## Mike Irish To Receive Degree

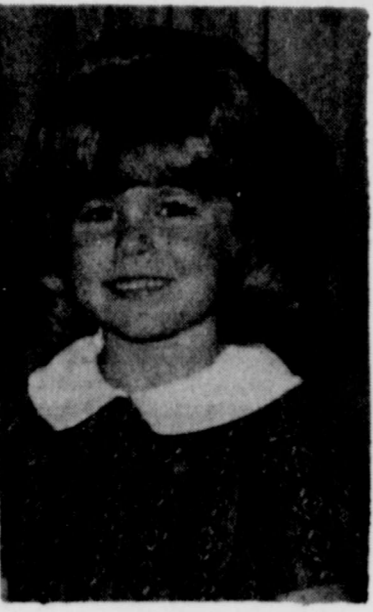

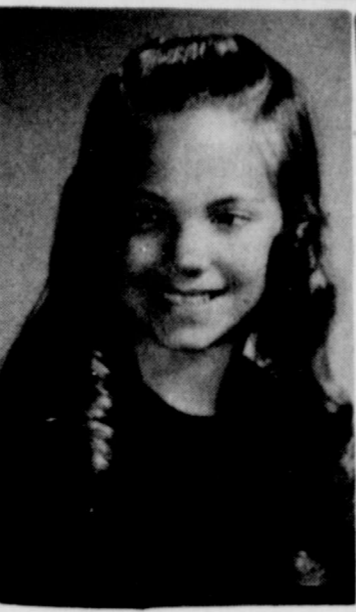
## Place In SP Science Fair

The cuttings are from grapevines in the experimental project on the city airport section. The grape project has been underway for the past few years. It is a joint project of the Abernathy Chamber of Commerce and the Texas A & M Experiment Station. The experiment is designed to determine the variety of grapes best adapted to the South Plains area. This is being done with the hope of finding another "cash crop" and to provide grapes from small vineyards for home use.

The Abernathy Board of Education met in regular session April 3, 1972, in the Board Room of the high school. First item on the agenda was to canvass returns of the April 1st trustee election. In other action, the board approved the budget progress report, the tax collection report which indicated 97.84% of the taxes as having been collected. The board also studied the enrollment report showing a decline for the second month in a row and a total enrollment of 1131 students.

Harold Thomas of Abernathy, Texas, and Mr. Bill Hunt of Lubbock, the local territory manager for Northrup, King & Co., recently announced that four grain sorghum growers in the area are named as members of the 1971 NK Carload Sorghum Club. Membership in the club honors the production achievements of these local growers:

Jimmy Champion, Hale Center, Texas, produced 7 carloads of grain from 275 acres of NK 275;

Tommy Jones, Abernathy, Texas, produced 8.4 carloads of grain from 240 acres of NK 222G;

J. W. Shadden, Idalou, Texas, produced 2.4 carloads of grain from 94 acres of NK 280;

Jerry Shadden, Abernathy, Texas, produced 5 carloads of grain from 206 acres of NK 280.

The Northrup, King Carload Sorghum Club for 1971 has 715 members from 14 states. In 1971, they produced 584,000,000 pounds of grain from 150,000 acres. This is equivalent to 2,933 hopper carloads of grain.

In naming the four growers from this area, territory manager Hunt noted that the purpose of the NK Carload Club is to recognize its members in order to emphasize the growing importance of sorghum as a feed grain. The NK Sorghum Growers Club provides a clearing house for ideas on problems that confront sorghum growers. Club members have an opportunity to exchange ideas and to hear detailed reports on management practices for specific cropping conditions.

## Deadline For School Transfer

AUSTIN--Parents who wish to transfer children from their home school to a nearby district for the 1972-73 academic year must submit their requests to the receiving school district by June 1, 1972, according to an announcement from the Texas Education Agency.

Once approved by the receiving school board of trustees, the request must then be cleared by the Texas Education Agency. This state approval is a requirement of the order issued by the U. S. District Court in Tyler.

The order, related to the desegregation of schools in Texas, states in part that the Texas Education Agency "shall not permit, make arrangements for or give support of any kind to student transfers, between school districts, when the cumulative effect in either the sending or receiving school or school districts will be to reduce or impede desegregation, or to reinforce, renew, or encourage the continuation of acts and practices resulting in discriminatory treatment of students on the grounds of race, color, or national origin."

Only hardship cases will be considered for transfer approval after June 1, according to Leon R. Graham, Texas Education Agency assistant commissioner for administration. Any late application must state specifically the exact nature of the hardship and why the application was not filed with the receiving school by the June 1 deadline.

