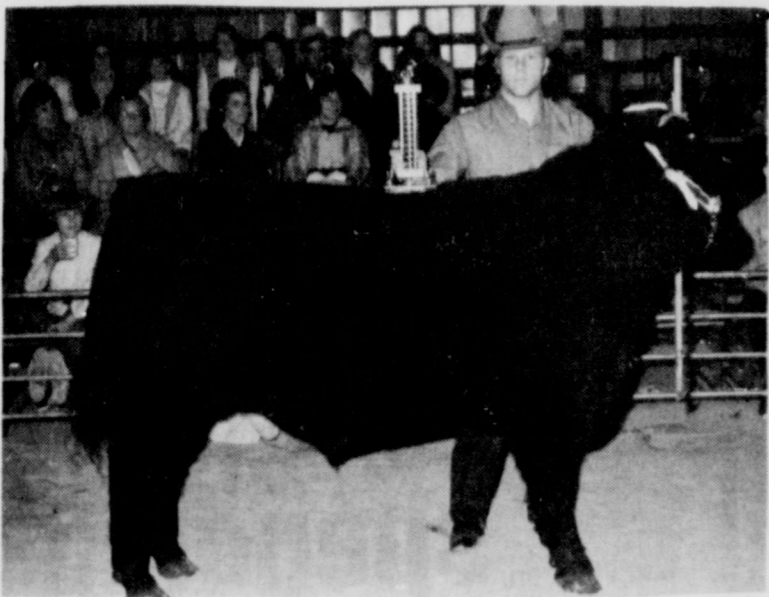

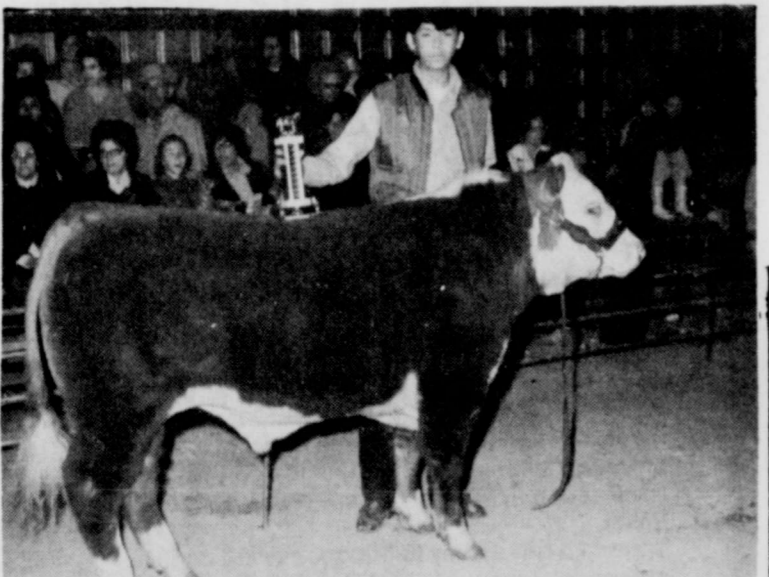

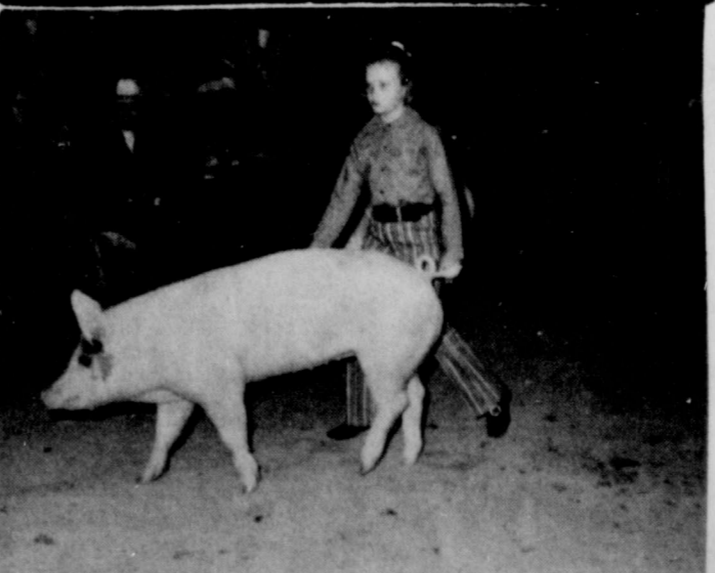
## Singing Set March 28th

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### The Struves' 5-Month Trip

