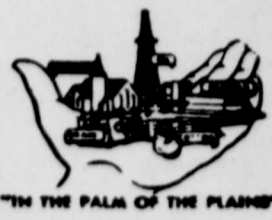

Couple To Celebrate Golden Wedding Event



MR. and MRS. T. E. LUTRICK, lifelong area residents, will celebrate their 50th Wedding Anniversary with open house in their home from 3 to 6 p.m. Sunday, September 26, 1971.

Hosting the event will be the couple's children and grandchildren. Mr. and Mrs. Lutrick's sons are Charles of Lubbock, Lewis and Harvey of Abernathy. Their daughters are Ann, Mrs. Harold McCune of Abernathy and Bell, Mrs. Jack Baker of La Porte, Texas.

Decorations in the home will carry out a theme of gold and white. The three tiered cake and punch will be served by the couple's granddaughters, Mrs. Gary Matster, the former Linda Lutrick, of Amarillo and Miss Dreunna McCune of Abernathy. Granddaughters Misses Cindy Baker of La Porte and Carrie Lutrick of Abernathy will register guests.

Both Mabel Pipkin and Ed Lutrick's families came to the plains in the early 1890's. Mrs. Lutrick's grandfather, J. C. Pipkin, came to the plains in 1890 and camped with his family on the draw south of Plainview for about two weeks. Antelope and wild horses were seen roaming the plains in herds of hundreds then. Mr. Pipkin opened the first general store in Plainview in 1891.

After this the Pipkin family moved to Canyon and then back to Plainview where they lived for several years. They then moved to the Lakeview community northeast of Abernathy where they operated a store and filling station until Mr. Pipkin's death in 1936. Mrs. Pipkin then made her home with her children before moving to Plainview to make her home alone. She lived in Abernathy a short while until failing health necessitated her being in a convalescent home in Amarillo until her death in 1967.

Mabel attended school in Abernathy's first school and Mrs. E. M. Legg was her first teacher. She was the wife of Dr. E. M. Legg who practiced in the Abernathy area from 1910 until his death in 1915.

Ed's father J. H. Lutrick came to the plains in the fall of 1891 from Athens, Texas and bought a section of land. In July 1892 he brought his family out here. The family made their home in a half dug-out on their farm north east of what is now Abernathy. The family at that time consisted of Carrie, Robert, Ruby and John. The other children, T. E. and Laura Elizabeth (Doll) were born and raised here on the plains.

School Board Set Grooming Requirements

The Board of Education of the Abernathy Independent School District met in regular session on September 6th, at 8:00 p.m. in the board room of the high school. In regular action, the board approved payment of bills for the previous month. Fund raising activities of the 1971-72 school year were approved as follows: junior play, senior play, band magazine sales, FHA Christmas bake sale, and FFA Christmas fruit sale. Regular reports presented included the tax collection report for the school year showing 98.39% of the taxes as having been collected. Also discussed was the one week pre-school workshop for teachers which is now a part of the Minimum Foundation 190 day school year program. The enrollment report for the first week was given which revealed enrollment to be the same as last year. The total number of students enrolled is 1159, including kindergarten.

In other action, the board approved the sale of a used school bus. Sealed bids were taken and the high bid was \$1150.00. The board also inspected the new Junior High Science lab which was purchased with local and NDEA Funds. This is a complete science lab with gas, water and electricity and will allow junior high students to have science lab for the first time. Other items on the agenda included a discussion of the wage and price freeze which affected the school personnel and the local schools participation in the National "Right to Read" program. The board clarified the school dress and grooming policy, concerning hair length and style for boys. The policy states that the length of hair in the back shall not extend below the collar of a dress shirt and shall be no longer than the eyebrows in front, side burns are allowed to be the length of the lobe of the ear but the face must be clean shaven. Hair on the sides must be combed so that the tops of the ears show.

