

"Never Say Die" Team Holds Mean Green to 1 Point Win

Our Indian Tribe lost a heart breaker against the Iowa Park Hawks by a slim 14-13 margin before one of the largest crowds of the season. Fans saw two great teams meet for a shot at the state finals. Power and depth were the only factor that defeated the Indians.

This ended the best football season Haskell has known, and it will go down in history as "That great team of 1970."

The Hawks played ball control all night. The Indians took the opening kickoff on the 32 yard line. Charley Franklin picked up 14 yards. On the next play, Franklin threw a 37 yard pass to Jackie Young. With Franklin and Keith Everett taking turns, they carried the ball to the Hawks' 4 yard line. Franklin went around left end for the first TD of the night. Randy Stone's kick was good, and it took just 7 plays and less than 3 minutes to get the Indians on the scoreboard.

The Hawks came roaring back, taking the ball on the 31. Steve Webb and Jeff McDonald running the ball, they covered 65 yards in 12 plays and placed the ball on the 4. Frazier carried the ball around left end from there to put 6 points on the scoreboard for the Hawks. Lee Dawson kicked the extra point to tie the ball game, 7-7.

Each team managed to pick up one first down each, for the rest of the first period. The Indians handled the ball 12 times to the Hawks 17 in the first period.

Second quarter saw the Hawks play ball control. Late in the first period, Greg Ancell intercepted an Indian pass on the 20. They handled the ball 18 times to move to the Indian 3. Big Clifford Campbell recovered a Webb fumble on the 7 and (Continued on Page 2, Sec. 1)

Theft Suspects Are Picked Up In Lubbock

The suspects were picked up in Lubbock by Haskell County Sheriff Garth Garrett; Texas Ranger Homer T. Melton and Sgt. Hargrove of the Lubbock Police Department.

About \$10,000 in clothing plus \$30 in cash was taken in the burglary.

Haskell Jaycees Ladies Night was observed Tuesday, December 15, at 7:30 p. m. at Felker's Restaurant dining room. Doyle High was program chairman.

SFC. John W. Warner, Jr., a representative of the Department of Army Speakers Program, showed slides he had made during his two tours of duty in Vietnam. The slides depicted Vietnamese villages, a fishing port, and several different views of the children, the market places and rural areas.

While he showed pictures of the training center and the villa where he lived, Sgt. Warner explained the hardship the Army faced in getting the Vietnamese people to accept the changes that needed to be made by them, such as how to get hot food to their men in the field and better food preparation. He then showed how the men in his company went about doing the job they had to do; how a village was searched and the people were counted and treated by the medic. There were pictures of the men in the rice patties and the jungle. There were also pictures of a concealed village in Cambodia.

Sgt. Warner then answered various questions from the Jaycees and closed with his thanks.

Busy Session On Tap At Tuesday Session of Chamber of Commerce

The board of directors of the Haskell Chamber of Commerce met at the chamber office at 7:30 p. m., Tuesday, Dec. 15, in a regular bi-monthly meeting with president Bob Philpot presiding for the business session.

The meeting was opened with a prayer by George Fouts, after which manager Rex Felker read the minutes of the last meeting.

Several items for discussion by the board was on the agenda to include a comprehensive report on the current Christmas Program by Mrs. Opal Adkins, chairman of the 1970 special event for Haskell. She stated to board members that approximately \$3,000 had been deposited in the bank and that probably in the neighborhood of another \$300 would be received from donations by merchants and ticket sales. Total expenditures are expected to run about \$2,000.

President Philpot read a letter from the State Highway Department which informed members that the designation of state highway 24 to U. S. Highway 380 had been accepted conditionally and that the only thing holding it up was the erection of a signal light over the railroad near the city of Graham and that it was being installed at this time and that within 30 days it would become official. Plans call for the organization of a Highway 380 Association immediately after the first of the year have been announced by the Graham Chamber of Commerce. The


Cantata To Be Presented At First Baptist Church

the Indians took over from there.

