Remodeling, Additions To Haskell Memorial Hospital Long Time Need Voter Period Is Extended

After several lengthy meetings of the Board of Directors of the Haskell Memorial Hospital with the architectural firm of Killebrew-Rueker Associates to determine the direction in which to proceed with regards to remodeling the existing hospital, a proposed solution was submitted which could be termed Phase I of a Master Plan. This type of remodeling would allow later additions without having to demolish the newly completed areas which would be included in Phase I.

The existing patient wing which has had medical, surgical and obstetrical patients through the year, has caused duplication of personnel. The existing nursery will be removed from the patient wing and added to the east wing where the present operating room exists. This will add three semi-private bedrooms which will include private toilet and shower accommodations, an eight bassinets nursery with a work observation and examination room opposite the nursery and a nurse's station to control this area. The existing labor rooms will be remodeled as will the existing delivery room. The separation of medical, surgical patients from O. B. lessens the possibility of cross infection.

The waiting areas, reception, medical records and business office has long needed remodeling and enlarging to insure more efficient handling of staff personnel and in order to control the flow of public visitation throughout the hospital. The father waiting area adjacent to the nursery as well as the public space will assist in controlling this problem. The administrator and assistant administrator will have their areas remodeled in order that more efficiency can be obtained.

Overall cost of the project including furniture and fixtures will be around \$200,000 consisting of bedroom toilet remodeling; administrative area remodeling; new administrative area; labor room remodeling; new O. B. area and nursery and architectural-engineering fees.

Haskell Fire Rate Reduced

The State Board of Insurance, Austin, has announced that effective as of February 1, 1971, the fire insurance key rate for Haskell was reduced from 32c to 31c.

The State Board of Insurance had set the key rate for Haskell at 32c last November.

The lower rate, now in effect, was due to the addition of the new fire truck.

The State Board of Insurance arrives at the key rate through a system of charges for fire hazards and credits for fire prevention practice in the cities.

No Need To Look At Figures To Tell That It Is Dry, But Here They Are

There is no need to dig up a lot of figures to reveal that Haskell is very, very dry... and that's the story over most of the Lone Star State.

Figures don't lie and here is how the rains came here during the past year and for January, 1971, according to Sam Herren, "The Weatherman."

January, 1970: Normal for the month, .91; Only trace gauged.

February: Normal, 1.34; 1.62 recorded.

March: Normal, .92; 2.91 fell.

April: Normal, 1.93; 1.89 gauged.

May: Normal, 3.99; 1.93 gauged.

June: Normal, 2.84; only .24 of an inch recorded.

July: Normal, 2.38; only .01 of an inch registered.

August: Normal, 1.92; 2.02 gauged.

September: Normal, 2.04; 1.93 recorded.

October: Normal, 2.27; 2.54 gauged.

November: Normal, 1.33; only .08 of an inch registered.

December: Normal, 1.33; only .35 of an inch fell.

Yearly normal precipitation for Haskell is 23.20 inches; however, only 15.54 inches fell during 1970.

And that's not all of the story, as 1971 started off extremely dry as only .02 of an inch was gauged for the month of January.

A joint meeting of the City Council and the Planning and Zoning Commission was held Tuesday night. The Council went on record of accepting the comprehensive planning report.

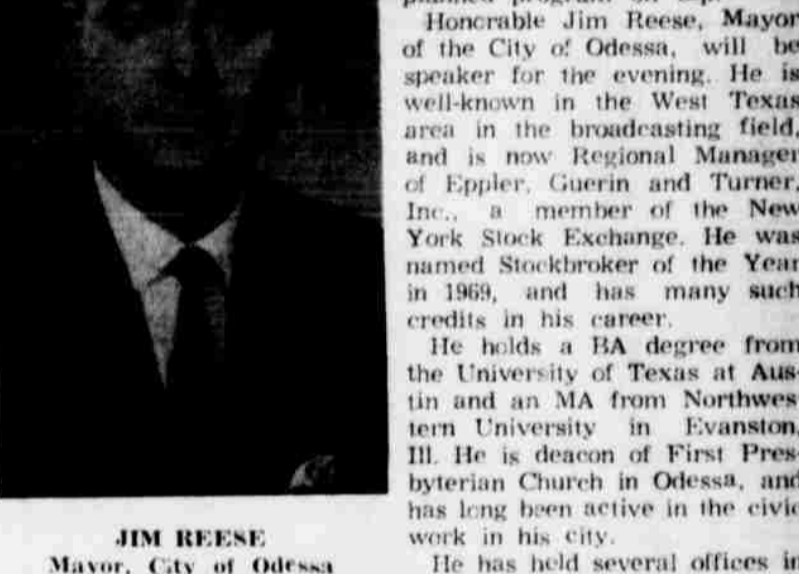

Murder Trial Of Abilene Man Set Here, March 1

The murder trial of an Abilene man charged with the alleged beating death of his daughter has been set for March 1 in 39th District Court in Haskell.

The trial of Robert Haas, 35, of Abilene, had been moved to Haskell on a change of venue several days ago, but the date for the trial was set only last week, according to Criminal District Attorney Ed Paynter.

Paynter will be assisted in the prosecution by 39th District Attorney Royce Adkins of Haskell. The state is not seeking the death penalty. A. L. (Dusty) Rhodes is Haas' court-appointed attorney.

Haas has remained in Taylor County Jail in lieu of \$25,000 bond since soon after his six-year-old daughter, Teresa Ann, was admitted to Hendrick Memorial Hospital, Abilene, in critical condition on September 17.

The charges against Haas arose from an incident in which he allegedly struck Teresa with his fist after a neighbor accused the little girl and her 2½-year-old brother of drawing on her house with crayons.

