# Kindergarten Registration Is August 25th

Gid Adkisson, Director of Bilingual and Special Education, announced that registration for the bilingual kindergarten will be held Tuesday, August 25, 1970, from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. along with registration for other elementary grades. Registration will be held in the kindergarten room in the west end of the elementary building. All children who are five years old on or before September 1, 1970 are eligible to attend. Children who wish to enroll must have a birth certificate and must have been vaccinated for smallpox.

There will be three kindergarten classes during the coming school term in which both the English and Spanish languages will be used for instruction. Kindergarten classes will begin at 8:45 and end at 3:00 p.m. Children attending kindergarten will be eligible to ride school buses both to and from school.

There will also be three first grade rooms participating in the bilingual program. The first priority in assignment to these classes will go to children who attended the bilingual kindergarten during the 1969-70 school year. Part of the instruction in these classes will be by closed circuit television and there will be bilingual aides assigned to each class to assist the teacher with the language development program.

(Notice to Parents: The birth certificate you present when your child registers MUST be a CERTIFIED birth certificate. The "keepsake" certificate which the hospital issued when your child was born cannot be accepted as legal proof of age.

# Elementary Registration Is Scheduled

Jerry Moorhead, principal of Abernathy Elementary School, announced that students will register for the 1970-1971 school year Tuesday, August 25 from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. After registering that day, students will be free to leave. The new school term starts Wednesday moorling, August 26, at \$2.55 o'clock.

Third graders will register in Rooms 10 and 11.
Fourth grade registration

will be in Rooms 5 and 6.

Those in the fifth grade will register in Rooms 1 and 2.




