It was pointed out at the three day training session that in order for farmers to reach high crop yields, we are going to have to look at more than just the N.P. and K in the soil. Other plant food elements are definite factor in crop production. According to the loca CFS Crop Advisor, Dan Thompson, we must first get a complete soil analysis to determine what plant food elements to apply to reach these high yields,
