Commission Studies Redistricting

Redistricting Hale County to comply with the "one man, one vote" decision recently reached by the U.S. Supreme Court was a major topic during a busy meeting Monday of Hale County Commissioners.

Commissioners made no decision on redistricting, but asked a six-man committee to begin study on the problem. The six are a part of a 15-man advisory group set up to study similar countywide problems.

In other activity, the Court listened to a presentation by representatives from Hi-Plains Hospital in Hale Center who asked the Court to consider payment to the hospital for care of indigent and medically indigent persons at Hale Center facility.

Commissioners also listened to an explanation of the South Plains Association of Governments by the executive director of the organization, Lubbock County Judge Rod Shaw and Lubbock County Commissioner Arch Lamb.

Raise Salaries
Salaries of county and precinct officials also were raised by four per cent, and the Court accepted a low bid on a new pickup truck for use in Precinct Four.

County Judge C. L. Abernethy said he was suggesting the study on redistricting since he had been contacted by a Plainview attorney who said two county residents had discussed filing a suit against the county to force redistricting.

In discussions Monday, Commissioners said the bulk of county population, probably 65-70 per cent, is located in Precinct One, the area surrounding Plainview. Next in size is Precinct Three, which includes Hale Center, Abernathy and Gotton Center. The two smallest precincts in terms of population are Precinct Two, the Petersburg area, and Precinct Four, Halfway and Edmondson.

The Supreme Court decision was made on a suit filed in Midland County, and the decision in effect said that each Commissioner must represent approximately the same number of persons.

Hale County Commissioners said one of their major concerns was the imbalance in the number of miles of rural roads which would result from redistricting.

The group said the only way to get enough population into each precinct would be to run each precinct into Plainview.

Name Committee
Named to the study committee were Johnny Corcoran of Plainview as chairman; Carter (Buck) Lindsay, Plainview; W. E. Burnett, Plainview; J. E. Helm, Halfway, Wesley Pope, Abernathy, and Bill Brington, Petersburg.

Acting as spokesman for the Hale Center hospital group was Berwin Tilson, Plainview area farmer. Tilson said the group was making the request for county aid since the Court recently approved payment of \$2,000 a month to Central Plains General Hospital for the same type of care.

Tilson presented figures showing that total write-offs for Hi-Plains Hospital had varied from \$20,814.30 to \$37,849.62 over the past five years.

The largest figure was in the current year, and Tilson estimated that \$22,000 of the amount was for indigent care. Of the total charge-offs in 1969, Tilson said \$16,609.72 was listed to persons with addresses in Plainview, Abernathy, Gotton Center and Petersburg. Tilson said the figures were listed to show the Hale Center hospital was used by residents from all parts of Hale County.

Tilson said the hospital board had decided to ask the Court for a \$1,000 a month payment for indigent care.

Others Present
Also meeting with the Court on behalf of the hospital were Hale Center Mayor Willie Dyer, Chamber of Commerce Manager Lee Dent, hospital administrator Gordon Russell, C-C President Keith Brashear and board members Wesley Davis, Joe Stokes and Cecil Thomas.

Commissioners decided to study the request more completely before taking action.

In the afternoon part of the session, the Court listened to a general review of the South Plains Association of Governments by the Lubbock County representatives and executive director Alken Deyo.

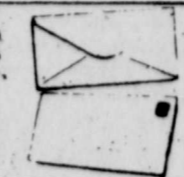
Following the brief explanation, the Court asked Deyo to meet with them again on Jan. 26 for a more detailed explanation.

Salaries of precinct and county officials were raised by four per cent according to an earlier notice published by the County, Abernathy said District Judge John Boyd was still working on suggested raises for district officials.

In other activity at the meeting, the Court accepted a low bid of \$2,206.36 from Bob Grader Chevrolet for a new pickup truck to be used in Precinct Four.

From Mel Ryan



Following is a portion of a letter which the Rev. and Mrs. Conrad M. Ryan received from their son, Mel, who is on U.S. Army duty in Vietnam. His address is: Sgt. C. M. Ryan, Jr., 464-78-4878, Company L, Ranger 75th Infantry, 101st ABN (AM), APO San Francisco, Calif. 963383.

PARTS OF A LETTER FROM C. M. (MEL) RYAN, JR.

I have been assigned to the 101st Division Ranger Company. What it is is a long range Recon. Unit. We go out in 6-8 man teams to gather intelligence about the enemy. It may get a little hairy! In a month or so I'll be sent to a Recondo School here. We wear black berets, airborne Ranger tabs, and camouflaged jungle fatigues.