The next regular session of the board will be October 4th, at 8:00 p.m. Those in attendance at the meeting were: L. J. Antelopes Down Seagraves Squad

The state ranked Seagraves Eagles came into town last Friday night with revenge on their minds; but despite the rains, wind, and cold the Abernathy Antelopes sent them home with their first loss of the year and their second loss to the Antelopes in as many years. Perhaps the turning point of the game was when the Lopes won the toss and elected to defend the north goal. With the wind facing them, and a slippery ball to contend with, the Seagraves Eagles gave up the ball to the Lopes on their own 24 yard line often the tough Antelope defense had forced them into a punting situation. From there the ball control offense of the Lopes took over and drove the ball on into the end zone for the score. Tailback Bobby Rogers scored the score on a two yard plunge and Joe Evans kicked the extra point.

The Lope defense was stingy all night, allowing only four first downs and one T-D. Playing without starters Jackie McCaugh and Dick Rogers, the defense time and again stopped the highly touted power runners for Seagraves. The Lopes recovered five fumbles, intercepted one pass, and constantly stopped the threats of the Eagles. The T-D the Eagles scored on the Lope defense came on a 16 yd. run by F.B. Mike Casey. This was the only let down the defense suffered, and quickly made up for this by getting the ball back by forcing a Seagraves fumble.

The second Lope score came on a 3 yd. plunge by Rogers. Evans kick was wide, and the score at halftime was 13-6. After the half, the rains poured and the defense of the Lopes got tougher. Led by Rogers, Johnny Hemphill, David Lovelace, Mike Cuevas, and Larry Lutrick defenders allowed only two first downs in the second half. Defense coach, Max Kennedy, stated: "Our defense was much tougher than against Petersburg. We had more gang tackling and better pursuit. Our linebacker did an excellent job and our defensive line kept them off balance all night. Also our secondary did not allow a pass completion all this speaks very well for our effort, because Seagraves has a history of having a great offensive attack."

In the second half, the third Lope score came on a pass from Davenport to Rogers, and this same combination got the two extra points. Substituting freely in the last quarter, the Lopes offense gave up a T-D on a pass interception. The extra point was unsuccessful and the game ended with the Lopes holding the ball and a 21-12 lead. Stars were numerous as every-one played top-notch football especially on defense. Coach Nickerson mentioned these on offense: Bobby Rogers who ran tough, Dave Davenport, whose passing, signal calling, and ball handling were superb, David Lovelace and Steve Phillips for the blocking. Others who saw plenty of action for the fired up Lopes were: Jesse Webb, Bruce Kinast, Danny Barrera, Joe Evans, Bobby Cuevas, Dane Vickers, Ken Snodgrass, Darrell Blevins, Manuel Trevino, Runway Struve, Steve Riley, and Earnest Johnson. "It was a great team effort and we were proud of all the boys," Nickerson said.

Please do not feel offended. Everyone in the city will eventually be contacted on the same basis if they have a junk car on their premises.

After this section of town has been worked another section of town will be checked and each offender notified. We will certainly appreciate any cooperation you might give us in this matter. The purpose is to make our City of Abernathy a more attractive place to live and at the same time remove many health and safety hazards.