(Editor's Note: Following is the third story in a series which The Review requested Mr. and Mrs. Arno Struve to write about their five-month trip.)

The first two articles of this series were written in long hand. Because of this the type setter had to do some guessing. As a consequence I must first make some corrections. In the first article reference was made to the "Ginza" area of Tokyo, to the Japanese city of Hamamatsu, and to the make of piano Yamaha. These are the correct spellings. After looking at the writing the type setter had to go by I guess she did pretty well at that but we decided I'd better type the rest.

A sentence in the second article was a bit misleading. The word "when" should be replaced by "unless" and the sentence then would read correctly as follows: "Unless a side road coming in to a main road from your right has a stop or yield sign a car coming from it has the absolute right of way..." This causes a driver to keep an alert and wary eye to the right even though he may be travelling on a much traveled main highway.

The story so far has covered our travels up to Brisbane, Queensland. There isn't much to tell about Brisbane itself. It is a very large city from the standpoint of area but not from the standpoint of population. We began to realize when we got to Brisbane how much more the Australians grow beautiful flowers and trees than we do in the U. S. As we went along throughout our 2 1/2 months in Australia this realization was found to be universal for the whole country except in the dry central part and in the very hot northwest. It was also true of New Zealand. Every city of any size has as a part of its park system a conservatory where they display vast arrays of beautiful flowers. The yards surrounding the homes are usually flower gardens. When they speak of their garden they don't mean vegetable garden, they have in mind their beautiful yards. They seem to vie with their neighbors to see if they can outdo one another. It is a pleasure just to drive around the streets and view the lovely colors. Of course many of the plants were completely strange to us. Minnie tried to learn about many of the more beautiful ones but it was just too overwhelming for me.

From Brisbane we took an all day tour to the area called the Gold Coast southeast of Brisbane along the ocean. The ocean front is an expanse of many miles of beautiful sandy beaches. The most famous town or resort in this area is called Surfers Paradise, but there are many more of the resorts. There is practically no differentiation between one town and the next. Of course the bad part of this beautiful area is the commercialization that goes with the coming of hordes of people for recreation. The beaches are covered with people and the shops are crowded. It was not our idea of "seeing the country" to go to places such as this and we resolved to avoid all such places in the future.

We had to make a major travel decision while we were in Brisbane. We had thought about going to the Great Barrier Reef that parallels the coast of Australia beginning several hundred miles north of Brisbane. The coral reef is world famous and quite a sight to see but we began to realize the limitations of being able to see everything that one might like to see. Because of the great distance involved in getting to the reef, the uncertainty of great distance involved in getting to the reef, the uncertainty of the weather at the time of the year we were there and the realization that the Great Barrier Reef is really a series of resorts that are highly commercialized, we decided against going any further in that direction.

While in Brisbane we visited with a couple we had met in Tokyo, and again by pure chance in Hong Kong. Mr. and Mrs. Waddock were the first of a number of couples that we were privileged to get acquainted with as we traveled. Mr. Waddock has a butcher shop and Mrs. Waddock has a lovely gift shop. They are a fine churchgoing people who are busy helping others. Not only have they reared a family of their own but have taken several other parentless children and given them a home. With the sharing of a few hours with these wonderful people another realization began to dawn upon us and that was that meeting people was the very best part of travel.

