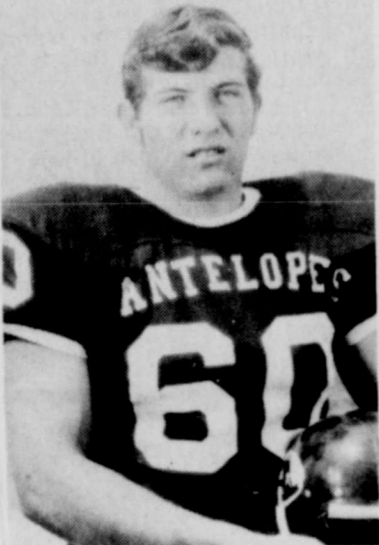

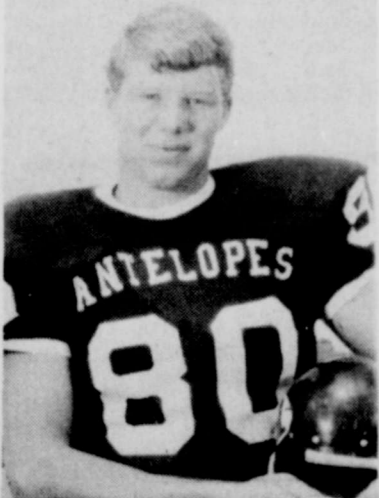

Abernathy was represented on the first team by Ronald Harkey, chosen as offensive end and defensive lineman and Larry Turner rebutted as first team offensive tackle. Other Antelopes honored with Honorable mention on the all-star team were:

Bobby Klatt-quarterback & safety, Charlie Johnson-running back, Larry Klafka-center, Don Snodgrass-offensive end and defensive corner, Travis Knight-linebacker, Larry Pittman-defensive lineman.

On the first team, Lockney paced all schools with seven places, Floydada, the district champs, was second, with five places, followed by Dimmitt, Friona, Olton and Abernathy with three each, and Hale Center with one.

VISITING LAYMAN TO SPEAK DEC. 10 AT CHURCH HERE

A Layman's Impression of the Congress on Evangelism Mr. Chesley Lewis, of Fort Worth, Texas, will be speaking at the Church of the Nazarene here in Abernathy on Wednesday December 10th at 7:30 p.m. Mr. Lewis will be presenting a report on the recent "U.S. Congress on Evangelism" which was held in Minneapolis, Minnesota, Sept. 8-12, 1969 which he attended as one of the three members of the West Texas District of the Nazarene who were chosen to represent the District at this "Congress on Evangelism".

Mr. Lewis is a member of the Glenn Park Church of the Nazarene in Fort Worth, Texas and a lay member of the West Texas District Advisory Board. He is an outstanding layman on the District and a successful insurance man in business life. The news reports of this "Congress on Evangelism" indicated that there were delegates from 97 different denominations in attendance. It is certainly a privilege to have one of them in our community to present a 1st hand report from the meeting. The Rev. Louis Schaap, pastor of the Abernathy Church of the Nazarene said that because of the wide-spread interest in this recent "Congress" the church was happy to bring Mr. Lewis to Abernathy and extended to the community a hearty invitation to attend this service at which he will be speaking.

BOYS VARSITY

The Abernathy Antelopes opened their basketball season on a losing note as they lost their first game to Ralls 95-41. Making several first game mistakes, the Lopes, trailed through the entire game never being able to cope with a full-court press thrown up by the Jackrabbits. Don Snodgrass led the Antelope players with 13 points, followed by Ronald Harkey with 9. Jim Forbes was the top rebounder with 11 and Harkey pulled down 9.

In their second effort against Littlefield, the Lopes played much better ball, but still lost to the Wildcats 62-55. Snodgrass again led the scoring list with 25 points, and Harkey was next with 12. Forbes again was the top rebounder with 12. When asked about the two losses, Coach Hill said, "Our boys hustled good, but we made too many simple mistakes, like bad passes, missed lay-ups, missed free-throws, and poor defensive positions." He continued, "We played much better ball against Littlefield, our shooting percentage was better, we ran our offense better, and our rebounding showed improvement."

The Antelopes will play in the Plainview tournament this weekend. Their first opponent will be Plainview High School at 7:00, Thursday evening. Next Tuesday night the Lopes travel to Littlefield to try and even their record against the Wildcats.

GIRLS VARSITY

Coach Ricky McKay's girls basketballers upped their record to 3-1 this past week as they won two games, defeating Ralls 36-29 and besting Tulla 51-43. In the Tulla game three Antelopes scored in the double figures. Drueann McCune was tops with 20, followed closely by Romana Olguin with 19 and Kaye Barton had 11. McCune was also high scorer in the Ralls contest with 20 points. In both games, defense played a big part in helping the Antelopes win.

