

Driver of the car was Gary Lovelace, 19, son of

Mr. and Mrs. Joe B. Lovelace of Abernathy. He suffered severe abrasions on his back and other lesser injuries. He has been dismissed from Methodist Hospital. Mrs. Stanford sustained severe brusies, abrasions and was cut

by glass. Jon sustained a broken left thigh. Mrs. Stanford and Jon and Gary, who is in Air Force National Guard training at Albuque. rque, had been here to visit their father and grandfather Frank B. Lovelace, who was a patient in Methodist Hospital. He has been released from the hospital. They were enroute to Albuguerque when the accident happened.

Apparently, Gary went to sleep while driving and the car we-nt out of control. Reports said the car turned over 5 times. Gary and Jon were thrown from the car, Some of the cuts which Mrs. Stanford sustained occured when she crawled through broken window glass of the left re-ar door of the car after it stopped rolling. The car had been filled with gasoline at Littlefield shortly before the wreck. The

gas tank ruptured in the accident and soaked items in the car and in the trunk but did not ignite. The car was demolished, reports said. Top of the car was crushed down to, and in some places below the top part of the car body. The place through wh ich Mrs. Stanford crawled from the car was the only possible exit.