The Hawks defense took hold again. Everett gained 2, Franklin 6, Everett 3, Everett two more, Everett 7, Everett 2, Franklin 15, Terry Pringle lost 9 and Jackie Young lost 5 before Franklin gained 8 more. Then the Indians were forced to punt with 1:02 left in the first half.

But the Indians defense was just as good and the Hawks died on the 31 yard line as the half ended with the score 7-7.

The Hawks took the opening kickoff on the 34, and with all their running backs picking up three first downs and driving the ball to the 13. There McDonald drove around right end for the Hawks' second 6 points. Dawson's kick was good. Hawks 14, Indians 7. It took the Hawks 13 plays to cover 64 yards on this drive.

Again the Hawks were afraid of our deep men and tried an inside kick. The Indian tribe took over on the 45, but could not move the ball and were forced to punt on 4th. The Hawks took over on the 25 and started moving the football. They managed to get to the Indian 23, but a 15 yard penalty put them back on the 48 and they were forced to punt for the first time. Dawson fumbled the snap and Gary Mayfield recovered for the Indians on the 43. Franklin picked up 28 yards, and Everett 2. The clock was running out. Franklin went around left end for 13 and 6

more points. At this point it was do or die, so the Indians decided to go for two. But the play never got off the ground, so the score was 14-13.

The Hawks took the kickoff on the 29 and started the last quarter. In 13 plays they moved the ball to the 8 yard line. It was second down with one yard to go on the 8, but the mighty Indians were determined to hold them, and this they did, for three downs. The Hawks failed to move the ball, just one yard. The Indians took over on the 8. The Indians gave it their all, but could not move to much advantage on the big line of the Hawks. They managed to pick up two first downs and move the ball to the 36 before having to punt.

The Hawks wanted just one more score, but with 2:18 left in the game, they had to travel 36 yards with a good effort by McDonald, Watson and Frazier they got to the 3 yard line. With time for one more play, Frazier was thrown for a 9 yard loss by Charlie Franklin to end the game 14-13.

The Indians handled the ball only 9 times in the fourth period to the Hawks' 24.

The Indians played a football game that none will forget, and especially the Iowa Park Mean Green. With almost 3 times as many players as the Indians, the Hawks kept fresh men in the game at all times. The mighty Indians lasted the entire game, to show the crowd that they are truly a mighty fine team, and a mighty fine bunch of young men.

Cotton Classing Report

The USDA Cotton Classing Office will stop receiving cotton today, Thursday, Dec. 17, and will close on Dec. 18, according to John E. Williams, in-charge.

Sample receipts dropped off to almost nothing by Thursday, but the office continues to be about four days behind in classing. During the week ending Dec. 11, 1970, there were 10,162 samples classed bringing the season total to 66,051.

The predominant grade was 32 with 34 percent, followed by grade 42 with 26 percent and 41 with 24 percent. Staple lengths were as follows: 29's, 25 percent; 30's, 44 percent; 31's, 12 percent; 32's, 8 percent; and 33's and longer, 10 percent.

Micronaire readings remained about the same with 68 percent of the cotton miking in the premium range, 26 percent miking 5.0-5.2, and 4 percent miking 5.3 or higher.

Prices for cotton remained about the same with a slight increase in lower qualities. Predominant grades were bringing 150 to 375 points above CCC loan prices. Some average prices for premium mike cotton were: 32 29, 19.00 cents per pound; 32 30, 19.65 cents per pound; 42 29, 19.00 cents; 42 30, 19.50 cents; and 41 30, 19.85 cents.



Holcomb Gets Silver Star For Rescue

DA NANG AFLD, Republic of Vietnam (7AF)—Lt. Colonel Albert L. Holcomb, 46, of Waco, has been awarded the Silver Star for the combat rescue of a downed Marine pilot near Quang Tri July 11.