In action this weekend, the Abernathy team will play in the Slaton Tournament. Next Tuesday December 9th, marks the beginning of District play for the girls when they travel to Dimmitt to take on the Bobcats.

JUNIOR VARSITY

The Jr. Varsity basketball team of Coach Luke Nickerson remained undefeated in the first week of play, defeating three opponents. In the first game against the Ralls "B" team, Steve Phillips led the Lopes to a 49-21 trouncing of Ralls, by scoring 10 points. Dave Davenport tallied 12 in the Ralls game. Littlefield was the second victims, as Bruce Kinast's 17 points and Phillips 23 paced the Lopes to a 60-41 triumph over the Wildcats. This past Monday night the Lopes defeated Plainview's "B" team 58-49 behind the scoring of Dave Davenport, who accounted for 25 points. Phillips was second high man with 16. The Abernathy Jr. Varsity's next game will be Tuesday, December 9th against the same Littlefield team they defeated last week. Other boys seeing action on the Jr. Varsity team are Dave Lovelace, Larry Betts, Bobby Rogers, Tommy Myatt, and Brent Newton.

CROP JUDGING Second Spot Taken By Tech Team

For the first time in eight years, Texas Tech's crops judging team failed to cop top honors in the international judging in Chicago. The team finished second Saturday.

Taking first place was Minnesota with 5,252 points out of a possible 5,400. Tech placed second with 5,204.8. Penn State took third with 5,104.4, and Oklahoma State was fourth with 5,080.2.

In individual scores, Jerry Bigham, Tech junior from Lockney was first with 1,776 points; Jerry Rice a junior of Abernathy placed fourth for Tech; and Rex Harris a senior from Colorado City was 10th with 1,682.8 points.

Bigham placed high in all three judging areas bringing in a first place, second place and sixth place. Rice and Harris fared well in the top 20 in individual scoring.

Tech is the only university to have won both national and international judging more than three times consecutively. The school won five consecutive times in 1952-1956 contests, and again in the 1962-1966 contests. Tech even broke its own records with consecutive wins in the contests between 1962 and 1968. Team members were Bigham, Rice, Harris and alternate John Conner.

The team was accompanied by agronomy Professor Cecil Ayers.

I just want to make my parents happy to know that I'll be coming home in a few days.

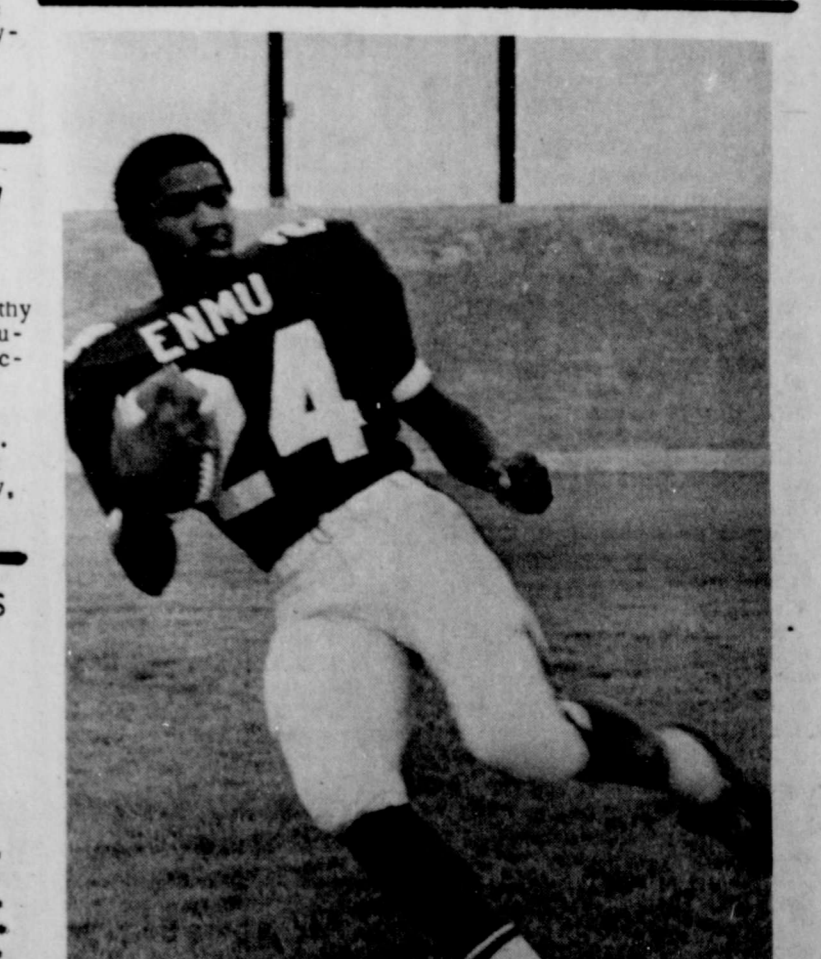
I was a student at Abernathy High School and now I am getting out of the army for good.

