Hale County Savings Association Becomes FSLIC Member

Officers of Hale County Savings Association were notified early this week that the institution has been accepted for membership in the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation.

At the same time, they were told that the Association's insurance application had been approved, effective the same day.

The notification means that accounts in the Association now are insured up to \$20,000 by the FSLIC.

Started in November, 1965, the Association received conditional approval for membership on Dec. 30, 1969.

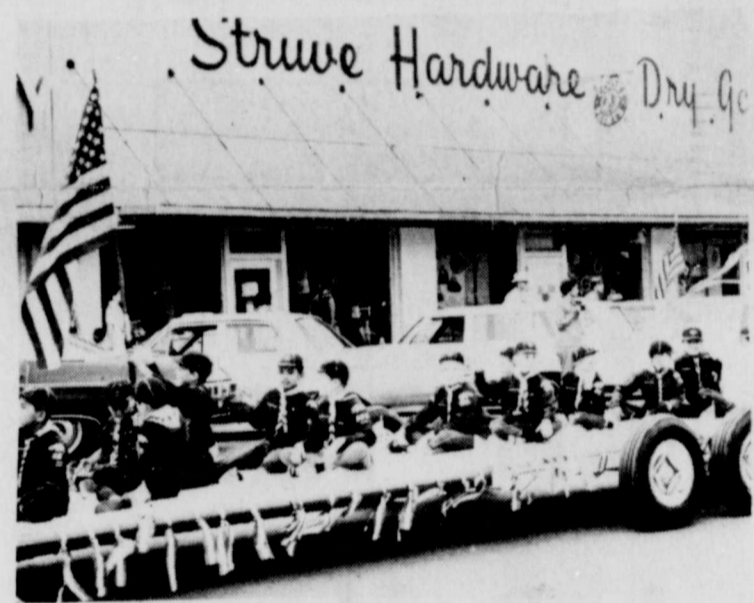
On June 9, 1969, the Association moved from its location in the 900 block of Broadway to 701 Broadway.

A statement of condition for June listed total assets of the Association at \$1,946,828.19.

Savings accounts totaled \$1,544,479.25, while permanent capital surplus and reserves totaled \$288,327.01.

