## **Antelopes** Beat Buffs, 12 to 6

The Abernathy Antelopes opened the 1971 season on a winning note, beating Petersburg 12-0 to gain some measure of revenge for the loss to the Butts in 19 yo. After recovering an onside kick by the Buffs the Lopespaced by the hard running of Bobby Rogers, used up half of the first period in marching to a 6-0 lead. The T-D came on a one yard blast off right tackle by Rogers. The kick attempt was wide and The kick attempt was wide and the Lopes kicked off holding a 6-0 advantage. It didn't last long. On the first play from scrimmage by the Buffs, speedy halfback Jay Thompson slanted off left tackle and raced 65 yards without being touched by a long dethout being touched by a Lope de-fender. The extra point try was blocked by Johnny Hemphill, who made up for his missed point try after the Lopes touchdown.

Late in the second quarter, the Lopes opened up their passing game. Q.B. Dave Davenport hit end Kent Snodgrass in the end zone for an apparent T.D., inter-ference against the Antelope receiver and the play was called back. The first half ended with

n either team scoring again.
In the second half both teams played tough defense to keep each other's offense from mounting any consistent drive. And it was the Antelope detense that came up with the winning T.D. and late in the game halted the Buffs on the 15 yard line to preserve the

victory.

Defensive end Jackie McGaugh
grabbed a mid-air fumble and quickly loteraled to Bobby Rogers who raced 65 yards for the winning T-D. The fumble was caused by a tough defensive charge

by Dick Rogers. A pass for the two extra points was no good. After receving the kick-off the Buffs launced a drive that carried them to the Antelope 15 yard line. There two great defensive plays one by Johnny Hemphill and the other by David Lovelace, halted the drive the lopes held on to the ball to maintain thier victory.

Coach Luke Nickerson said, of his charges, "We were pleased with the physical effort of our team, they all played their best on offense and defense. The mistakes we made were all mental and these will be eliminated with experience and more work. I was especially pleased with the quick thinking of our kids on defense when Jackie got the fumble and gave the ball to Bobby. Also the good-line stand in the last quarter showed the courage and determination of this team. We beat a great football team and are proud of this; but we know we have our work cut out for

us this week. The Lopes will host the no. 3 ranked team in the state, The Seagraves Eagles, this Friday night. Seagraves, winner of one game this year, will come to Abernathy with revenge on their minds, well remembering the upset loss to the Lopes last year when they were ranked first in the state.

"They are big, strong, and a very powerful team", Coach Bob Roscoe stated after scouting the Eagles. "Their fullback, 220 pound Mike Coyce, is a great runner, and they depend on power and size, but their quarterback, Maurice



By MANCIE KING Social Security Representative

Q. I may be moving in about three months. Should I come into the social security office if I decide to move to change the address on my social security checks?

A. Normally we can arrange for your change of address by telephone and save you a trip to the office. Call us when you have made your decision about moving and know what your new address will be, including your new zip code. We will need to know the name or names of person(s) moving and the claim number of each. The names and claim numbers should be exactly as shown on the monthly checks. If you don't have the exact information, call or drop in to see us anyway. We will

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. This ordinance shall be known as the JUNK MOTOR VEHICLE ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS. SECTION 2. The following terms whenever used or referred to in this ordinance shall have the following respective meaning

unless a different meaning clearly appears from the context:

- (a) City shall mean the city of Abernathy, Texas.
- (b) Police department shall mean the police department of the city.
- (c) Demolisher means any person whose business is to convert the motor vehicle into processed scrap or scrap metal or otherwise to wreck or dismantle motor Junk vehicle means any motor vehicle as defined in Section 1 of Article 827 (a), Vernon's Texas Penal Code as amended, which is inoperative and which does

not have lawfully affixed thereto both an unexpired license plate or plates and a valid motor vehicle safety inspection certificate and which is wrecked;

dismantled; partially dismantled; or discarded. (e) Motor vehicle means any motor vehicle subject to registration pursuant to the Texas Certificate of Title Act.

SECTION 3. Junk vehicles which are located in any place within the city where they are visible from a public place or public right-of-way are detrimental to the safety and welfare of the general public, tending to reduce the value of private property, to invite vandalism, to create fire hazards, to constitute an attractive nuisance, creating a hazard to the health and safety of minors, and produce urban blight which is adverse to the maintenance and continuing development of the city, and such vehicles are, therefore declared to be a public nuisance.