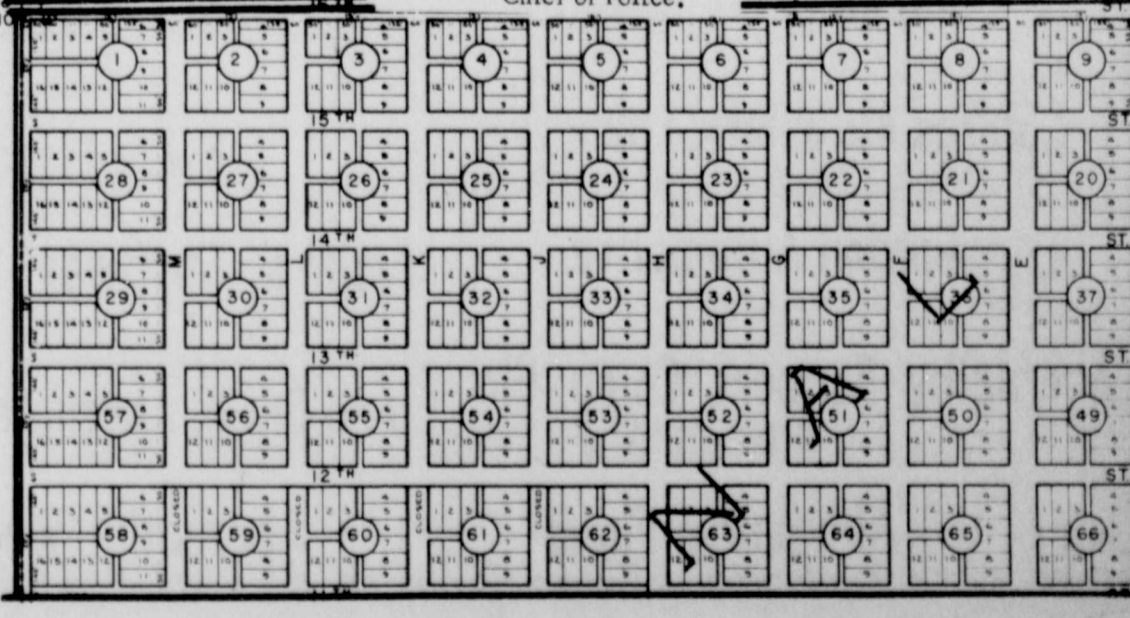

pieces of furniture for her new home and some of it is still in the family. Friends and the family enjoyed many parties in the Lutrick home. Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Lutrick lived the rest of their lives in this home eleven miles northeast of Abernathy. Mrs. Lutrick departed this life in October, 1929 and Mr. Lutrick followed in December 1944.

Ed started to school in the old Strip School. This school was located not far from where the Pearce Chapel Cemetery is today. Ed and his brother rode horseback six miles to and from school for two years. Then they changed to the Star School which was closer to their home. Maude Allen was the teacher for the Star School and she lived with the J. H. Lutricks.

Ed remembers a funny incident about his teacher. She had a very fancy hat that had a tall ostrich plume on it. She was very proud of this hat and you can imagine her reactions when they discovered one day that the Lutricks' old cat had had her kittens in Miss Allen's hat.

Ed went to high school at the Lakeview School and attended Seth Ward College in Plainview. Mabel and Ed had known each other during their school days, but didn't date until after Ed returned from the army in World War I, where he served as a Sergeant with the 133rd Field Artillery in France and Germany. During those days almost everyone met at the train depot to watch the trains come in. Mabel was with the group that was at the station when Ed returned from the war in 1919.

Mabel Pipkin and Ed Lutrick were married in the First United Methodist Church in Plainview on September 28, 1921. Rev. S. J. Upton, Methodist minister, performed the wedding ceremony and his wife was the witness. The wedding took place at 6 o'clock in the evening. They had gone to Plainview in a blue Chandler sports car that belonged to him and his brother, John Adams. That night a "blue norther" came in and Ed and Mabel nearly froze the next day going home in their summer-weight clothes.

The newlyweds moved to the old Neal place, a mile east of the Lutrick homeplace. Ed had spent \$125.00 buying furniture and supplies to start housekeeping. They lived one year on this place, then moved to the section of land where they still live. This section was one of several that J. H. Lutrick had acquired after he moved to the plains. Neither Mabel nor Ed have ever lived anywhere except here on the plains.

Mabel's father had given her a black horse as a wedding gift. This horse pulled their "no top" buggy which was their way of travel until 1925 when they bought a Model T, from Winn Motor Company in Plainview. Ed and Mabel attended the Methodist Church in the Strip Community. Soon this church was moved to Lakeview and they are still holding church in the Lakeview Church today.

In 1922, not many months after Ed and Mabel were married, his brother, John Adams married Mabel's sister, Nita, and they moved to the Lutrick section of land just north of Ed and Mabel's home. These two families shared many happy times growing up so close together. Through the years Ed has farmed and raised sheep and cattle. During the years when he had large herds of sheep he would ship his lambs by train from Abernathy to Kansas City. Most of these years he made the trip with his sheep to see that they were well cared for on the trip and that they brought the best possible price when they were sold. Mabel made this trip with him the last time he took sheep to sell. I remember that they brought each grandchild a very special gift when they returned.

