### NEW COOPERATIVE PROGRAM TO BE INITIATED

Beginning with the 1972-73 school term the Abernathy, Olton, Hale Center and New Deal schools will combine their efforts to offer comprehensive education services to exceptional children. This is made possible through recent legislation and Texas Education Agency planning that allocates twenty teachers, seven teacher aides, and three supportive persons to a school district or a cooperative that has 3000 students in average daily attendance.

The cooperative will have a board of directors consisting of the superintendents of the four participating schools. Directly responsible to the board of directors will be a director of the program and his supportive staff which will include an educational diagnostician and a special education counselor. The administrators of each school district will select and employ the teachers to work in their own school systems. These teachers will be responsible to their principals, with the cooperative supportive staffing in an advisory role. Abernathy will be the headquarters and fiscal agent for the cooperative, and will handle all budgetary matters including payroll and purchases of materials and equipment.

Once the program is in full operation, it will function somewhat as follows: If a child has a learning problem, his teacher will refer him to the educational diagnostician. The parents of the child will be asked to give consent for special ability and achievement tests to be given their child. If this testing indicates that special educational services are needed, the parents will be asked for permission to render such services to their child. If permission is granted, the child will be sent to a resource room for part of the time where he will receive special help with his learning problem. He will spend the remainder of the time in a regular classroom.

This program will enable all the schools involved to offer more and better services to more students. This includes services to those who are mentally retarded, those with language or learning disabilities and those with speech handicaps.

Mr. Gid Adkisson of Abernathy has been employed as director of the program.

### From The Desk of the City Manager

April 26, 1972

Times and tides are constantly changing. Things that once were standard everywhere are now totally passé. Working conditions and labor practices are two of the things that have changed most and are likely to change even more in the immediate future. We have always been of the opinion that it was a lot easier and more plausible to prevent a flood than it was to stop one. This applies to everything we attempt to do.

There is a law pending in the State Legislature that people in the know say is almost certain to pass, relative to collective bargaining in public employment. This boils down to one word -- Unions. Now this does not need to be anything to be scared or upset about if we are prepared to cope with the situation. The problem arises when suddenly we are confronted with a totally new and different situation and do not have the faintest idea what to do about it.

To this end, and after a fashion, to make ready for the confrontation if and when it comes, we have been privileged to participate in a Texas Tech University Graduate Business School seminar course in Labor Relations this semester. The course has met every Wednesday evening from 6:30 until 9:30, and it certainly is an advantage to be this close to the University. Some of the city managers and their staff have had to drive many miles every week to attend.

Our professor, Dr. Tom Downes, has led us through one of the most interesting, fascinating and informative courses that it has ever been our good fortune to attend. His expertise in this field is so rare and genuine that we doubt seriously that it can be duplicated. In addition to his esteemed scholastic position, he has a wide variety of experiences ranging from the loading dock of an equipment manufacturing firm to personnel director of a huge state prison system. His knowledge has been gleaned from every phase of planning, doing and preparing Union contracts.

We have been given fresh insights into this new, or what to us is new, field of endeavor. Even if we never have to negotiate a Union Contract or attempt to settle a union grievance or present our case at an arbitration, we will be able to use this new-found knowledge in our association with our co-workers. There will always be some type of problems as long as two or more people work together. People will always need to be able to communicate. We will always need to know how to treat people properly and with respect to be able to obtain their cooperation and a reasonable amount of production. A man is a man, full of human dignity, and desire for recognition regardless of whether he is a Union man or not. He is entitled to and, in one way or another, will get his just share regardless of what or how long it takes.

We congratulate Texas Tech University for having a professor of such intellectual stature to present the course to us. We are sure that all the others fortunate enough to be in the class feel the same as we do and our collective "tip of the hat" for this week goes to Dr. Tom Downes. Can you imagine a professor in this day and time driving to Amarillo on Friday afternoon and presenting a class at 4 p.m. Well, he does for a group of city managers and other city officials in that area. Such dedication and effort is too often overlooked or ignored. We just know that all of us touched by this course under his fine guidance are going to be better employees for our cities and better men in our own right. --Jim Davis

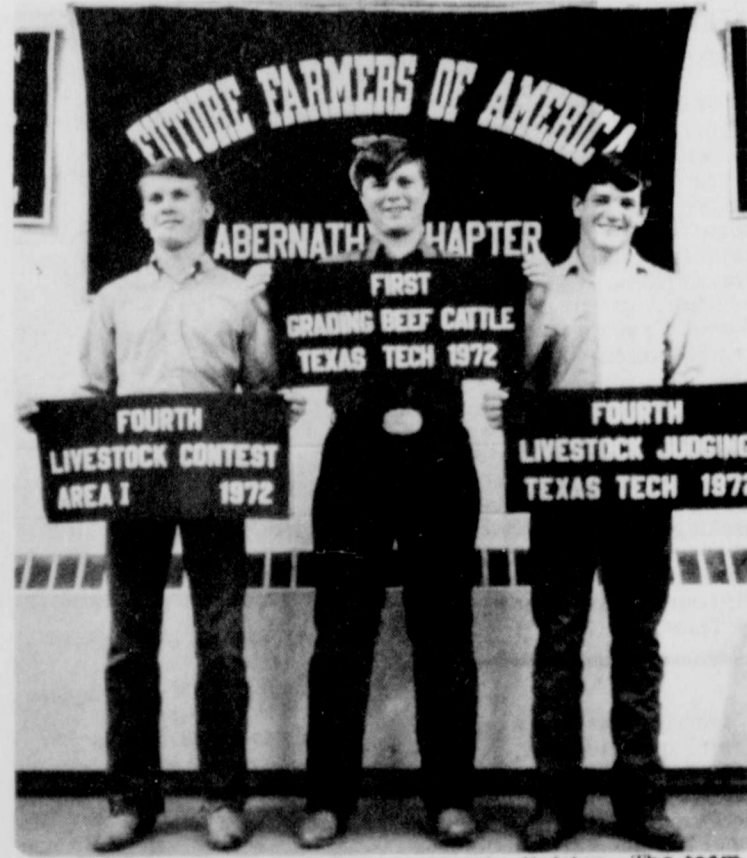
