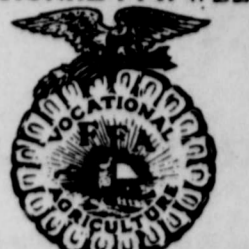
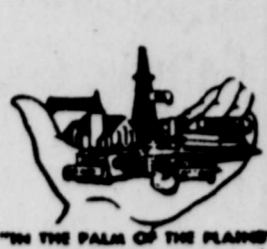

## Contracts Of Principals Extended

The Board of Education of the Abernathy Independent School District met in regular session on February 7, 1972, at 7:00 p.m. in the board room of the high school.

In routine action, the board approved minutes of the previous meeting and the bills payable for the month of January. Reports presented to the board included: tax collection report showing 97.12% of the current roll as having been collected; budget progress report; the enrollment report, which indicated 1160 students which is a loss of 21 students during the month of January; Nurses report; lunchroom report; and report on the progress in the purchase of fixture for improving football field lights.

The board discussed the implementation of Special Education, Plan A which will begin September 1972. This plan is a cooperative venture between Abernathy, Hale Center, New Deal, and Petersburg or Shallowater. The administration of the program and the fiscal control will be under the direction of the local schools.

In other action, the board accepted the resignation of Mr. Max Kennedy, assistant football coach and the following were re-employed: Earl Carter, Curtis Davenport, Frank Bartlett, Jerry Moorhead, Charles Bowen, Gid Adkisson, Wendell Jones, Jerry Adams, Jerry Bartley, Carl Iribek, Sherry Pruner, Bob Kascoe, Jay Wilson.

The board called a trustee election for Saturday, April 1st at the City Hall. The terms of Mr. Joe Lovelace and Mr. Dave Pinson are expired. The last day for candidates to file will be Wednesday, March 1st. The remaining trustees are: L. J. West, president; Billie Harrison, vice-president; Lon Carmickle; Bob Riley; Joe Oswalt.

All of the board members were present for the meeting along with Mr. Earl Carter, business manager, and Dr. Delwin Webb, Superintendent. The next scheduled meeting will be on March 6, 1972, at 7:30 p.m.

Abernathy Junior High School INTRAMURAL TOURNAMENT Feb. 21-26, 1972

The Abernathy Junior High School Intramural Basketball Tournament will be held February 21st, through the 26th, 1972. There will be eight girls teams and ten boys teams with eight or nine players on each team. Each team will be composed of seventh and eighth grade students, coached by high school students. There will be an admission of 10¢ for students and 25¢ for adults each time the person enters the gym. Players will be admitted free one time each session.

Individual trophies and cups will be awarded to the members of the winning teams and their coaches. Sportsmanship trophies will be awarded to the outstanding boy and girl sport of the tournament.

Special rules are necessary for a tournament of this nature to accomplish its purpose, participation, and at the same time maintain the competitive spirit of basketball. Each player on a team must play at least two full quarters but cannot play in more than three quarters during each game that the team plays (unless the player has committed five fouls). The coaches of each team shall submit to the bookkeeper, 10 minutes prior to game time, the starting line up of players for each quarter. This line up must include all players on their team. Each player must play two full quarters before he or she can be substituted for or used as a substitute. The clock will be stopped only for fouls, jump balls, substitution and time outs (one per half per game). Decisions on rules will be made by the junior high coaches and/or principal.

Sessions will be as follows: 1st session, Monday, 3:15-8:15; 2nd session, Tuesday, 3:15-8:15; 3rd session, Wednesday, 3:30-5:30; 4th session, Thursday, 3:30-5:30; 5th session, Friday, 3:15-8:15; 6th session, Saturday, 4:00-8:30.

### Reeves On Dean's List At V. M. I.

LEXINGTON, Va. -- A total of 225 cadets of the Virginia Military Institute were named to the Dean's List at the end of the first semester.

### C-C Encourages Development Of A New Crop

Since its inception the Abernathy Chamber of Commerce has encouraged the development and research of new crops for this area. For four years they have had an agreement and supported the Texas Agriculture System to study the possibility of grape production as an additional cash crop for this area. The Chamber has now agreed to continue to work with the Texas A & M System for another three years.