You wouldn't believe these little tiny people over here. They're all midgets, and they're tough as nails. Up here where I am its in the middle of the monsoon which means it rains constantly and it is cold. These little people wear shorts, no shoes, and they can walk faster carrying 100 lbs. than you or I could walk carrying nothing. I saw a V.N. woman carrying huge laundry bags crumpled, balancing them on their heads (no hands) walking in a double time down the street, an expression on their faces like it was no effort. You know all the poverty we saw in Old Mexico. Those people had it good compared to over here.

When I was in Okland, I called Barbara and she told me that at Ya'll thought I was bitter against men that didn't serve in the service. Maybe I left that impression unconsciously. I don't know. I'm not bitter against anyone just for not serving. I never feared getting drafted like everyone does. Young men now days fear the draft like they were automatically going to die in Nam when they get in it. They look on it as a menace, and an intrusion to their luxurious living like they owe their country and forefathers nothing for giving them the chance to go to universities, drive expensive autos, live in fine homes, and hold down \$25,000 a yr. jobs without any threat to their security at home. Many people care so much about just their individual selves that if it was left up to them to die to save their country from communism or any other destructive society we'd be overrun. There is prestige in the army or any other service. I don't want anyone feeling sorry for me because I'm in Nam. The one's that need feeling sorry for are the ones that just could care less. Many people use the excuse that they just don't believe in the war, but actually most of them don't know enough about the real reasons for being here, enough about the good that is being done here, and the hazards of just getting to decide whether they believe in it or not. Whether a person is pro or con for the war, our country has decided to fight communist aggression in South Vietnam. US G.I.'s, marines, etc. didn't decide to Most of us couldn't even vote for the men that make the decisions. But we are risking our lives in order that communism won't spread till it gets right there in our country and takes over. To me that is something to be proud of and not something to run from or evade. To me it is everyone's responsibility (bar none) to contribute in the effort. If a person's not physically able to, he should at least give strong support at home. I didn't get drafted, I joined and I'm glad. Don't get me wrong, I want peace as much as anyone but not a dishonorable one and not at any cost like people are demanding. I'm not bitter or resentful, but I am disappointed in many peoples attitudes toward the service, our foreign policies, leaders, their duties, etc.

BOYS VARSITY

This past week saw the Abernathy Antelopes break even losing one and winning one. The victory came at the expense of the Idalou Wildcats, as the Antelopes played Idalou 56-39. The loss was at the hands of Friona, the first district foe of the Antelopes. The score was 59-49 with the chiefs being on top.

Ronald Harkey led the Antelopes to the victory over Idalou with 12 points and 7 rebounds, Don Snodgrass had 11 points and 6 rebounds, Larry Klafka had 11 points and 4 rebounds, Jim Forbes scored 6 points and pulled down 10 rebounds, and Mike Kerr scored 10 points and collected 4 rebounds. Others scoring for the Antelopes were Gene Cannon with 2, and Keith Lambert with 4. The Antelopes played good defense in holding Idalou to 39 points. Idalou's season record after Tuesday night game was 8-5. All together the Lopes took 45 rebounds off the boards.

The loss to Friona came last Friday night and left the Antelopes still looking for a district win, but they will have to wait until after the Xmas vacation and the Muleshoe tournament, which the Lopes will play in January 2-3, 1970. Don Snodgrass led the scoring in the Friona game with 13; Bobby Klatt had 11 points and was the top rebounder with 12. Harkey scored 7 points, Mike Kerr had 5, Kirk Lane 4, Mark Harrison 2. Helping the Antelopes efforts in rebounding were Harkey with 10, Forbes with 6, and Snodgrass with 6.

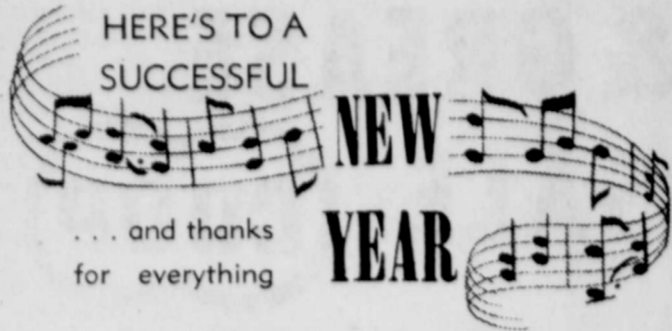

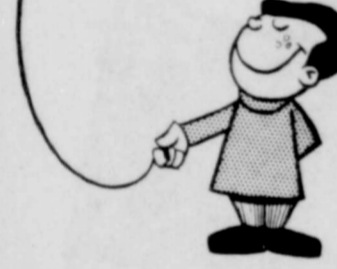
