Something has been brought to my attention that I feel that we as responsible citizens of Abernathy should and must do something about.

It concerns the harassment of freshmen by upperclassmen.

Ihave lived in this community now for almost three years, and this harassment has continually gotten worse and worse.

As I understand the latest incident, it was a game played with a younger boy by some olderboys. A record was pla-yed, and if the younger boy could not identify the record, his punishment was chosen for him. He was either given licks with a tennis racket or he was kicked once with a boot heel. If he flinched from the kick with the boot heel, then he would get two more.

If we let this sort of thing continue, one of these days someone is going to kill or maim someone for life. Then it will be too late to do anything

If the young people of Abernathy High School would realize that God has never allowed any of us to abuse another person, then I believe that they would refrain from doing any people of Abernathy to put a stop to this right now. It is not a Christian thing to do; neither is it something for civilized people to enjoy the suffering of other people.