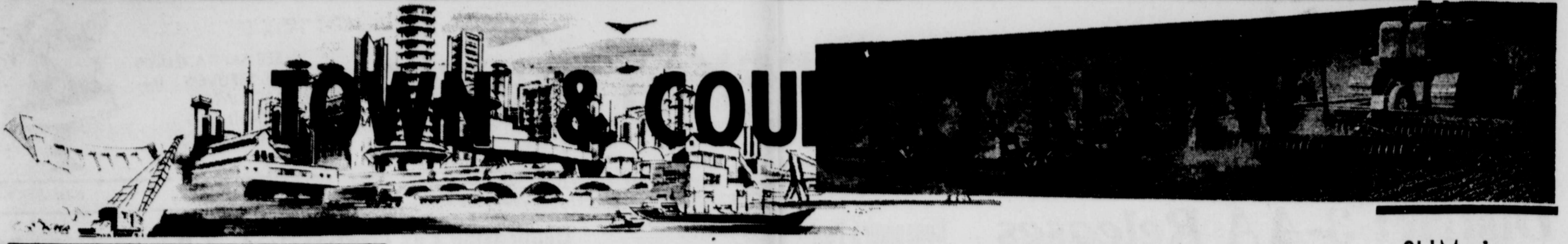

HARRY MATHIS Portales (Special) -- JUNIOR SPEEDSTER--Harry Mathis, junior wingback with the Eastern New Mexico University Greyhounds, led his team in four offensive categories, came in second in a fifth, and set one all-time record in his initial year in a Greyhound uniform. Mathis, who came to Eastern from Abernathy, Texas, was the team's leading rusher with 580 yards on 83 carries, and was also the leading punt returner and kickoff return man. He returned seven punts for 68 yards, and 20 kickoffs for 432 yards. He was also the second leading pass receiver with 28 receptions for 419 yards, and the team's leading scorer with 42 points. In gaining 580 yards rushing on 83 carries, Mathis set a new all-time record for best per carry average for a season with a mark of 7.1 yards. Harry is a son of Mrs. Oleene Mathis of Abernathy.

TV X-Ray Shows Need For Caution

Why do TV sets put out X-rays? It's part of their operation and at present impossible to avoid completely. Color sets--because of their higher operating voltage--are more likely to produce X-rays than black-and-white models. The potential for X-ray generation exists at three points in the TV set: at the high-voltage rectifier, the high-voltage shunt regulator, and at the picture tube. The X-rays produced by color TV sets, if any, have been accelerated by an electromotive force in the 25,000-volt range. Such X-rays are classified as "soft" (low penetrating power) in comparison with the "hard" X-rays used for testing and diagnostic purposes. But the accumulated dose is a result of time as well as of intensity.

A diagnostic X-ray may last for a fraction of a second; on the other hand, you may spend all evening close to your TV set. Recommended safety procedures regarding televisions include the following:

- Follow to the letter the instructions furnished by the manufacturer of the set for making all needed adjustments to the set.
- Stay at least six feet away from the set when viewing it; do not permit children to lie on the floor with their legs and pelvic area under the set.
- Every time the set is worked on be sure the technician leaves all protective shielding on the chassis intact.
- X-radiation from TV sets, based on present knowledge, is nothing to panic about. But since there are still some unknown elements in the technical end of the field, caution is the wisest course.

AMARILLO (Special) — Pioneer Natural Gas Co.'s acquisition of Ecor Chemical Corp.'s interest in the Ringwood and Madill gas processing plants has been completed, according to an announcement made Monday by Burton P. Smith, president of Pioneer. The purchase price has been announced to exceed \$4 million, and the effective date of the acquisition was made retroactive to Nov. 1, 1969.

In connection with the acquisition of these plants, Smith announced that they would be owned by a newly-formed, wholly-owned subsidiary of Pioneer Natural Gas Company, Pioneer Gas Products Company. This new company will supervise the operation of the plants.

The officers named for the new Pioneer subsidiary are C. W. Pankratz, president; C. J. Gholson, J. J. Heitz and R. F. Spikes, vice presidents; B. F. Thigpen, treasurer; and Jerry Hopson, secretary.

The Ringwood plant is located near Ringwood in Major County, Okla., and the Madill gasoline plant is located in Marshall County, Okla. Both of these plants are modern oil absorption type plants with a total liquid products recovery capacity of about 155,000 gallons daily.

In an additional announcement, A. F. Cox, president of Pioneer's subsidiary Amarillo Minerals, Inc., said that Amarillo Minerals, together with other associates, has purchased 225,000 shares of the stock of National Resources Corp.

National Resources Corp. is a Denver-based company, engaged in the exploration for uranium and other metals.