SECTION 4. The city may abate and remove junk vehicles or parts thereof, as public nuisances, from private property or public property under the following provisions:

(a) A notice shall be given to the owner or the occupant of the premises whereupon such public nuisance exists, which notice shall state the nature of the public nuisance and that it must be removed and abated within 10 days and further that a request for a hearing must be made before expiration of said 10 day period. The notice is to be mailed, by certified or registered mail with a five day return requested. If the notice is returned undelivered by the United States Post Office, official action to abate said nuisance shall be continued to a date not less than 10 days from the date of

(b) A public hearing, prior to the removal of the vehicle or part thereof as a public nuisance, is to be held before the city manager of the city, when such a hearing is requested by the owner or occupant of the premises on which said vehicle is located, within 10 days after service of notice to abate the nuisance Any order requiring the removal of any vehicle or part thereof shall nclude a description of the vehicle, and the correct identification number and license number of the vehicle, if available at the site.

c) After a vehicle has been removed, pursuant to the provisions of this section, it shall not be reconstructed or made operable

(d) Notice shall be given to the Texas Highway Department within 5 days after the date of removal, identifying the vehicle or

(e) The provisions of this section shall not apply to (1) a vehicle or part thereof which is completely enclosed within a building in a lawful manner where it is not visible from the street or other public or private property; or (2) a vehicle or part thereof which is stored or parked in a lawful manner on private property in connection with the business of a licensed vehicle dealer or a junk

SECTION 5. The provisions of this ordinance shall be administered by the city manager of the city, who is a regularly salaried full-time employee of the city, except that the removal of vehicles or parts thereof from property may be by any person duly authorized by the city manager of the city.

SECTION 6. The city manager of the city, or any member of the police department duly authorized by such city manager, may enter upon private property for the purposes specified in this ordinance to examine vehicles or parts thereof, obtain information a a vehicle or parts thereof declared to be a nuisance pursuant to this ordinance. The city recorder of the city shall have authority to issue all orders necessary to enforce this ordinance.

SECTION 7. If any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase or provision of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or be held unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole or any part or provision thereof, other than the part so decided to be invalid or held to be unconstitutional.

 $\underline{\tt SECTION}$  8. All other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed. SECTION 9This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.

ORDINANCE NO. / 79

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE PARKING OF VEHICLES WITHIN THE RIGHT OF WAY PROVIDED FOR F.M. 597, 1ST STREET, FROM THE CENTER LINE OF AVENUE F EASTERLY TO THE CENTER LINE OF LOOP 369, AVENUE D; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY; PROVIDING FOR EFFECTIVE DATE AND PUBLICATION.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Abernathy has affirmatively determined by prohibiting the parking of vehicles within the right of way provided for F.M. 597, 1st Street, from the center line of Avenue F easterly to the center line of Loop 369, Avenue D, the movement of traffic on this roadway may be facilitated and the danger of vehicle to vehicle conflict may be reduced.

NOW THEREFORE, LE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS

SECTION 1. From and after the effective date of this Ordinance it shall be unlawful to park any vehicle within the rights of way provided for F.M. 597, 1st Street, in the areas defined as follows:

- (a) For the north side of the roadway, the north one-half of the rights of way provided, beginning at the point of intersection with the center line of the north approach of Avenue F and extending easterly for 750 feet more or less to the point of intersection with the center line of
- (b) For the south side of the roadway, the south one-half of the rights of way provided, beginning at the point of intersection with the center line of the south approach of Avenue F easterly for 700 feet more or less to the point of intersection with the center line of Avenue D.

SECTION 2: Standard signs, white reflectorized background with red legend, bearing the legend "No Parking Any Time", shall be erected on both sides of F. M. 597, 1st Street, accordingly spaced to adequately inform the public that the privilege of vehicular parking has been removed.

SECTION 3:Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or shall fail to comply therewith or with any of the requirements thereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdeamea and shall be liable to pay a fine, and upon conviction of any such violation shall be fined in a sum of not less than ONE DOLLAR (\$1.00) nor more than TWO hUNDRED DOLLARS (\$200.00)

SECTION 4: This ordinance shall take effect from and after the date of its publication as provided by law, which publication shall be sufficient if it contains the caption of this ordinance and states the penalty provided herein for the violation thereof.
