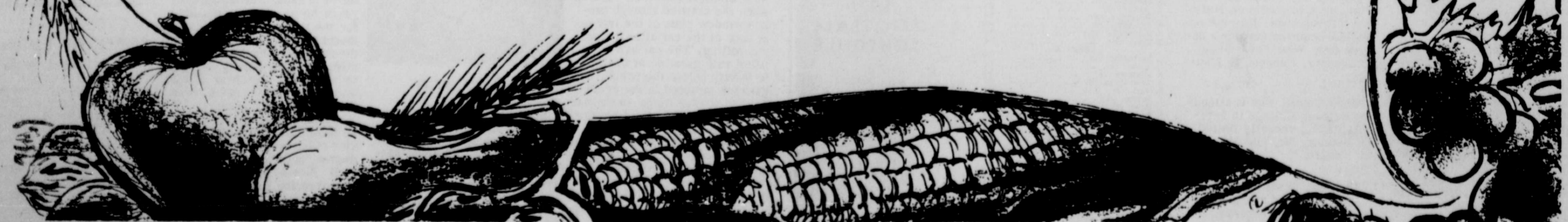

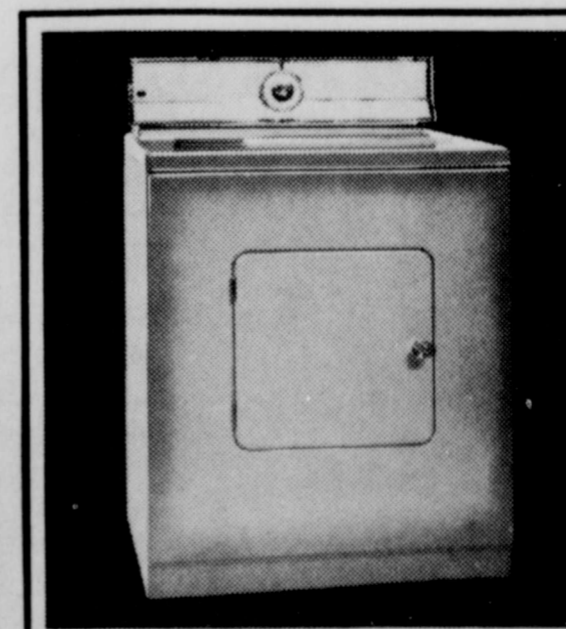