"We expect to approve few late transfer requests and those must definitely be hardship cases," Graham added.

## Hale Has 1310 Farms

Hale county showed a total of 1,310 farms in the 1969 Census of Agriculture, according to figures released by the U. S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census, a part of the Department's Social and Economic Statistics Administration (SESA).

In the last previous Census of Agriculture (1964) the number of farms reported in the county was 1,273.

Of the county's total farms in 1969, 1,178 are reported as selling \$2,500 or more of agriculture products in the year, as compared with 1,234 in 1964.

The report also shows average farm size in the county was 554.4 acres, and average value of these farms (land and buildings) was \$211,900.

Other figures from the report are:

1. Value of all farm products sold in 1969, \$57,112,653; in 1964, \$61,814,500.
2. Value of all crops sold in 1969, \$29,970,788; in 1964, \$52,023,358.
3. Value of all livestock, poultry, and their products sold in 1969, \$27,141,865; in 1964, \$9,790,565.

Reported for the first time in an agriculture census is information on the extent to which the corporate structure is being used by operators of farms from which agriculture products totaling \$2,500 and over were sold. Including family farms using this type of business structure, nine of the county's \$2,500-and-over farms are incorporated.

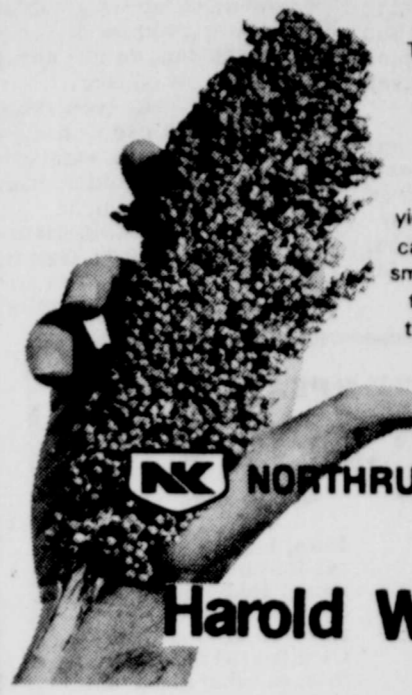

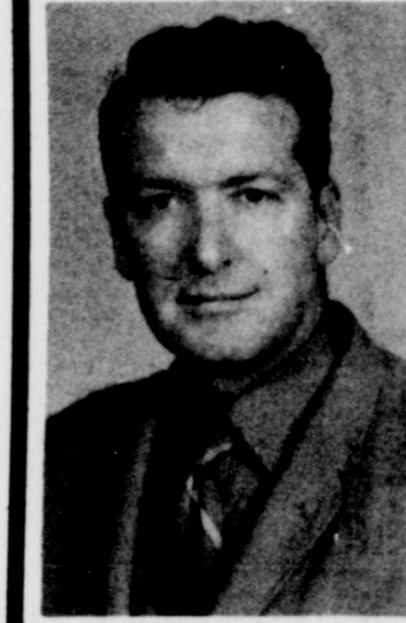

Need For A Junior College Object of Survey

A study is being conducted in a five county area which includes Abernathy to determine if there is a need for a junior college which offers occupational and technical education or training. The area being surveyed in the study includes, in addition to Abernathy, Briscoe, Floyd, Hale, Motley, and Swisher counties. The study has been approved and is sponsored by the Division of Occupational Research and Development, Texas Education Agency. Using the name Area Occupational Education Research, the study is being conducted by Perry H. Bell, Project Director, and Thomas J. Krueger, Associate Director.

To accomplish the purposes of the study several groups will be surveyed--students, employers, parents, and out-of-school youth. Everyone who receives a survey form in any of the named categories is urged to supply the information requested and return it as soon as possible to facilitate the completion of the study. High school students are being asked to state their occupational goals; also their desires and expectations for occupational and technical education. School personnel and students are cooperating to the fullest extent. This portion of the survey will soon be completed.

All employers in business, industry, professional offices, and governmental agencies will be asked to indicate their present work force by specific occupations and their manpower needs projected to 1977. This will furnish information to determine the occupational and technical education necessary to meet the trained manpower requirements of the area and state.

Parents of seventh grade students will be asked what plans they have for the education of their children and whether a junior college would meet those needs. Opportunity will also be given parents to express their needs for further occupational education and training or retraining.

Out-of-school youth will include those who were members of the high school class of 1969, whether or not they graduated. They will be asked to state their occupational goals and their desires and expectations for further occupational education and training or retraining.

All respondents will be asked for their views of the possibility of a junior college in the area. The information obtained will provide a basis for determining whether a junior college will meet the needs of
