

The Varsity boys basketball team remained winless this past week, falling to Plainvi ew and McAdoo in the Plainview Tournament. The Antelopes were defeated by class AAAA Plainview in the first round of the tourney. The score was 88-42 in favor of the Bulldogs, a ball club that is expected to be a top cantender in their district. The top Lope point make was D in Snodgrass who finished will 25 points, most of them coming on long jump shots as the touh Plainview defense made it difficult for the Antelopes to get in close for the short shots.

In the second round of the tourney the Lopes fell to Class B McAdoo, 53-41. McAdoo was just the opposite of the tall Plainview team, having only one boy over six feet. But the poor uninspired play of the Antelopes again kept them from gaining their first victory of the year. Snodgrass



REPORT ON NAZARENE **ACTIVITIES**

The Rev. Louis Schaap, pastor of the Abernathy Church of the Nazarene reported that the local church gave just over 15 % of its total income to the World wide missionary effort of the denomination of which it is a part. This contributed \$3, 114 dollars toward the over \$7,000,000 which the denomination gave to its world mission program in 19-

Dr. John Stockton, general treasurer, estimated that the 1969 giving total would reach \$7.300,000. This would be an increase of 61/2% over the \$6.854.000 spent on Nazare-

ne world missions in 1968. The Nazarene world mission program takes in work by over 600 missionaries, teachers, doctors, nurses and builders and world-wide broadcasting schedules.

Early in 1970 Nazarenes will open work in Honduras which will be the 49th world area with work sponsored by the denomination. A church also has been started in Guam, in the Mariana Island of the

Other gains during the year were the construction of English-speaking churches in Tokyo and at Yoshihara, Oki-

A total of 41 Nazarene college students gave their summer vacations in 1969 to work at mission stations in South and Central America. This plan will be repeated in 1970. More than 280 pastors attended the first Nazarene Central American preachers' conference at Guatamala City,

Guatamala, December 1-5. The new Nazarene Central American Bible College is scheduled to open in March, 1970, on a campus near San Costa Rica.

The Nazarene world mission program has 85,879 church members and an enrollment of 168,500 in Sunday School. The denomination has a world membership of over 465. ooo persons.

Pastor Schaap also stated that this is the 10th year in recent church history that the Abernathy church has given over 10% of its yearly in-come to the cause of world missions through the general denominational program.
