Rainfall Here For 1970 Is Above Normal



Normal moisture for April is 1.93, while a total of 1.89 was received here during the month, according to the U.S. Government Recorder.

Normal rainfall to date is 5.10, while a total of 6.38 inches has been gauged here.

Here is how the moisture came during April: April 1, 02: April 5, 01; April 10, 05; April 17, 01; April 18, 01; April 25, .89; April 26, 08; April 30, .78; Total, 1.85.

The lowest reading for the month of April was on the 5th. when the temperature dropped to 27 degrees. A high of 89 was registered on April 22.







ed an educational short course at Texas A&M. One course was in a class of psychology, headed by a renowned professor of that subject. The second day of class he interjected this 3 percent-97 percent theory to the, by now and by choice, large group attending his class, and asked for comments. Of course, we did not agree with him that three out of one hundred had that much influence on any community or group and were rather offended that he could think people so naive or stupid, but before the short course session was over, he had proven his point so thoroughly, we had to accept the

theory as basically logical. The professor divided our class in half, asked us to elect one group leader for each half, He then called a lady and my-self out of the room and told us who would be elected be-fore the secret ballot was cast. He was right. He then brought out issues to be voted on, called out the two leaders, asked their opinions, then told the lady and myself how each issue would be resolved by the class. He was right. Not magic nor mind reading, but as he said. just simple psychology.

I have pondered this phenomenon many times since then. and I know those who attended that class must do the same. Just who are we letting do our evaluations of candidates, is-sues, people and things of con-troversial or political nature? As the professor emphasized. the good do not always win like the story books we use to read. So many times the bad element is the most persuasive in per-sonality and character, as the professor said, you hear them before you see them and don't worry, they will make them-selves seen. It takes a lot of determination and self will to make our own evaluations. 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



The sign was salvaged by a cowboy, Tom Lemmon, of Has-kell. The Museum, of Texas Technological College in Lubbock, obtained the sign from the late Tom Lemmon, Jr. of Haskell.

The Institute of Texan Cultures, part of the University of Texas System, later obtained the sign on loan from The Museum

Now the "Road to Ruin" display has joined the thousands of other items at the Institute. helping to tell the story of Texas and its people.

Marvin Post, formerly of Haskell and now living in San Antonio, recalled a wealth of details about the sign and the saloon

Two Haskell businessmen with a sense of humor bought the idea and the sign from a travelling sign painter. Frank Draper and Jack Baldwin, co-owners, ran the saloon from 1884 to 1895, when they sold out to John Keister and Jumbo Hazelwood. The latter two continued to operate the Road to Ruin until 1904, when Haskell County voted dry

According to the Texas handbook, the saloon, ironically, was also used as a church-not uncommon in the carly days. Baldwin and Draper had ofh er business interests in Haskell a livery stable and a mail hack which ran to Abilene Post has cause to remember the saloon, as he was once evicted because of his age. Post recalls that he had entered the saloon with an older gentleman in order to get away from the cold weather. He stayed in the back room while his friend, being more than of age, went on to the bar. The bartender spotted young Post, who was about 7 or 8 years old, and told the older man to get the lad out The Road to Ruin sign hangs in the Anglo-American section of the Institute, along with many other artifacts. The Institute uses all modern methods to tell the story of Texas in terms of its people, from the various cultures which up the population and made helped influence our heritage. Oates' Drug was established in 1888 by a Mr. Pope McEl-more for operation by T. B. Bond and has been in the same location since that time. The bricks used to put up the building were made on what is call-ed Spring Creek about where the city park now is. Another pioneer Haskell busi-ness was F. G. Alexander and Sons who occupied the building where Cofield's Department

Store now is. It was a general merchandise store and for many years was the only busi-ness on the south side of the square.

On the car parking lots just north of where Bill Wilson Ford Motor Company is now, was the location of Roberts' Mule Barn, an early day type of busi-ness which kept the corrals full of good horses and mules for purchase by farmers and ran-chers. The late Mr. Roberts was the father of Ben Roberts, who is presently employed by the City of Haskell, The Bank's wagon yard stood on ground where the new and

impressive Anderson Tire Company is located, while the Gwinn Livery Stable was situ-ated where the Fieldan Motel now is.

Yet another type of business which flourished here in later years but which has long since gone by the wayside was Loo-ney's Confectionery which did business where the Sherman Carpet Company now is on the North side of the square. Key's Confectionery was also a popular hangout for the teenagers of those days.