Lt. Col. Holcomb was recently selected for promotion to Colonel effective December 1st, 1970. A native of Haskell County, he is married to the former Miss Joyce Holloway, also a native of Haskell County. They have three children, Danny, Bruce and Debbie.

The award, one of the nation's highest for bravery, was presented by Col. Thomas L. Shockley, commander of the 41st Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Wing, Hickam AFB, Hawaii in ceremonies recently.

Lt. Col. Holcomb, commander of the 37th ARRS at Da Nang, was aircraft commander of an HH-53 Super Jolly Green Giant helicopter which successfully rescued the Marine A-4 Skyhawk pilot.

Before he reached the scene, one HH-53 had already been driven off by hostile enemy ground fire. On his first attempt his own helicopter received battle damage and was driven off. His second attempt was successful, "saving a fellow airman from certain death or capture."

The 37th ARRS at Da Nang has been credited with rescuing a total of 593 American servicemen from the jungles and waters of Southeast Asia since it arrived in Vietnam in 1965.

ANOTHER CHANCE FOR SOME TO ENROLL IN PART OF MEDICARE

A very important date is near for some area residents over age 65, stated Wayne Baker, Haskell County field representative from the Abilene social security office. This date, January 1, is the beginning of a three month "General Enrollment Period" provided for under the Social Security Medicare law. A person who is still eligible, but who is not enrolled in part "B" of Medicare, can sign up during this "open" period which ends March 31, 1971, Baker stated. Coverage will be effective the following July 1.

Part "B" of Medicare or medical insurance helps pay for doctor bills, diagnostic tests, and certain other medical expenses incurred outside the hospital, he added.

This will be the last chance to enroll for those people born between October 1, 1902 and September 30, 1903, Baker emphasized. Those born before October 1, 1902 and who never enrolled previously are no longer eligible.

A person who enrolls for part "B" during the "open period" will have to pay a slightly higher monthly premium rate if he has passed up an earlier opportunity to sign up.

DECEMBER 31 IS DEADLINE FOR SOME MEDICARE CLAIMS

December 31, 1970 is the deadline for filing Medicare medical insurance claims for services received October 1, 1968, through September 30, 1969, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene.

"If you have Medicare medical insurance and received covered services during the period of October 1, 1968, through September 30, 1969, claims must be filed before the end of this year," Tuley said. "After De-

cember 31, 1970, Medicare can not pay on these bills."

Tuley said that anyone needing claim forms for Medicare medical insurance or related information should call the Abilene social security office. The telephone number is (915) 677-5262.

Medicare medical insurance is the voluntary part of Medicare. It is available to almost everyone 65 or older and helps pay for doctors' services and certain other health care services. Financed by individual monthly premiums and matching government funds, it pays 80 percent of reasonable charges above the \$50 annual deductible for covered medical services.

Medicare hospital insurance, funded through employee, employer, and self-employed social security taxes during a person's working years, requires no continuing premium payments. It helps pay for hospital care and for related health services for people 65 and over.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — For the past several months numerous complaints have been received about mail service.

The United States post office exists for one purpose and that is to provide prompt and dependable mail service.

Mail service has obviously deteriorated in all parts of the Nation but it seems that the area served by the Dallas Regional Office, which covers five states, has especially been chosen for an experimental plan. The plan includes the elimination of window service on Saturday, curtailment of distributing mail to boxes on weekends, elimination of parcel post delivery on weekends, drastic cuts in collection services—all of which have resulted in a slowdown in deliveries.

It should be pointed out that the local Postmaster is not at fault. The Post Office Administration in Washington has ordered the cutbacks through the Regional Office. The policy indicates that individual Postmasters are granted a certain amount of discretion in implementing changes in service and personnel practices but that discretion has not been broad enough to permit an operation which would not only be cheaper but provide better service.

One glaring example of the inadequacy of these tests programs is what is referred to as "managed mail processing"

There is no need to look for blame but with all the money

spent on the postal service, the deficit of which is staggering, there is little excuse for not having better service, whether under the present system or by the new organization.
