SNOW STORM STRIKES AREA

A snow storm struck this area Saturday night and Sunday. The storm began Saturday night with a thunderstorm, which glazed over streets and highways with ice and sleet followed by a six and one-half inch snowfall. Traffic was held to a snail's pace by the dangerous driving conditions. Schools here and at many places over the South Plains were closed Monday due to the ice-covered streets and roads.

Mrs. Vera Hawkins, who operated the local weather-reporting service in the absence of M. O. Hood, local weather observer, said Abernathy received 6 1/2 inches of snow, which produced .22 of an inch of moisture. Although small, the .22 of an inch of moisture was most welcome. This area was the driest it had been in many years. No moisture had been received since early last fall.

A number of Abernathians who left Saturday on trips were stranded. The Joe Blair family was stranded in Borger, where they were visiting.

The Texas Panhandle was under blizzard conditions with deep snowfall and winds gusting to 50 and 60 miles an hour. Traffic in that area and down as far as a point north of Plainview was paralyzed by the storm. In fact, highways in that area were closed to additional traffic. The Highway Department, Department of Public Safety and National Guard were busy rescuing motorists stranded along the highways in the Panhandle and down to near Plainview.

Two Abernathians also were stranded in Oklahoma, Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Chapman were unable to return home from Oklahoma City Sunday due to the snowstorm in that area and along the Texas Highways. They went to Oklahoma Saturday to visit his brother, William B. Chapman, and family.

Something has been brought to my attention that I feel that we as responsible citizens of Abernathy should and must do something about.

It concerns the harassment of freshmen by upperclassmen.

I have lived in this community now for almost three years, and this harassment has continually gotten worse and worse.

As I understand the latest incident, it was a game played with a younger boy by some older boys. A record was played, and if the younger boy could not identify the record, his punishment was chosen for him. He was either given licks with a tennis racket or he was kicked once with a boot heel. If he flinched from the kick with the boot heel, then he would get two more.

If we let this sort of thing continue, one of these days someone is going to kill or maim someone for life. Then it will be too late to do anything about it.

If the young people of Abernathy High School would realize that God has never allowed any of us to abuse another person, then I believe that they would refrain from doing any of this. Please let me appeal to the parents and the young people of Abernathy to put a stop to this right now. It is not a Christian thing to do; neither is it something for civilized people to enjoy the suffering of other people.

Last rites for Roy E. Jones, 58, were held Saturday at Abernathy First United Methodist Church with the Rev. Conrad M. Ryan, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Abernathy Cemetery directed by Chambers Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were Waymon Jones, Lloyd Jones, E. M. Jones, J. J. Billy Raybon, Morris Kerr, and Bill Moore.

Mr. Jones died at his home here early Thursday morning after an apparent heart attack.

Survivors are his wife, Maudie; a twin brother, Robert, of San Jose, Calif.; and two sisters, Mrs. Louise Burnett of Abernathy and Miss Ruth Jones of Clovis.

Roy and Maudie have owned and operated a bookkeeping service in Abernathy for many years. He was a former manager of Service Grain & Fertilizer Co. here.

Roy was a native of Abernathy. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. Ed Jones, early-day residents of this community.

Roy had a long record of service on the Abernathy City Council. He was an Alderman from 1961 to 1963; served as mayor from 1963 to 1968. He was named City Manager Oct. 8, 1968, a position he held at the time of his death.

Jones was a former youth leader in Abernathy Methodist Church. He was a director of the Chamber of Commerce and a member of the Lions Club. During World War II he was in the Navy.

J. FRANK NIX, FORMER PASTOR, HERE, DIES

The Rev. J. Frank Nix, 88, a former pastor of Abernathy First Baptist Church, died Tuesday, Feb. 16, in a Waco hospital.

Funeral rites were held Thursday in Lubbock First Baptist Church. Officiating were Dr. J. Ralph Grant, pastor emeritus of that church; Dr. Lee Hemphill of Abilene, and the Rev. J. T. Bolding, associate pastor of the Lubbock church. Burial was in Resthaven Memorial Park, Lubbock, directed by Sanders Funeral Home.

The Rev. Mr. Nix was ordained at Sunset Baptist Church in Floyd County in 1907 while teaching in an elementary school. He became pastor of the Sunset Baptist Church the following year and continued teaching until his marriage in 1909.