Our train from Brisbane westward was a vintage piece of railway equipment. The railroad itself is narrow gauge and the cars are older than any I have ever seen. The platforms at each end of the cars are completely open to the air. They make good places to stand and take pictures as the train travels through the countryside. We took about 2500 pictures on our entire trip plus the movies we made. We might try to be saving on food and lodging but we always kept plenty of film. We have not received the two rolls of pictures that we made along this stretch. There is a good possibility that we will have lost about 75 pictures. We have been corresponding with the Kodak Fr-

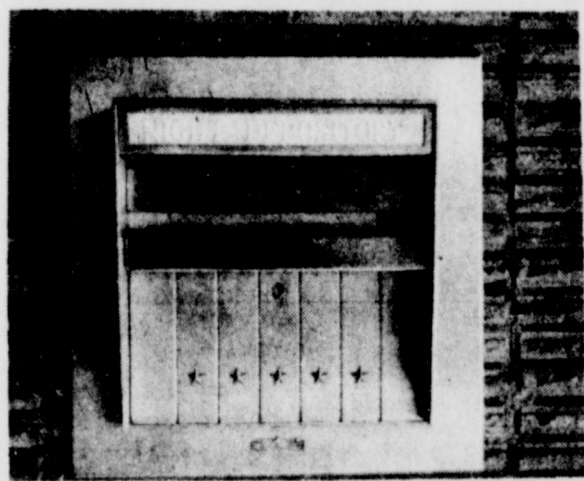

cessing plant in Melbourne about these but it has been our experience in the past that once a package of pictures is lost we might as well forget them and of course Kodak can't go out and duplicate them for us!

Our first stop west of Brisbane was a country town called Toowoomba. The name is an example of the many place names in Australia that are derived from aboriginal words. The town lies in the high altitudes of the Great Dividing Range which runs more or less parallel to the ocean the full north-south dimension of Australia. The range divides the country into two distinct parts, the moist eastern part which is very narrow, and the wide, arid western part that is very dry. Just beyond the Great Dividing Range they still get pretty good rainfall but nothing like as much as they do on the east side. A large area just beyond the mountains is called the Darling Downs. The Downs area is very flat and is an extensive and rich farming country. We took a bus from Toowoomba and rode about 50 miles out and doubled right back in order to see the Darling Downs. Our bus driver on this little side trip was a rancher. He was living in Toowoomba to send his children to school there. His ranch or "station" has had so little rainfall in so many years that he has had to take a bus driving job. He actually has two stations. One he said was only about 6,000 acres in size and the other which lies about 100 miles further out extends over 10,000 square miles. It has been at least eight years since they have had sufficient rain to produce any grass, but he said that when it did rain the grass would reappear overnight and make good grazing. His father-in-law and an old aborigine are the only two people left to look after the stations. They are hanging on in hopes that there will be better days ahead. Before we left Australia we heard that generally the drought had been broken. We hope that our bus driver was lucky and got good rains on his property.

Back in Toowoomba again the next day we went about seeing this almost delightful little mountain city. I say almost delightful because here we had our first introduction to swarms of flies. They are absolutely inescapable. They descend upon you in clouds. I kept my camera strap slapping around my head and on my back constantly without driving many of them off. These flies do not bite like our common flies do but they crawl around on you until you think you will go mad. The people who live there don't seem to mind them. These flies do not come into the houses as much as our flies do. If an enclosed area is slightly darkened they will stay pretty well away. And strangely enough the houses are without window screens.

We were adopted by a couple in Toowoomba who were staying at the same hotel we were. When we first spoke to them in the lobby of the hotel they were very reluctant to respond. We kind of made it a game to say good morning or offer some kind of greeting to the people around us as we went from place to place. It happened that we were later seated with these people at breakfast and soon a most cordial relationship developed, and for as long as they remained in Toowoomba they seemed to take the responsibility of seeing to it that we got to see everything that was worthwhile seeing. Actually we were never long without companionship from such traveling Australians as these.
