





## The Struves' 5-Month Trip

(Editor's Note: Following is the third story in a series which The Review requested Mr. and Mrs. Arno Struve to write about their five-month trip.)

The first two articles of this series were written in long hand. Because of this the type setter had to do some guessing. As a consequence I must first make some corrections. In the first article reference was made to the "Ginza" area of Tokyo, to the Japanese city of Hamamatsu, and to the make of piano Yamaha. These are the correct spellings. After looking at the writing the type setter had to go by I guess she did pretty well at that but we decided I'd better type the re-

A sentence in the second article was a bit misleading. The word "when" should be replaced by "unless" and the sentence then would read correctly as follows: "Un ss a side road coming in to a main road from your right has a stop or yield sign a car coming from it has the absolute right of way... This causes a driver to keep an alert and wary eye to the right even though he may be travelling on a much traveled main highway.

The story so far has covered cer travels up to Brisbane, Queensland. There isn't much to tell about Brisbane itself. It is a very large city from the standpoint of area but not from the standpoint of population. We began to realize when we got to Brisbane how much more the Australians grow beautiful flowers and trees then we do in the U.S. As we went along throughout our 21/2 months in Australia this realization was found to be universal for the whole country except in the dry central part and in the very hot northwest. It was also true of New Zealand. Every city of any size has as a part of its parks system a conservatory where they display vast arrays of beautiful flowers. The yards surrounding the

their beautiful yards. They seen to vie with their neighbors to see if they can outdo one another. It is a pleasure just to drive around the streets and view the lovely colors. Of course many of the plants were completely strange to us. Minnie tried to learn about many of the more beautiful ones but it was just too overwhelming for me.

From Brisbane we took an all Gold Coast southeast of Brisbane along the ocean. The ocean front is an expanse of many miles of beautiful sandy beaches. The most famous town or resort in this area is called Surfers Paradise. but there are many more of the resorts. There is practically no

differentiation between one town and the next. Of course the bad part of this beautiful area is the commercialization that goes with the caming of hordes of people for recreation. The beaches are covered with people and the shops are crowded . It was not our idea of "seeing the country" to go to places su-ch as this and we resolved to avoid all such places in the futu-

We had to make a major travel decision while we were in Brisbane. We had thought about going to the Great Barrier Reef that parallels the coast of Australia beginning several hundred miles north of Brisbane. The coral reef is world famous and quite a sight to see but we began to realize the limitations of being able to see everything that one might like to see. Because of the great distance involved in gett-ing to the reef, the uncertainty of great distance involved in get ting to the reef, the uncertainty of the weather at the time of the year we were there and the realization that the Great Barrier Reef is really a series of resorts that are highly commercialized, we deceided against going any fur-

ther in that direction. While in Brisbane we visited wi th a couple we had met in Tokyo, and again by pure chance in Hong Kong, Mr. and Mrs. Weldock were the first of a number of couples that we were previleged to get acquainted with as we traveled. Mr. Waldock has a buther shop and Mrs. Waldock has a lovely gift shop. They are a fine churchgoing people who are busy helping others. Not on-Iv have they reared a family of their own but have taken several other parentless children and giv en them a home. With the sharing of a few hours with these wonderful people another realization began to dawn upon us and that was that meeting people was the very best part of travel.

Our train from Brisbane westward was a vintage piece of rail-way equipment. The railroad itself is narrow gauge and the cars are older than any I have everse en. The platforms at each end of the cars are completely open to the air. They make good places to stand and take pictures as the train travels through the country side. We took about 2500 pictures on our entire trip plus the movies we made. We might try to be saving on food and lodging but we always kept plenty of film. We have not received the two rolls of pictures that we made along this stretch. There is a good pos-sibility that we will have lost about 75 pictures. 

Just beyond the Great Dividing Range they still get pretty good rainfall but nothing like s much as they do on the east side. A large area just beyond the mountains is called the Darling Downs. The Downs area is very flat and is

an extensive and rich farming country. We took a bus from Toowoomba and rode about 50 miles out and doubled right back in order to see the Darling Downs. Our bus driver on this little side trip was a rancher. He was living Toowoomba to send his children to school there.