In 1960 Ed sold the last of his sheep, ending a 42 year period of time that he had raised sheep.

The Lutricks shared an "old time" party line phone with several other families who lived in the area. The phone system served the people of the rural area well (if you could keep the line up and other parties from listening in) for many years. In about 1953 the South Plains Telephone Co-operative brought modern dial phones to the area. Just as other farmers of the early 1920's Ed began farming with teams of mules. In 1928 he traded 16 mules to E. K. Hufstedler's father for a two-cylinder Hart-Par tractor. Ed still uses mules, as well as tractors, to farm with for several more years. Mr. Hufstedler had a time getting rid of those mules, he finally took them to Arkansas to sell them. Ed kept his last two mules for several years, one of this pair died and he used the other one to pull a wagon in Abernathy's Gold Jubilee parade in July 1959. He and Mabel fixed a cover over the wagon and carried several of their grandchildren with them in the parade. Soon after this Ed gave this last mule away because she was so lopsome there on the place by herself.

In 1936 Ed drilled one of the first irrigation wells in this area. He said his Dad as well as nearly everyone else thought he had lost his mind when

he did this! The first well cost \$1800.00 complete with pump and gasoline motor. He drilled another well the next year. These wells are abandoned now, but there were five irrigation wells pumping on his land this summer.

The Lutricks' children all attended school at the Lakeview school until it was consolidated with the Abernathy School System. Ed served as a trustee of the Lakeview school for 18 years. He still has the records from this school and quite often someone comes to him looking for information from this record book.

During the years when his children were small Ed, his father and brothers all worked together during the busy harvest times. Also Mabel's brothers, A. E. and Ruben Pipkin would stay with them and help with the farm work, especially during wheat harvest.

Often in the fall, or after the crops were "laid by" the family, and sometimes Grandmother Pipkin and some of her younger children, would load into the old truck and head to New Mexico for a vacation and visit with relatives who lived near Ruidoso. On their return they always brought all the fruit from the Hondo Valley that they could load into the truck and still have room left for the family. This fruit was canned and preserved for the family to enjoy during the next year. Any extra was either sold or given to friends.

By this time the Lutrick family had grown to include three sons and two daughters and they felt a need for a larger and more modern home. They decided to build their new home on the south section line of their home place as the road that passed by there was to be paved. The road became Farm to Market Road 54. Also natural gas and electricity would be easier to obtain at this location.

When the house was completed in 1944 there was no electricity in the area so they used a Delco Light Plant for lighting. All five of the children of the family graduated from Abernathy High School. In 1945 the oldest son, Charles was graduated from Texas Tech and the second son, Lewis was graduated from High School on the same night. Mabel and Ed decided to try to make both graduation services, but due to "war time" restrictions they didn't make it back to Abernathy for Lewis' graduation. In fact, they began to wonder if they were going to make it back to their home that night.

In 1945 the Barton-Hood Post 500 of the American Legion was formed. Being a veteran of World War I, Ed became a charter member of this Post. Humble Oil Company began oil exploration in the area north

east of Abernathy in the late 1940's. In 1947 a producing well was drilled on the J. A. Lutrick place and in 1948 two producing wells were drilled on the T. E. Lutrick farm. These two wells were pumped for about two years and then abandoned. From time to time other companies have shown some interest in these oil leases.

Mabel and Ed Lutrick still live in their home at Rt. 1 Abernathy on the farm where they have lived for 49 of their 50 married years. Ed now has a head of Hereford cattle and Mabel still has beautiful flowers in her yard. Each year they raise a vegetable garden large enough to share with their children, friends and neighbors. They are active members of the First United Methodist Church in Abernathy, and the Michael Sunday School Class.

Their children are all married and have families of their own. Charles is pastor of St. John's Methodist Church in Lubbock, Lewis and Harvey live in Abernathy and, like their father, farm and raise livestock. Ann McCune lives in Abernathy with her family and Bell Baker lives in LaPorte, Texas with her family. There are 15 grandchildren and one great-grandson.

