Letter To Pres. Nixon

Mr. Richard M. Nixon, President The United States of America The White House Washington, D.C.

Dear Mr. President,

As Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces, I want you to know that I think the action of the Court-martial Board in the case of Lt. Calley was wrong and should be corrected by you.

I am a former infantry officer and I was taught that the mission of the Infantry was to seek out and destroy the enemy. I feel sure that a great many of our casualties in Viet Nam were caused by "helpless" women and children who constructed and "set" booby traps, etc.

Now, the "Great" Uniform Code of Military Justice has ruled that Calley is guilty of pre-meditated murder—that is a bunch of hog-wash!!

I want you to know one thing, if this mistake is not corrected, then the United States of America has lost one patriotic citizen. I will cease to be a proponent of ROTC and the Army cause and do what I can to discourage the young men in the Abernathy Schools from being a part of something as outrageous as the Calley case. I hope my two young sons never become an infantry officer. I hope they serve their country but not as a Commissioned Officer.

Forty different subjects are taught at the school, involving nearly 2,000 students per year. Instructors for the classes are specialists in feed, fertilizer, petroleum, farm supplies and other product areas from Farmland's headquarters office in Kansas City.

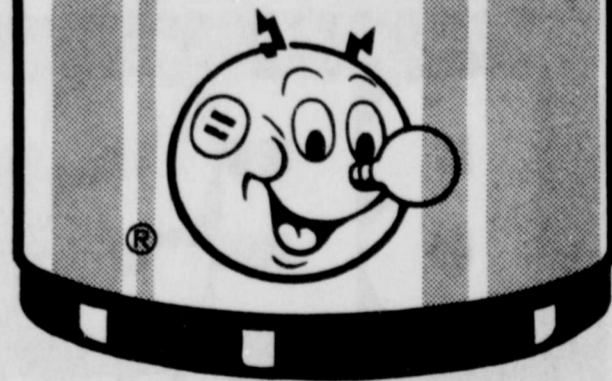

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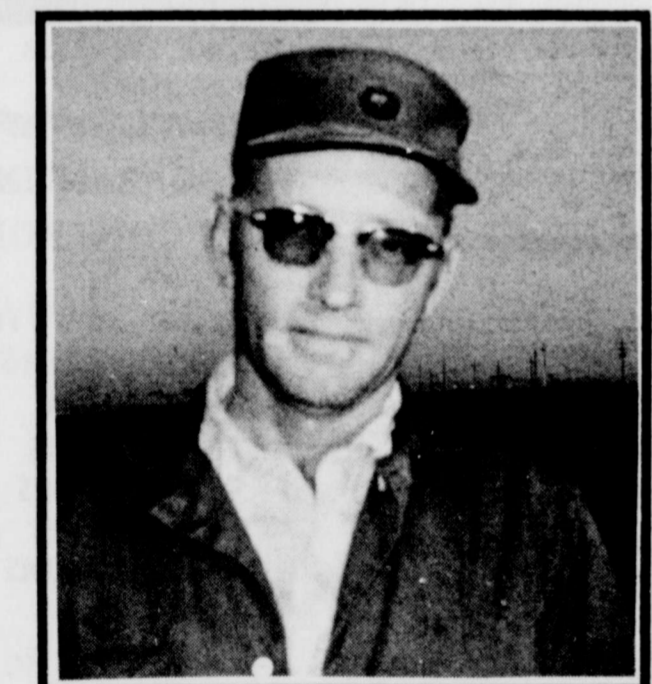


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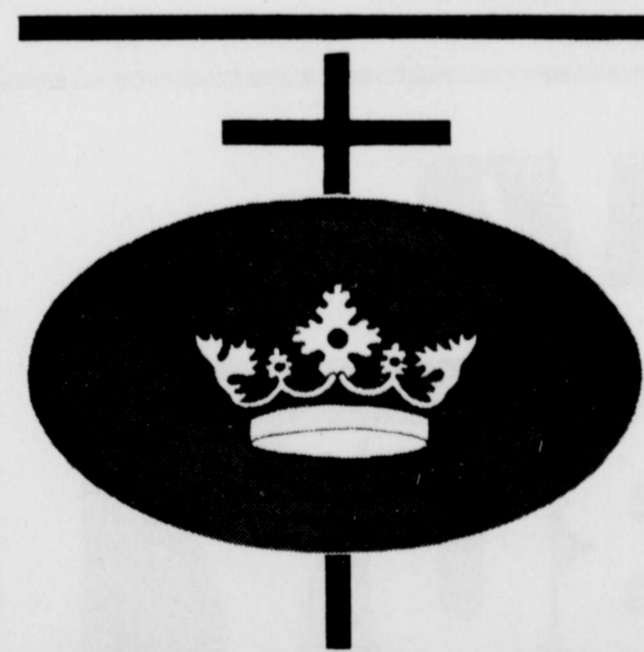