Several hundred grape cuttings have been planted on the city section south of the airport facilities. Improvements are being made with the trellis system, and there is a possibility that hail screens of some type will be installed so a study can be conducted on the effects of hail damage.

Different types of irrigation are being studied to determine the amount of water needed for a maximum grape crop. An underground system has been installed along with a system of plastic pipe on top of the ground with openings at the plants to help determine the amount of water actually needed. With the openings located only at the plant, a considerable amount of water could possibly be saved.

Cuttings were made by Dr. William Lipe of the Texas A & M University Research Center at Lubbock, and are now being stored in the greenhouse at the Experiment Station. These cuttings will be prepared and will be made available for planting to residents of this area in the near future. It is hoped that many area residents will take advantage of this opportunity.

Dan Ward, local Chamber member, has shown much interest in the Grape Project and will help with the distribution of grape cuttings this spring.

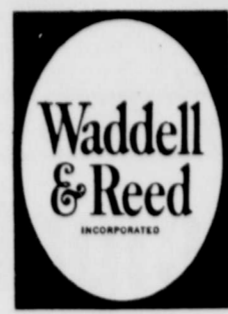

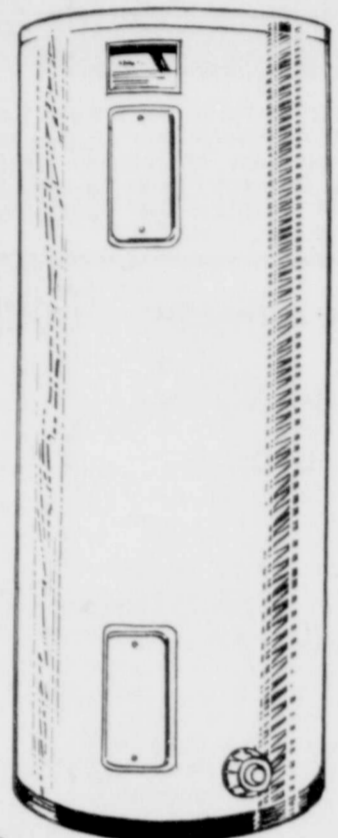

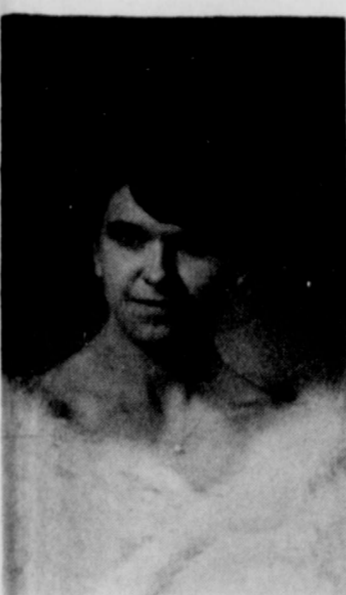

### 4-H Food Show Set February 19 In Plainview

The Hale County 4-H Food Show will be held Saturday, February 19, in the Hale County Agriculture Center at 1:30 p.m. Abernathy Community 4-H Club will act as hostess this year.

"Special Occasions" will be the theme featured in the '72 Food Show. Everything from candied apples for Halloween to Cherry Pie for Washington's Birthday will be presented by this group of 4-H Boys and Girls.

Food exhibited will be in one of the four basic food groups - meat, bread-cereal, or fruit-vegetable - and must contain the proper nutritional value per serving.

The contestants should turn in the following things to the Home Demonstration Office no later than 4:30 p.m. Wednesday, February 16, 1972: D-312A Revised for each year contestant has participated in a Foods and Nutrition Project; "4-H Foods and Nutrition Self-Determined Project Record" (if carried.); one copy each of the menu and the food recipe on separate sheets.

Four Junior and four Senior winners, one in each food group, will go to the District Food Show in Lubbock, April 8.