They invite all their friends to attend "open house" and make this another memorable occasion in their lives.

Garnett Givens Gililand of 1721 28th St., Lubbock died at 6:25 a.m. Saturday in Medical Hosp. following a lengthy illness. Services were held Monday in the First Baptist Church, Lubbock with Dr. J. Ralph Grant and the Rev. J. T. Bolding, associate pastors, officiating. Burial was in City of Lubbock Cemetery by Sanders Funeral Home.

A Lubbock County resident since 1901, Gililand was a general construction contractor and owner of a swimming pool firm. He formerly resided in Abernathy where he helped bring the town's first telephone and electric service.

Gililand was a deacon in Lubbock's First Baptist Church and a former member of the Abernathy school board. At one time, he was engaged in a farm and dairy business in Hale County.

Survivors include his wife, Ethel; a son, G. G. of the home; two daughters, Mrs. J. W. Curtis of 2522 26th St. and Mrs. Gerald Guerrieri of Richardson; two brothers, Travis of Livermore, Calif., and Truman of Roton; two sisters, Mrs. Lessel Babo of New York and Mrs. Edna Peerman of Chicago; and his mother, Mrs. E. Gililand of Lubbock.

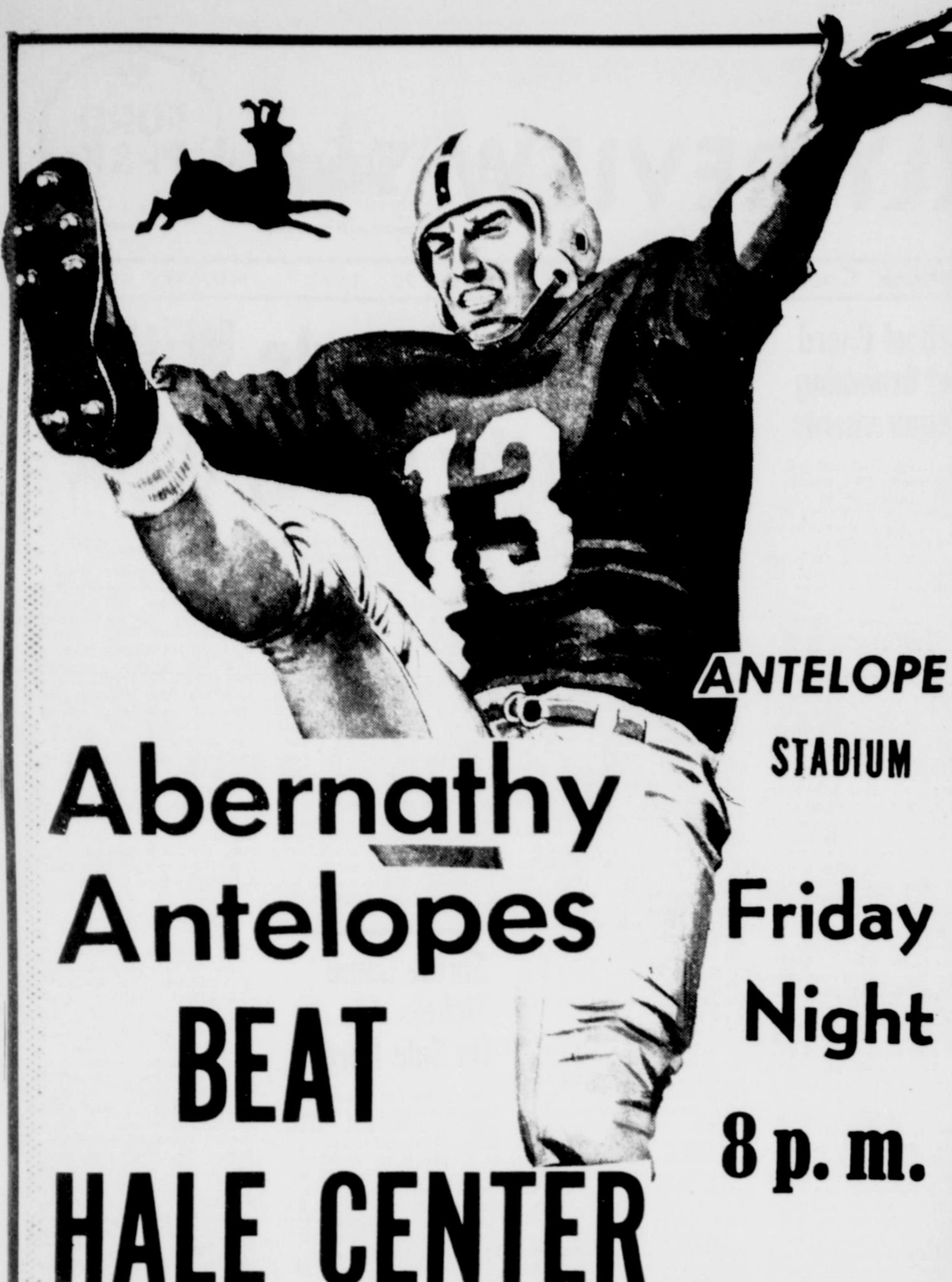
Former City Resident Dies

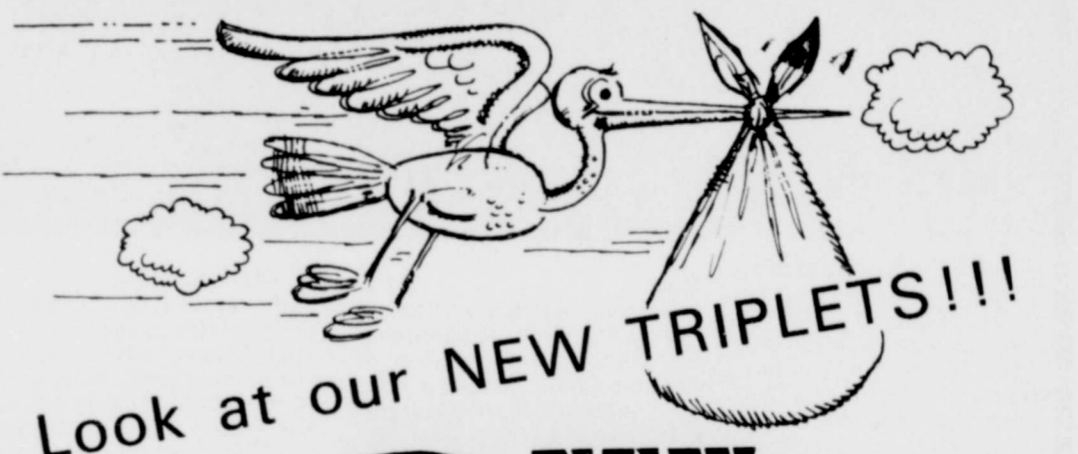

SOCIAL SECURITY Questions and Answers

By MANCIE KING

Q. I have paid the maximum social security contributions since 1940. I am now 67 and still working. When I applied for social security retirement benefits, I was told that because my earnings for the year would be too high, I was not entitled to receive any checks. This doesn't seem fair to me. Why was the law set up this way?

A. The primary reason for an earnings limit under social security goes back to the original purpose of the program as passed by the Congress. Social security retirement benefits are a partial replacement for earnings that stop when you

retire. And, until a worker has retired or had his earning power sharply reduced, there are no lost earnings to replace. However Congress also realized that some people never retire but continue to work long past 65. To completely deprive these workers of social security benefits would not be fair either. Therefore, regardless of the amount of his earnings, an eligible worker can get full monthly social security retirement benefits at 72. Earlier, he can get full benefits if he earns \$1,680 or less in a year. If he earns between \$1,680 and \$2,880 a year, his benefits are reduced \$1 for every \$2 earned. If he earns \$2,880 a year, his benefits are reduced \$1 for his annual earnings, however, he can get his full social security benefit for any month he earns \$140 or less and does not work in a business of his own.

Dear Buford:

Most Texas newspapers and an unfortunately large number of our citizens reacted to our position on the wage-price freeze, as it affects State employees and teachers, on the basis of emotion, without realizing that there were very good, logical and legal reasons for our position - reasons which compelled us to take that position.