The Haskell County Fourth Annual Trail Drive, the only trail drive in the State of Texas which is held annually, is slated Wednesday, February 17th, according to the sponsor, James Powell of the Haskell Livestock Auction.

"We need all cowboys we can get and those desiring to assist with the drive are urged to meet at 8:00 a. m. Wednesday, February 17, at the Haskell Livestock Auction," Powell said.

Around 200 cattle, including about 70 pair, plus several springers and feeders, owned by Giles Kemp, will be driven "overland", western style by real "cowpokes" from Kemp's farm five miles southwest of Haskell to the Haskell Livestock Auction, located just south of the Haskell city limits.

Leading the trail drive will be Haskell County Sheriff Garth Garrett plus a number of other dignitaries. The herd should reach the Haskell Livestock Auction around noon.

This was the first American made chair designed with an eye back for individuality.

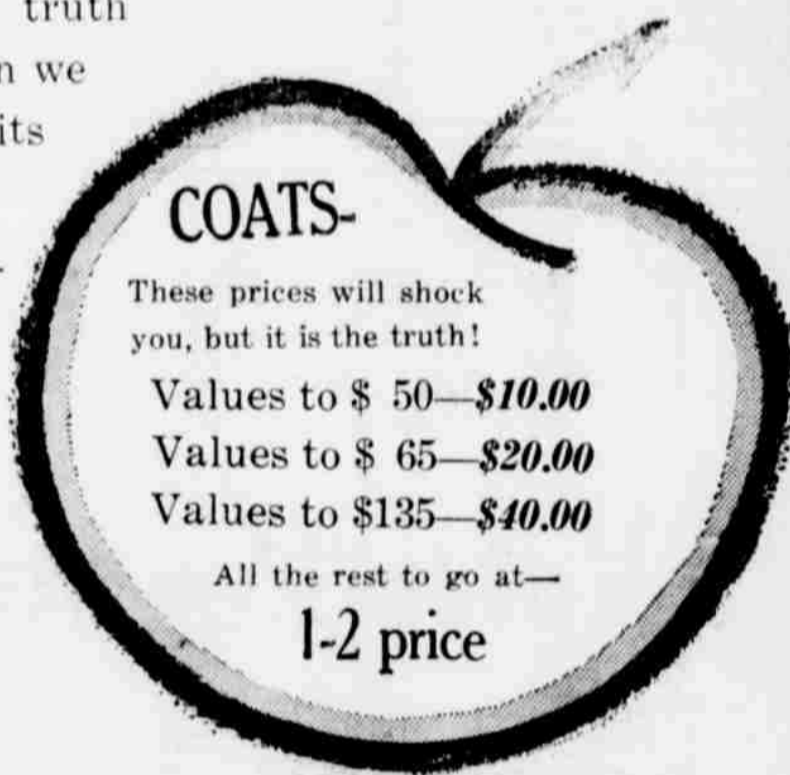

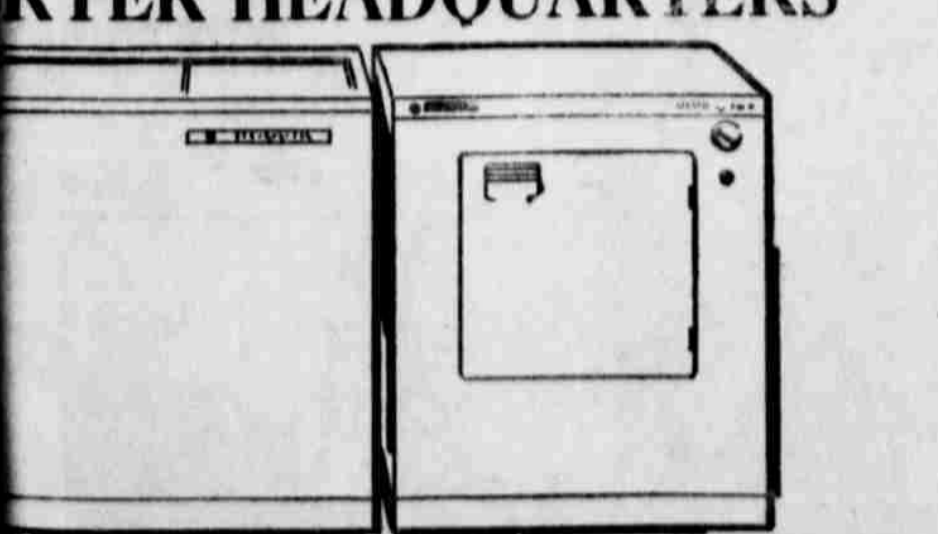

The planned 3,700-foot test is on a 244 acre lease.

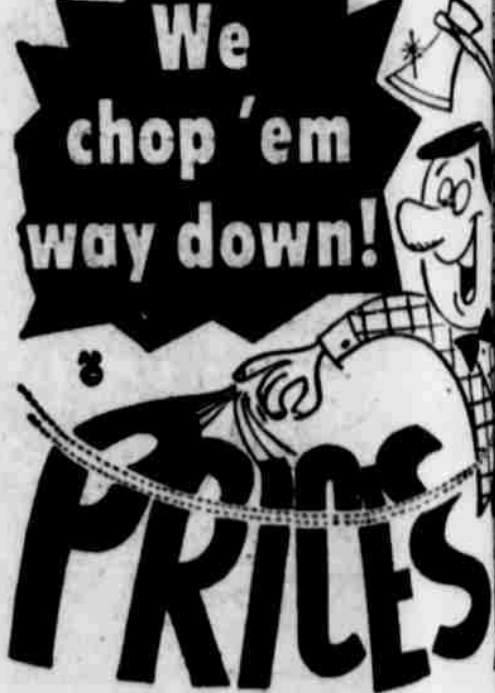