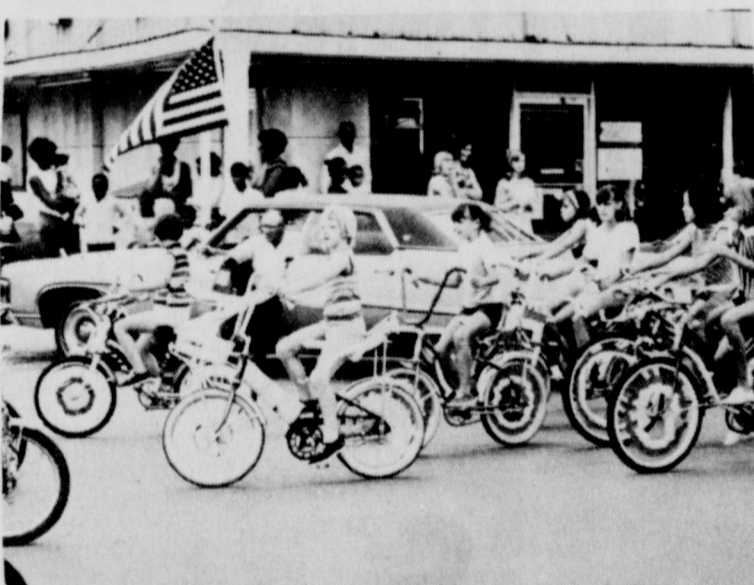

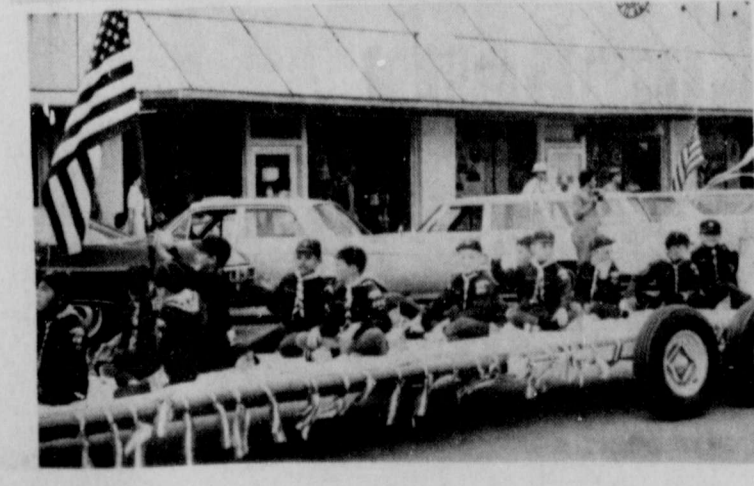
Mr. Nystel holds real estate brokerage licenses in both Texas and New Mexico, and was among the first to obtain security license to deal in oil leases many years.

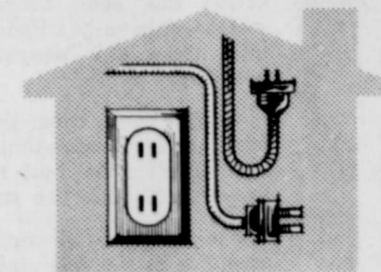
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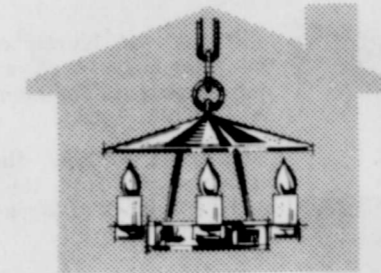

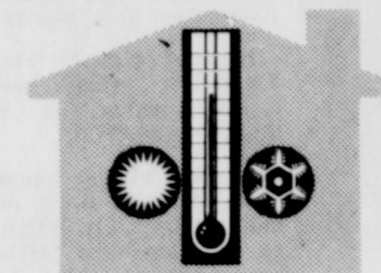

REPORT GIVEN ON ENCEPHALITIS

The Hale County Health Department and the Arboreal Disease Section, Ecological Investigation Program, U.S. Public Health Service have completed the 1969 encephalitis survey in the Abernathy and Petersburg elementary schools. The survey has been conducted annually since 1967 and is designed to discover how many of the school children are exposed each summer to the mosquito-transmitted viruses that cause encephalitis ("sleeping sickness").

gave blood specimens to be tested for encephalitis virus exposure. Subsequent laboratory tests have shown that 132 (38%) were positive in Abernathy and 117 (44%) in Petersburg. A positive test shows past exposure to one of the two viruses. However, all of these children had been exposed in years prior to 1969 none was exposed in 1969. The two participating agencies stressed that past exposure to an encephalitis virus has no effect on the present health of a person, and in fact, makes the person immune to any future illness from that virus.

They also expressed their gratitude for the excellent cooperation of the elemen-

tary school children, their parents, and school officials. Without such cooperation this important study could not have been done.

This and other cooperative Hale County-U.S. Public Health Service studies have led to several important points that parents should keep in mind this summer to help prevent encephalitis virus infection of themselves or their children. The important goal is to prevent exposure to the mosquitoes that carry the viruses. Some suggested methods are:

1. Keep all window and door screens in good repair.
2. Spend as little time outdoors as possible as sun-

set or for the two hours after-ward. (That is the time when the virus-carrying mosquitoes are most active.)

3. When outdoors in the evening, use insect repellent.

4. Whenever an infant is outdoors in the evenings, keep the crib covered with mosquito netting.

Interested persons should call the Plainview-Hale County Health Department (293-1350) or the U.S. Public Health Service encephalitis research field station (293-5176) for more information.

The State of Texas also has a good or bad fire record credit which is applied to your premium when it is figured. If a City has a good record you receive a credit and if it has a bad record you receive a charge. The City of Abernathy had a 15% credit for 1969.

Figuring at this rate, if Abernathy had not had a Fire Department in 1969 your TOTAL Fire premium would have been \$48,022.00 minus \$30,734.63--64% Discount