The issue is not, as has been suggested by many, that we or the State of Texas oppose any reasonable means of curbing inflation. Nor is it that we want special treatment for our State, its employees or teachers.

It is simply a question of whether Texas will be treated in a manner consistent with other States, almost all of which have already had pay raises go into effect for their employees in the past year, whether the Governor is supposed to protect and defend the Constitution and laws of his State, or simply forget his oath of office, and whether the Congress actually could authorize, or did authorize, the President to void State laws.

Indeed, we in Texas have been in the vanguard of the fight against inflation and recession. We operate under a spend-as-you-go budget, unlike the federal government's inflationary policy of deficit spending, which put this nation more than \$20 billion in the red last year.

We have cut spending wherever possible and even vetoed the entire second year of the biennial appropriations bill so that we could reduce spending to more sensible levels. We have prevented the enactment of unnecessary taxes which would have placed an added burden on the already economically strained pocketbooks of our citizens. And, more than a year ago, we called on the Republican Administration in Washington to reverse its failing economic policies in favor of well-planned, reasonable wage and price controls.

Obviously, there are many complex legal problems involved which make it difficult for the people to understand the action we took. Hopefully, greater understanding of the necessity for our action will become apparent as more and more people acquaint themselves with the facts.

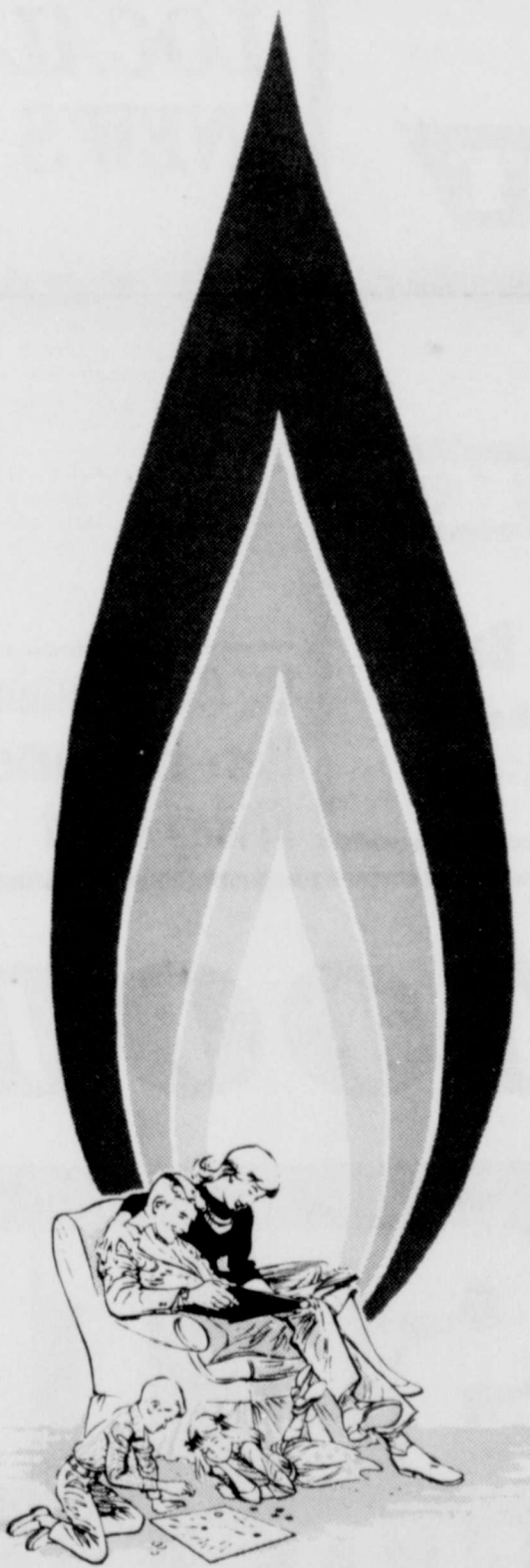
