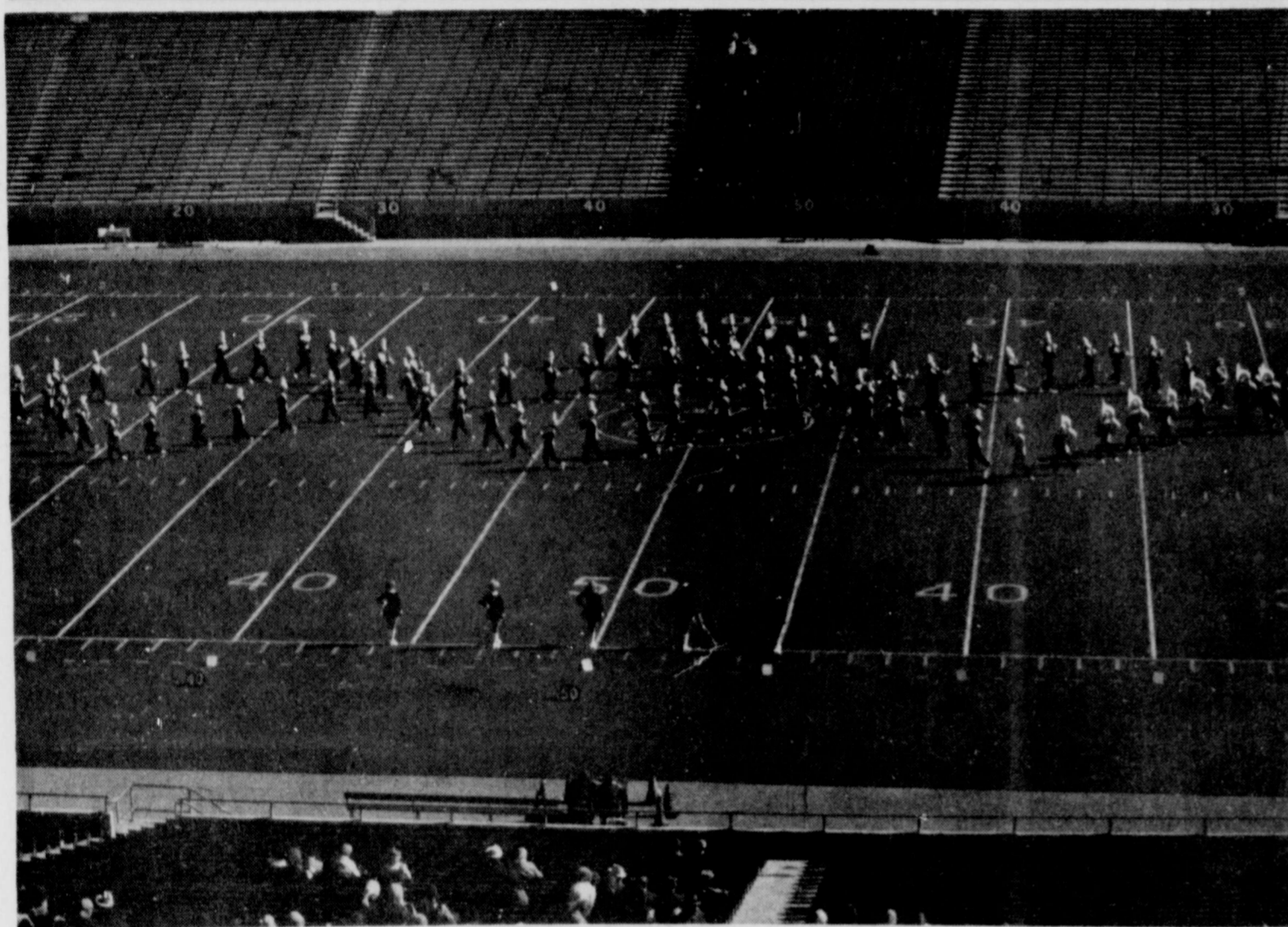

Clyde Benn delivered the first bale of 1971 cotton to Abernathy Farmers Coop Gins Nov. 10. He had on over 2,000 pounds of seed cotton that turned out 490 pounds of lint and 860 pounds of seed. As he has done for the past several years, Clay Pettit delivered the first bale of cotton to Martin Gin. Pettit delivered 2,300 pounds of seed cotton from the 1971 crop on Nov. 12. Lint weighed 520 pounds and seed 900 pounds. Martin Gin is on FM 54 several miles northwest of town.

2-1 Edge
New Deal had a battling favored Vega to a 7-7 standoff on the scoreboard here Saturday but Fortenberry's run gave the gully Lions a 2-1 edge and it stood up for the difference.

The 4-A Lions had taken a 7-0 lead early in the third quarter, but Vega scored on the following drive. And the unbeaten-but-tied Longhorns held the edge in first downs and yardage, the two measuring rods beyond score and penetrations.

With that situation, New Deal took over at its 43 following a short (23 yards) Vega punt. Runningback Willie Humphrey ran for 9, before speedy and shifty Eliza Darty darted all over the field for 35 yards. Darty was finally hauled in inches shy of that 20-yard line, the penetration "goal."