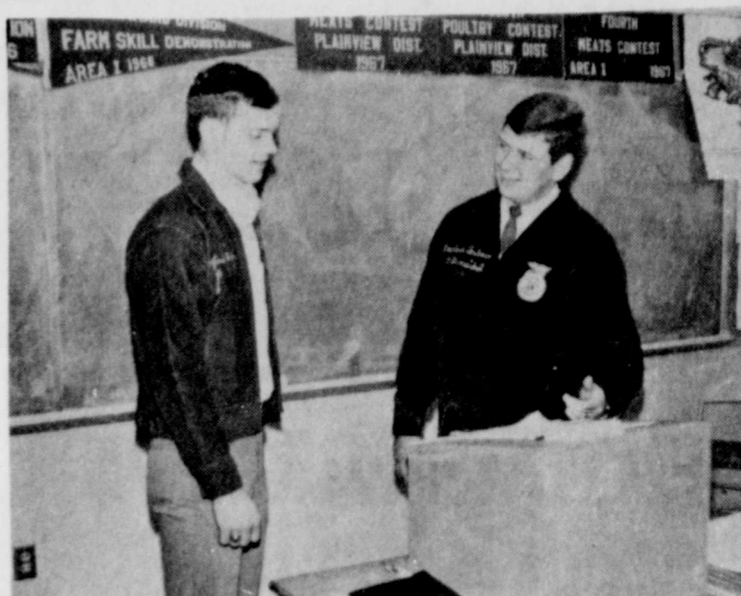
Filed On Land He and Mrs. Nix moved to New Mexico and farmed on land there which he farmed while serving as pastor of four small churches in the surrounding area.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5)
Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;

"(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

"(3) Needy blind persons;

"(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation

Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy disabled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children."

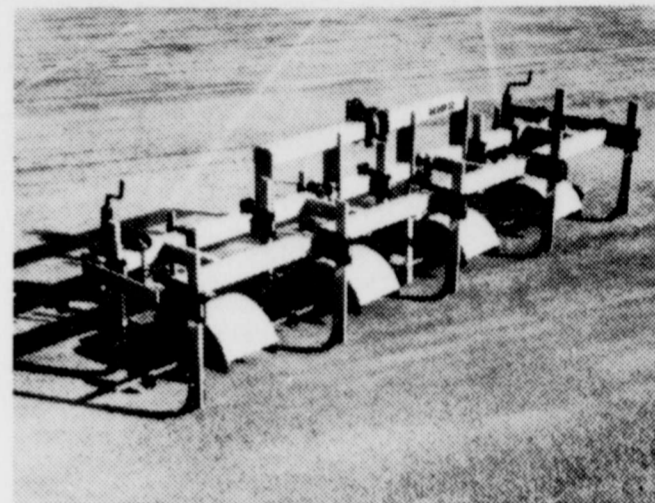

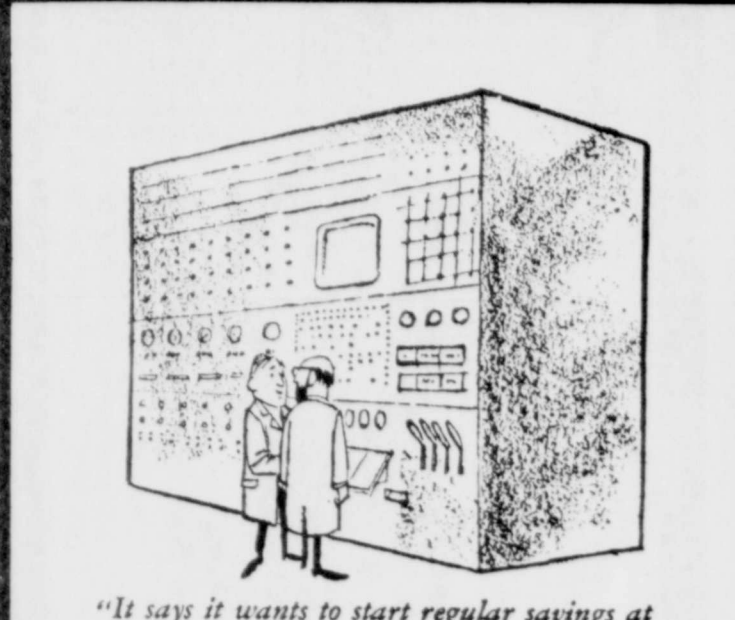
