From Last Week)

Approximately four miles of parallel terraces have been installed recently on the Joe Lovelace farm about four miles north of Abernathy. Mr. Lovelace is getting cost share assistance through the Great Plains Conservation Program. This program is paying 70% or 7¢ per foot of terrace constructed. Joe plans to parallel terrace the remainder of his slopfarm land next year. These terraces eliminate the point rows of odd areas everyone associates with terrac-

es. There is only one odd area in this system of parallel terraces on the Lovelace faram. Most of the terraces are designed to be level to hold any rainfall, but some are graded to keep them pa-

Mr. Bob Riley is in the process of installing about 21/2 miles of these terraces on his farm west of Abernathy now. Mr. Fred Blumenstock is planning to parallel terrace his farm this fall. For assistance, the Soil Conservation Service can design, layout, and provide cost share assistance through the GPCP to help speed up the application of soil and water conservation practices.



School Here Has **Share In Grant**

Congressman Bob Price was informed today that nine 18th District schools have received funds for education of children of migrant agricultural workers

for the 1970-71 school year.
The amount of the grant requested was \$11,420,214. The amount granted is \$3,172,282. Although the program is approved for the total amount requested, funding may, not be granted until Congress passes the Education Appropriations Bill for the fiscal year ending June

The 18th District school districts receiving grants are:Bail-County (Muleshoe); Castro County (Dimmitt and Hart); Deaf Smith County (Hereford); Hale County (Abernathy, Hale Center and Petersburg); Lamb County (Olton).