March Halted
Next play Fortenberry got the penetration, the ultimate difference, with less than six minutes to go. Next play, Darty sped to the 8 but a clip rubbed out the play and the Lions' march was blunted.

Vega had two more tries, the first was killed by defensive back Randy Dunn's interception at the ND 31, and the second was killed by the swarming Lion defense and the clock.

A fumble recovery near midfield started New Deal to its touchdown after the two teams had competed in a defense and punting - dominated contest throughout the first half.

Robinson Fumbles
Vega opened the half with a

short drive to its 44 before Dick Robinson fumbled and Steve Bigham recovered for the Lions. Second play later, Lions quarterback Glen Johnson hit Dunn over the middle 24 yards to the 20. Eliza carried twice for a first at the eight, and on third from the five, New Deal ran the power play with Humphrey carrying over with 7:53 left in the quarter.

Bill Bigham booted true for a big point.

Vega, aroused by the touchdown, lashed back, going 54 yards following the kickoff. Big play was a 27-yard Bronc May to Tony Cassey delayed pitchout which carried to the 15.

New Deal stiffened and forced a fourth-and-13 at the 18. But May completed the Longhorns' only pass of the night, nailing tight end Jimbo Wetsel just across the goal with 4:05 left in the period.

Tim Ward then knotted the score from placement.

The victory added another brilliant chapter to the Lions' comeback story. Completely overlooked in all championship conversations, the Lions rebounded from three early season losses to tie for the 4-A championship, then won a flip to represent the league in bidistrict. The Lions are now 8-3 for the year. The tie - on the scoreboard - was Vega's second in a row after nine straight triumphs. The earlier, 36-all with Farwell, went into district records as a loss also - via statistics.

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From The Desk of the City Manager

Thanksgiving is here and now. Christmas is just around the corner and before we know it we will be wondering why we made those New Year resolutions and then didn't keep them.

Our streets are far better than any city in our category. We have more wide paved streets with curb and gutters than anyone I know. Sure we have some unpaved streets. Someday someone is going to face another water crisis, be ever so thankful that we are not there now. With water everything, that makes us continue to progress, is possible. Without it we will soon be like the tumbleweed - "Rolling along."

Our new lift station in the Sanitary Sewer System is performing like a champion. Our problems of a major nature are almost non-existent. Those that we have had this year were quickly eliminated and we are thankful that we are not called out on dark cold nights to repair an old worn system. Ours is not new but it is far above average. Our only regret is that some in our city do not have it available to them. The fortunate majority that do have it should remember that but for the Grace of God, it could be them.

Our Sanitation Crew and Truck still make the regular rounds and we are sure proud of a few citizens continue to be a little critical of the fact that we can't haul off everything they can get into a 55 gal. barrel. We realize that in days gone by they did not question anything or draw the line anywhere. If you could get it to the alley they hauled it away. But now we have reached the point where we just can no longer do this. We have had to say "No leaves and grass in the barrels." We have had to say do not put a few other things in the barrels. Now there is no way for the men to tell if there are 3 inches or 3 feet of grass in the barrel. There is no way to say it is OK to put in a little. What is a little to me is a lot to you. So we just have to say no grass.

Now we do get around nearly every week with the open truck to pick up leaves that are in boxes or bags and tree limbs or anything like this. Be thankful that we can still do this. Help us help you, and just put yourself in these mens place before you criticize them. Would you want the stuff you put in your barrel on your hand and clothes a thousands times a week? We don't

mean to say they are never wrong. Sometimes it is just a judgement thing as to whether they will pick up your cards. This means that many times they make a wrong decision. But we will sure correct it when they do and they will be the first one to volunteer to do it. Call us when you have a legitimate complaint. We are thankful that so many of you appreciate our efforts and may times correct the situation yourselves when in reality it is our place to do it.

We are prone to forget to be thankful for Policemen when we are passing out the plaudits. Like our wonderful Fire Department most of their work is done without benefit of screaming sirens and flashing red lights. They must of necessity work quietly in the background trying to prevent bad situations from developing. It is sure not very glamorous to have a reputation with the thief who would do you in, that would make him go some place else to do his dirty work. But wouldn't you rather have that than lose your hard earned goods? Wouldn't you rather have a Fire Department show you how to prevent a fire that ruin everything you were trying to put out a fire? These two fine service organizations are usually conspicuous only when something bad has happened to you. If you haven't seen or heard from them in a long time be very thankful.

Now have a wonderful Thanksgiving. Save some of the white meat for next weeks sandwiches and snacking. Thanks may be a little trite but add a small portion of love and suddenly your menu is complete.

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29 Rural Accidents in Hale County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 29 accidents on rural highways in Hale County during the month of October, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed and ten persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1971 shows a total of 595 accidents resulting in four persons killed and 128 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for October, 1971 shows a total of 595 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 294 persons injured. This was 96 more accidents, 14 less fatalities, and 26 more injured than during September.

The 19 traffic deaths for the month of October, 1971, occurred in the following counties: Carson, four; Kent, Lubbock, Wise, Roberts, and Wheeler, two each; Crosby, Hale, Parker, Stonewall, and Hemphill, one each.
