

PARTS OF A LETTER FROM C. M. (MEL) RYAN, JR. I have been assigned to the

101 st. Division Ranger Company. What it is is a long range Recon. Unit. We go out in 6-8 man teams to gather intelligence about the enemy. It may get a little hairy! In a month or so I'll be sent to a Recondo School here. We wear black berets, airborne Ranger tabs, and camouflaged jungle fatiques.

You wouldn't believe these little tiny people over here. They're all midgets, and they-'re tough as nails. Up here wh-ere I am its in the middle of the monsoon which means it rains constantly and it is cold. These little people wear shorts, no shoes, and they can walk faster carrying 100 lbs. than you or I could walk carrying

nothing. I saw a V.N. women carrying huge laundary bags cram packed, balancing them on their heads (no hands) walking in a double time down the street, an expression on their faces like it was no effort. You know all the poverty we saw in Old Mexico. Those people had it good compared to over

here. When I was in Okland, I called Barbara and she told me that Ya'll thought I was bitter against men that didn't serve in the service.
